Dwight Gothard caught a sprinkling of birdshot in both legs Tuesday while quail-hunt-ing with Milton Rowan and W. Heads Local M. Rowan, but after first-aid treatments and x-rays at the Knox City Clinic, was able to continue about his business.

The accident occurred while the trio was hunting on the Ellis farm west of O'Brien. Gothard and Milton Rowan were about 30 rows apart in a sudan field when Rowan's 12 gauge pump shotgun discharged while he was reloading, and the top of the pattern caught Gothard from the knees down.

X-rays disclosed seventeen of the No. 7 1-2 shot in one leg.
