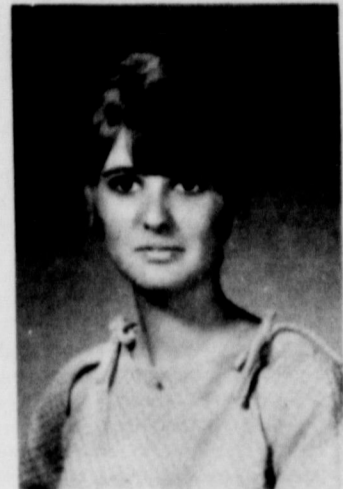

Seniors Of The Week With Their Autobiographies



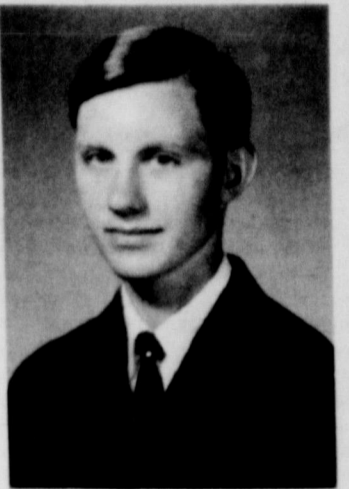
GALA WATKINS

He started to school in 1957 and attended Knox City Elementary School until he finished the third grade. At that time, his family moved to a farm north of O'Brien, and Johnny and his sister, Carolyn, entered Carney School in the fall of 1960. While in junior high, he entered the Interscholastic League competition and placed second in spelling and first in ready writing. At the eighth grade graduation on Friday, May 21, 1965, Johnny gave the valedictorian address. He had achieved a grade average of ninety-four.

While in the ninth grade, Johnny was a member of the annual staff and class representative for the Halloween carnival. This was his first year to be a member of the FFA and he was elected reporter for that organization. He was a member of the FFA Junior Farm Skills team which won first in the district and area competition and eighth in the state competition. At the senior commencement exercises that year, he was awarded the English I and World History award, as well as, the award for highest ranking boy in high school. During his years at Carney School, Johnny achieved the honor roll each six weeks.

At the beginning of his sophomore year, Johnny and his family were again living in Knox City. That year he was a member of the FFA and received a perfect attendance certificate. Johnny became a member of the band during his junior year and was also elected class favorite. He won first in Interscholastic League ready writing competition, and later at area, he placed fourth. He achieved perfect attendance again his junior year and also became a member of the Beta Club.

This year Johnny is a member of the band, Kennel Staff, Beta Club, Annual Staff, and is serving as class treasurer and Beta Club reporter. He was chosen as the FFA Beau and has been on the honor roll as well. After graduation, Johnny plans to attend Eastern New Mexico University in Portales, New Mexico.

These crashes resulted in two persons killed, six persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$5,435.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first four months of 1969 shows a total of 17 accidents resulting in two persons killed, 15 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$13,580.00.

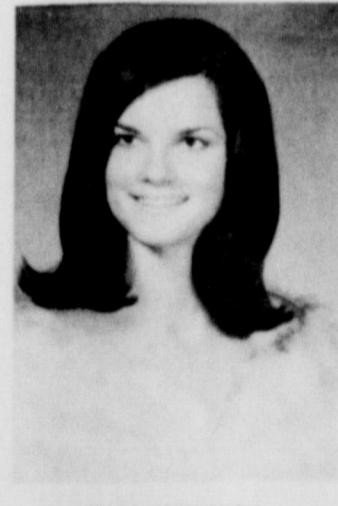
Benjamin Honor Grads

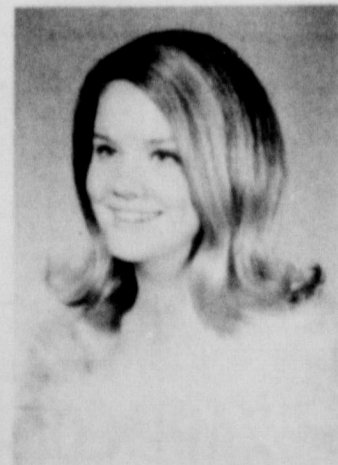
Pam is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Roberts and has maintained a grade average of 93.08 for the past four years.

Susan, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Vernon D. McCanlies has a four year average of 92.43, and Driver's average was 82.3.

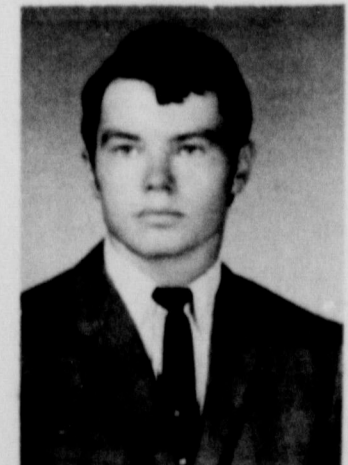
Benjamin High School baccalaureate has been scheduled for Sunday evening, May 25 and commencement exercises will follow on Monday evening, May 26, 1969.

