

## Herbicides Are Applied On Texas Tech Vegetable Plots

By JOE TIDWELL Herbicides are ingreater de-

mand each year as the cost of labor increases and field labor ers are harder to obtain. There are three types of herbicides depending upon their effects on plants: contact, growth regulators and soil sterilants.

Contact herbicides kill plants covered by the chemical. Generally the effects are acute and the plant dies quickly after treatment. Contact herbicides are selective or non-selective. selective herbicide kills or stunts some plants with little or no-injury to others. A non-

selective herbicide is toxic to all plants. Living plant tissue has little or no resistance to non-selective herbicides.

Growth regulators can be absorbed by either the roots or above-ground parts and move, or are translocated through the plant system. The chemicals upset the plant's growth and metabolic processes. They have a chronic effect, that is, the full effects may not show up until a week to a month or more

after threatment. Soil sterilants are anychemicals which prevent the growth of green plants when present in the soil. If the chemical sterilizes the soil for less than 48 hours, it is said to have no residual toxicity. If the soil is sterile for 4 months or less it is considered to be a temporary soil sterilant, from 4 months to Jonnie Barker, and Duanne Con-2 years as semi permanent and ner,

for more than 2 years it is considered as a permanent soil sterilant.

There are three times of chemical treatment; preplant, preemergence and postemergence. Preplant treatment is any treatment made before the crop is planted; preemergence treatment is any treatment made prior to emergence of a specified crop or weed, Postemergence treatment is any treatment made after emergence of a specified crop or weed.



Sucking lice, short and long nosed, pierce the animal's skin and feed sucking blood, They are usually found, explains the county agent, on the sides of the animal's neck, on the brisket, back, inner surface of the thighs, tail and around the nose eyes and ears. Chewing lice are smaller and are usually found on top of the shoulders and around the root of the tail but may also infest other parts of the animal's body.

Many chemicals are available for controlling lice as well as other external parasites of farm livestock. Because of restrictions and safety suggestions which apply to the use of chemicals, the county agent invites stockmen to come by his office and pick up a copy of MP-691, "Texas Guide for Controlling External Parasites of Livestock and Poultry." ....





cast, as a band, as a directed spray and as spot treatment. Developing a new herbicide is expensive, 1 to 3 million dollars, and usually requires 5 to 10 years of a full scale developmental program. Herbicides are throughly safety tested before they are sold to the public. Before a herbicide can be applied on food or feed crops it must obtain the approval of the Federal Food and Drug Administration. Foods which exceed the residue tolerances set up by the FFDA are removed and condemmed from the public market. \*\*\*\*\*

So re-check your instructions, your computations and everything. Be real careful! If you don't the computer may send you a little notice pointing out your error.






