

O'Brien Wins 3 Games Here Tuesday Night

Tuesday night the Knox City High School boys and girls entertained their favorite rivals, the O'Brien Bulldogs, in the local gym—and suffered three defeats at the hands of the visitors.

First, the O'Brien volleyball team, led by the LaDuke girls, rather thoroughly subdued the favored Knox City team by a score of 29-16. This leaves the O'Brien team in the lead in the district.

Second, the Bulldog "B" boys engaged our boys in another one of those sizzling, tightly contested games in which the lead changed hands repeatedly, but the local boys lost, 17-16.

Last, the Hounds and Bulldogs played their "A" hoop teams—and any spectator who did not enjoy the game was certainly no basketball fan.

It was an evenly-played match from the opening to the closing whistle, the score being tied a dozen times and each team taking the lead a half-dozen times.

At the beginning of the fourth quarter the score was 26-24 in Knox City's favor, but the Bulldogs pulled ahead, and with less than two and a half minutes to go the Hounds sank a free throw to tie the game for the last time, 31-31. In the final six seconds O'Brien made a free shot to set the final score of 37-33.

High point man of the game was Wallace May of Knox City with 16 points, followed by Wayne Hutchinson of O'Brien with 15 points. The Bulldogs' Dub Johnston tallied 10 points, with six of them in the last quarter when they were badly needed.

Until Tuesday night, the local boys were undefeated. On Friday night they entertained Rule, a strong conference contender, on the local gym. The "B" teams played one of the hottest contested games seen on the local court in a long time, with the lead changing hands with almost every point made during the game. The local lads won in the last 30 seconds with a field goal by Burt Denton, to make the final score 25-24.

Following the "B" game, the Hounds and Bobcats tangled in a conference tilt that was almost as close as the "B" game. However, the Hounds pulled away in the last quarter to win by a convincing score of 49-32.

Tomorrow (Friday) night the Hounds go to Vera, while O'Brien and Rochester, both undefeated in conference play, tangle on the O'Brien court.

Next Tuesday night, January 23, the Greyhounds will go to Rochester to complete the first half of the district double round robin.

The third annual grass judging contest sponsored by the supervisors of the Wichita-Brazos Soil Conservation Service was held in Knox City Saturday, January 13. Fifty-two boys, representing 6 FFA chapters and the Knox County 4-H Club competed in the contest. FFA teams entering were from Knox City, Rochester, O'Brien, Munday and Benjamin. Top honors went to the Rochester FFA Chapter, with second place going to the Knox City FFA Chapter and third place to the O'Brien FFA Chapter.

In individual scoring the high scorer was Dick Manley of the Rochester team, second high was S. M. Hanson of Rochester and third was Bobby Manley of Rochester. Jesse Motes of O'Brien was fourth, and Kenneth Hobbs of the Knox City team was fifth.

The Rochester team was instructed by Kenneth Roberts, Vocational Agriculture Instructor, the Knox City team was instructed by Elton Groves, Vocational Agriculture Instructor, and the O'Brien team was instructed by F. A. Johnston, Vocational Agriculture Instructor.

This land that is being retired to grass is to be used for grazing livestock and is a part of their conservation plans to use their land according to its best capacity. It is anticipated that a rather large acreage of this grass will be planted this spring since more than fifty-five cooperators have spoken for the use of the drills.

Terrace lines have been run on the following cooperators:

Roy Lebus ranch west of Benjamin, M. C. Webb near Judd, John May farm near Haskell, C. Y. Morris near Rule, League Ranch near Benjamin, Barney Arnold west of Knox City, and J. A. Jenkins southeast of Munday.

The lines were run by technicians of the Soil Conservation Service assisting the district. The constructing of terraces and the planting of grass by the cooperators is but a part of their coordinated plan to use their land wisely now so that it will be in good shape for future generations.

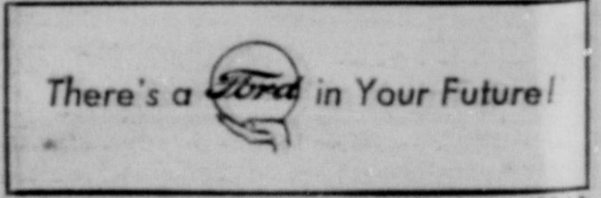

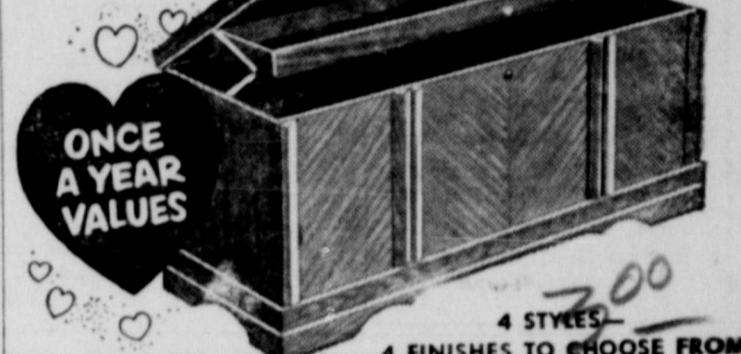
