Senator Clint C. Small of Amarillo, long an astute student of State affairs told a hamber of Commerce gathering at Pampa last week that the Legislature should levy no new taxes, pass as few laws as possible, and then go home.

This is a very simple formula, but it would do more to stimulate business and restore the people's confidence in the State government than four months of heated debate, high speed spending and aimless legislative efforts to regulate everything by statute.

Mr. Small is correct in his content'en that people these days place too much reliance in the efficacy of legislation. Too many citizens believe that economic, social and moral ills of the country may be cured instantly by passing a law. They look to government for benefits which can be obtained only through concentrated private effort.

The people's blind faith in the power cf laws has been reflected in Texas in recent years by a record breaking number of special sessions. The chief accomplishment of these extended lawmaking spress has been to develop new ways of spending money by new taxes.

Today a large percentage of the people are over-taxed and over-regulated under existing laws. In addition they are worr.cu to the point of exhaustion by threats of

more taxation and more laws. Citizens who bear the burdens would welcome with much enthusiasm a few years of Senator Small's program calling for a minimum of legislative activity.

If all taxes were direct taxes in this country, says the Industrial News Review, it's a safe forecast that we'd have real tax reform and efficient government in a

For if that were the case, every one of us, on the average, would have to turn over 20 to 25 per cent of salary and other income to the tax collector every pay day. And that is based on the present system of government finance, where but part of the cost of government collected, ec nomists state, more than 30 per cent of our income would go to government.

Whoever first thought of indirect taxation-that is, hidden taxes, levied against all the necessities and luxuries of life at the point of manufacture, production a.- l distribution-was the best friend wasteful government ever had. Indirect taxation pulls the wool over the people's eyes, and promotes glib fallacies, such as "the rich pay the taxes so why should you worry?"

There's a movement on foot to broaden the tax base, and collect more government revenue through direct taxation. It deserves support because this seems to be the only way that every citizen can be awakened to his tremendous personal 'nterest in taxing problems.

#### 20 TO 30 PER CENT INCREASE IN RELIEF ROLLS PREDICTED

The attenuated Texas relief system v.i" be strained almost to the breaking point if the coming winter is severe, relief officials

State Director Adam R. Johnson predicts an increase of 20 to 30 per cent in relief rolls this winter, bringing the load during peak months to around 625,000, even if the weather is mild. This prediction is based upon the fact that applications for relief are coming in at an increased

Part of the increase is believed due to the government's farm program with curtailment of acreage throwing out of empleyment many workers who know no work except farming.

These men would not be readily absorbed into industry even if trained for it, be cause what jobs are open are given to trained workers.

Chief function of the relief commission is the distribution of surplus commodities of the Federal government, and the carrying on of the work is hampered by the lack of administrative funds.

Johnson said he hoped to eke out present funds until the Legislature meets, when aid will be asked to continue the program of distributing surplus commodities and the CCC program. The commission has surplus commodities valued at \$3,000,300 stored in warehouses and the Federal government requires a state agency for their distribution as well as for administration of the CCC work.

Administrative costs run about \$20,000 per month.

#### FORD REDOUBLES WAR ON "HONKY-TONKS"

In September, the Texas Liquor Control Board, emboldened by favorable court decisions, sent out a letter to more than 18. 000 holders of beer permits over the state warning "honky-tonks" and "joints" to clean up or get out of business.

"The courts of this state have fully sustained enactments of the Legislature giving this board adequate authority to revoke or suspend your license," the letter said. "The staff in the offices of the Board and its field representatives are now organized more efficiently than ever before. Local officers are affording closer cooperation than at any previous time .

"You are now informed that the place deserving to be called a "honky-tonk" or 'beer joint" must change its methods or go. out of business. The instruments for deaiing with such places have now been forged and there is full determination to use them, and an insistent public demand that you clean up or get out."

No idle threat was the Board's blunt warning. Last week, State Liquor Control Administrator Bert Ford announced that the campaign to eliminate "honky-tonks" and "joints" had resulted in the suspension of 117 beer permits since September 1. The number did not include suspensions on other grounds than running disorderly

#### THE INSANE IN JAILS

An important bit of news for the humanitarian citizens of Texas is the announcement from Austin that hospital facilities will become sufficient during next Summer so that all insane can be removed from the county jails throughout the State. The additional space will be provided by completion of the State Hospital at Big Spring and of additions to already existing instutions where the mentally afflicted are housed.

Detention of scores of insane persons in prison is necessary in order to protect other persons and sometimes to save the

patient himself from injury or death. At the same time, such confinement is essentially medieval, and often may aggregate mental affliction which might easily be cured by treatment in a proper institution.

A saving is evident for the taxpayer in this reclamation of mentally usound persons for society. Ultimately, it should offset some of the outlay in building a new hospital and making additions to old ones. Such considerations, however, are second to the idea of extending the most humane treatment possible to the afflicted. One of the frontiers of the future will be the adoption of reforms designed to prevent insanity .- Fort Worth Star-Telegram.



#### Disasters Strike 41 States During Year

Red Cross Aids 420,000 Persons Following Catastrophes

That the past year has not been en easy one for the American Red Cross is shown in a recent report listing disasters necessitating Red Cross relief throughout the United States during the past twelve months.

The report reveals that 129 domestic disasters called for Red Cross aid in 217 counties of 41 states, and that assistance was given to 420,000 persons who were disaster victims.

"That this has been a very active year is obvious when one compares this year's operations with the average of 92 disasters requiring Red Cross aid annually for the past 15 years," Chairman Norman H. Davis said in commenting on the Red Cross Disaster Relief Service report.

These catastrophes included cloudbursts, cyclones, epidemics, fires, floods, forest fires, halistorms, mine explosions, a school bus accident, a shipwreck, tornadoes, typhoons, and wind storms.

"Disaster relief was the first humanitarian work of the American Red Cross after its organization in 1881," Mr. Davis said. "In the ensuing 57 years the fing of the Red Cross has flown upon every scene of major disaster in the United States. The Red Cross has carried relief-food, clothing, shelter, medical aid, rehabilitation of homes and families—to more than 2,200 scenes of disaster at home and abroad, and has expended over \$140,000,000 contributed by the American public in this work of mercy.'

The Red Cross policies of relief, the national chairman pointed out, have been established over a period of years through actual experience of its workers in the field. Relief is given on the basis of need of sufferers-not of losses. Loans, he pointed out, are never made, but relief is a gift from the Red Cross in the name of its members and contributors to its work.

"It would not be possible for the Red Cross to carry out such widespread relief activities without the help of thousands of volunteer workers," Mr. Davis fald. "Volunteers are the main stay of the organization, and in the past year's work assistance from many cooperating agencies has made it possible for us to abswer the many calls for help."

While relief was being given to victims of natural catastrophes, the Red Cross was not unmindful of the necessity for preparedness plans to meet emergencies that may arise in any American community. Red Cross chapters in hundreds of counties have or ganized disaster preparedness commitand to organize resources of communi-