The KCHS volleyball team was also recognized as district runners-up.

In concluding the girls' activities, Donna Railsback was named Most Valuable Athlete, based on participation in the most activities.

In boys basketball, Mike Newton was recognized as making Honorable Mention, all district, and in tennis, Coach Weaver recognized Mike Newton and Charlie Lieb as boys doubles district runners-up.

Coach Weaver explained that this was the first year that KCHS girls have competed in track and field events. However, Knox City placed second in district with Sue Egenbacher-

er winning first place in the discus with 88'9" and Betsy Ross also sharing in first place honors with 15'8" in broad jump.

Coach Hibbitts' report on the boys track and golf participation, noted that Jerry Watson tied the 5'8" school record in high jump and Tommy Guy Waldrip broke the existing record of 42'7" in the 330 intermediate hurdles.

High School Principal Ward Cooksey reviewed the UIL literary events and paid special recognition to Connie McKinney and Kenny Lawson who represented KCHS in regional typing. Connie placed sixth in a field of 23 contestants. Kathy Verhalen placed second in district poetry interpretation, also qualifying for the regional meet.

Mr. Cooksey informed the guests that the Kennel staff is chosen at the beginning of each school year after the election of class officers.

Mrs. Melvin A. Lowrey, sponsor of the high school choir as well as the Greyhound annual staff related that choir

officers are also elected at the beginning of the school year. She further explained that students serving on the annual staff would remain and that new members would be chosen at the beginning of the next term to fill the places of those who have graduated.

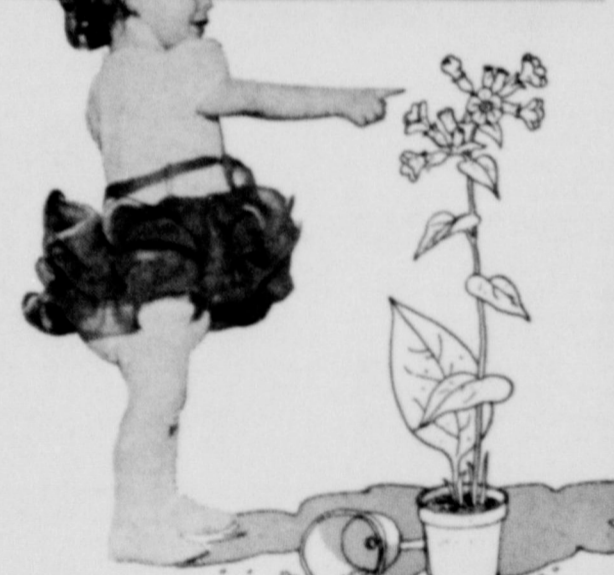
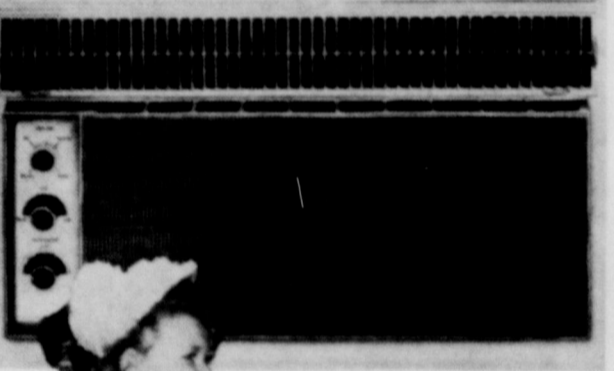
PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (HUR)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 42, 46, and 48 of Article III, Sections 3a and 7 of Article VII, Section 12 of Article VIII, Section 3 of Article IX, Sections 1, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, and 9 of Article X, Section 10 of Article XI, Sections 3, 4, 5, and 7 of Article XII, Sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7 of Article XIII, Sections 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, and 8 of Article XIV, Sections 3, 4, 7, 13, 29, 32, 34, 35, 36, 38, 42, 45, 46, 54, 55, 57, 58, and 60 of Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be repealed, it being specifically understood that the repeal of these sections shall not in any way make any change in our present constitution.

