School Boards Reach City to Enforce Agreement on Taxes In Disputed District Parking Rules

An agreement was reached ast week between the Knox City and Munday school districts allowing landowners of some 16,000 disputed acres to pay their school taxes to the parking of cars on downtown district of their choice, Barney Arnold, president of the Knox City board, has announced.

The acreage involved was recently allotted to the Knox City district by the County School Board, an action that was later upheld by a decision of Judge Ben Charlie Chapman in 51st District Court. Judge Chapman's decision, however, has been appealed by the Munday board, and final settlement may not be reached until after the deadline for payment of taxes.
