It has been held and garrisoned at various times by Spain, Mexico, the Republic of Texas, the Confederacy and the United States.



Such legislation will create hospital district under Article IX, Section 9 of the Texas Constitution with boundaries coextensive with the boundaries of Knox County, Texas.