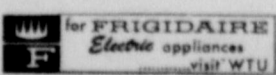

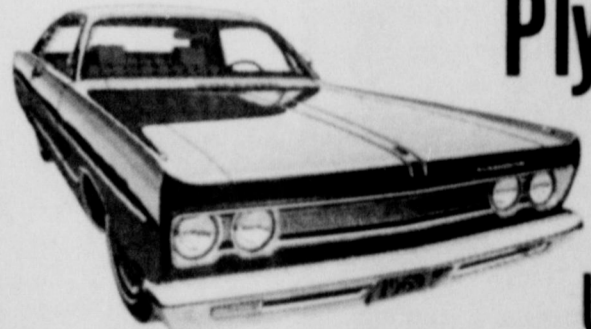

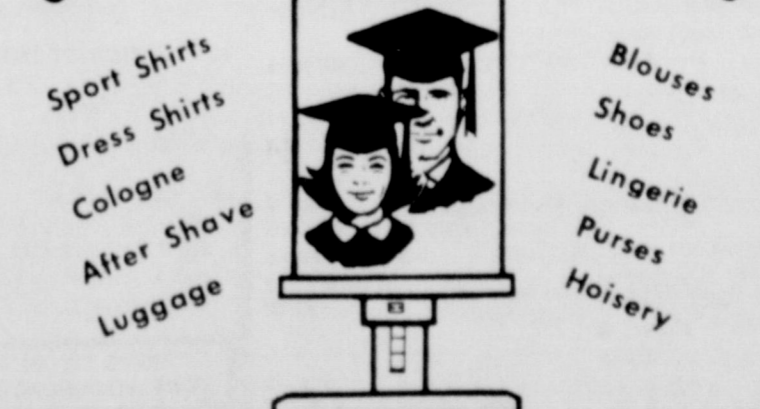

islature; and WHEREAS, the aforementioned amendment provides that said Authority shall contain all of the territory contained in the boundaries of the cities of Goree, Knox City, and Munday, in Knox County, and the city of Haskell, in Haskell County; and WHEREAS, in order to accomplish the purposes for which said Authority was created, it will be necessary to issue bonds payable from ad valorem taxes to be levied on all taxable property in the Authority and the revenues of the Authority; and

2. For the purpose of said election, North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority is divided into four election precincts. All of the territory of the Authority contained in the City of Goree shall be known as the "Goree Precinct"; all of the territory contained in the City of Knox City shall be known as the "Knox City Precinct"; all of the territory contained in the City of Munday shall be known as the "Munday Precinct"; and all of the territory contained in the City of Haskell shall be known as the "Haskell Precinct".

3. (a) The election in the Goree Precinct shall be held at the City Hall, in the City of Goree, Texas. Mrs. G. W. Weber is hereby appointed as the Presiding Judge for said election, and she shall appoint an assistant judge and two

clerks to assist her in holding said election.

(b) The election in the Knox City Precinct shall be held at the City Hall, in the City of Knox City, Texas. Mr. Otis Harbert is hereby appointed as the Presiding Judge for said election, and he shall appoint an assistant judge and two clerks to assist him in holding said election.

(c) The election in the Munday Precinct shall be held at the City Hall, in the City of Munday, Texas. Mr. E. H. Nelson is hereby appointed as the Presiding Judge for said election, and he shall appoint an assistant judge and two clerks to assist him in holding said election.

(d) The election in the Haskell Precinct shall be held at the City Hall, in the City of Haskell, Texas. Mr. O. W. Tooley is hereby appointed as the Presiding Judge for said election, and he shall appoint an assistant judge and two clerks to assist him in holding said election.

4. That said election shall be held under the laws governing general elections except as otherwise provided in the law creating said Authority. Only legally qualified electors residing within said Authority who own taxable property in said Authority and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be qualified to vote, and each elector shall vote only in the precinct of his residence.

WHEREAS, the City is in urgent need of an additional water supply which may be obtained by contract with North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority;

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KNOX CITY, TEXAS:

1. That an election be held in said City on the 29th day of May, 1969, at which election the following Proposition shall be submitted:

PROPOSITION
"Shall the City Council of the City of Knox City, Texas, be authorized to enter into a contract with North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority for the purpose of supplying water to said City, as authorized by Chapter 342 Acts of the Fifty-Fifth Legislature and other applicable laws?"

2. That said election shall be held at the City Hall, within said City. Said City shall constitute a single Election Precinct for said election, and the following election officers are hereby appointed to hold said election at the aforesaid Polling Place:

Otis Harbert, Presiding Judge,
Jack Coates, Alternate Judge.

The Presiding Judge shall appoint not less than two nor more than four qualified election clerks to serve and assist in conducting said election; provided that if the Presiding Judge named above actually serves at said election as expected, then the Alternate Presiding Judge shall be one of such clerks.

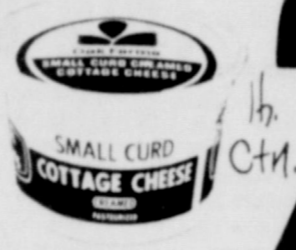

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (HJR9)
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section 49-d-1 to read as follows: "Section 49-d-1. (a) In addition to Texas Water Development Bonds heretofore authorized to be issued by Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, the Texas Water Development Board is hereby authorized to issue \$3,500,000,000 in aggregate principal amount of bonds. No part of such additional bonds shall be issued prior to approval thereof by the vote of two-thirds of the elected members of both houses of the Legislature. (b) The proceeds from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund. (c) The bonds herein authorized and all bonds authorized by such Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III shall bear such interest and mature as the Texas Water Development Board shall prescribe subject to the limitations as may be imposed by the Legislature. (d) The Texas Water Development Fund shall be used for the purposes heretofore permitted by and subject to the limitations in said Sections 49-c and 49-d and in addition thereto for the purposes of developing water resources and facilities for the State of Texas, both within the State and without the State and without the authority of the Texas Water Development Board." State of Texas. Provided, however, that financial assistance may be made pursuant to the provisions of such Sections 49-c and 49-d of subject only to the availability of funds and without regard to the provisions in Section 49-c that such financial assistance shall terminate after December 31, 1982. (e) Under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe, the Texas Water Development Board may receive grants and, in addition, execute contracts with the United States or any of its agencies, other states of the United States, foreign governments and others, for the acquisition and development of such water resources and facilities for the State of Texas. Such contracts when executed may be secured by the general credit of the state, and if so secured shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas in the same effect as Texas Water Development Bonds. If facilities are acquired for a term of years, such contracts shall contain provisions for renewal that will protect the state's investment. The aggregate principal amount of Texas Water Development Bonds authorized herein, and in said Sections 49-c and 49-d shall be reduced by the aggregate of principal payments committed under such contracts constituting general obligations of the state. The provisions hereof shall not be construed to limit the authority of the Texas Water Development Board." (f) Texas Water Development Bonds and such contracts secured by the general credit of the state shall be registered by the Attorney General with the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivered to the purchasers, be negotiable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas. (g) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of the anticipatory character."

Provided, however, that financial assistance may be made pursuant to the provisions of such Sections 49-c and 49-d of subject only to the availability of funds and without regard to the provisions in Section 49-c that such financial assistance shall terminate after December 31, 1982. 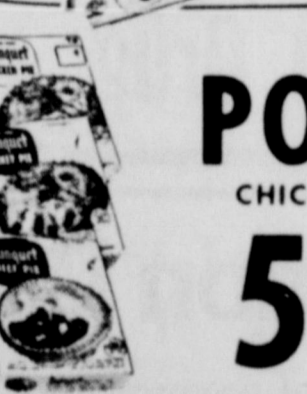

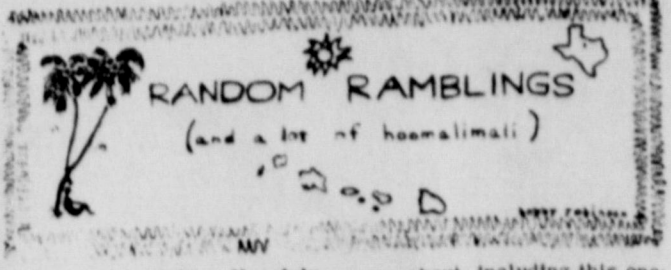

Too many shops, hotels, restaurants, and tour businesses attempt to get as much money from them as possible, even though most businesses do offer an R & R discount. . . . Sigh. . . . R & R's have already pumped \$61 million into Hawaii's economy in the past few years.

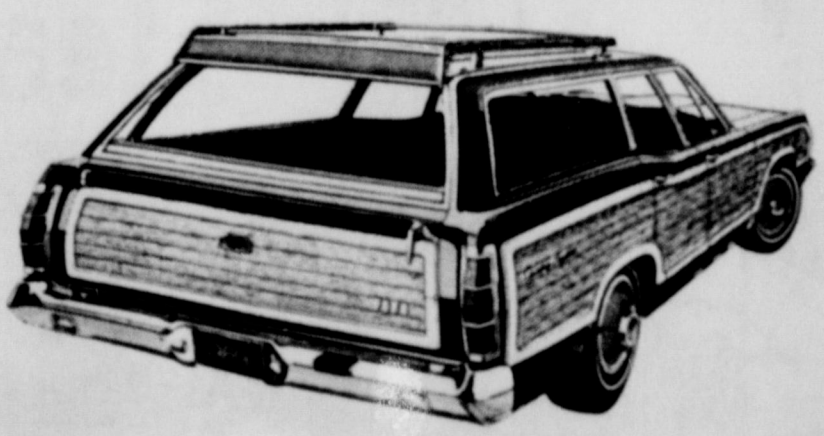
