Sheriff's Dept. Investigates Robbery Of Convenience Store

At approximately 2:45 A.M. Tuesday, the Sheriff's Department received a call from Terry Robbins stating that he had been robbed. Robbins is an employee at the Allsup's store located at I-20 and Cherry.

Upon arrival at the scene, Sheriff Bill Skinner and Deputy Mack West question Robbins. He told them that 2 male subjects entered the store and purchased a pack of cigarettes with a \$20 bill, subjects then left the store. They came back in after a few minutes at which time one of the subjects produced a small caliber blue steel revolver, demanding all money from the store. After taking Robbins wallet, the two subjects made him enter the cooler and told him to stay.

After some time he came out, at which time he notified the Sheriff's Department.

Upon investigation, both cash registers were emptied and a night deposit box taken, an undermined amount of cash and checks stolen.

Subject #1 is described to be a white male, 20 to 25 years old, 5'10", 160 lbs., shoulder length blond hair and wearing a dirty white T-shirt and jeans.

The 2nd subject, black male, 20 to 25 years old, short afro, 5'10", 145 lbs., and wearing a checkered western shirt with sleeves cut out and jeans.

Robbins didn't see a vehicle or what direction they were going when they left.

The Sheriff's department with help from Abilene Police Department were able to apprehend Maryann Parmele of Rt. 4 Box 97C of Clyde, whom they held a Grand Jury Sealed Indictment for fraud.

A few months ago Ms. Parmele opened an account at the Baird First National with a check for \$1200. After running a

check on her account in Abilene, the account was opened here and check deposited.

She then went to the bank in Abilene at which time she closed out her account there and then back to Baird where she then closed her account with First National.

Abilene authorities notified the sheriffs department here Monday and informed them she was in Abilene opening an account there. Abilene then made the arrest and Callahan Co. deputies served their warrant and brought her to Baird where she was then booked.

At this time she is out on \$25,000 bond in Callahan County and two bonds in Taylor County, one for \$1000 and another for \$1500.

Sheriff Skinner said there had been a lot of complaints on how stiff the drunk driving laws were in Texas. He would like to share with you how they handle drunk drivers in other counties:

"Australia: The names of convicted drunk drivers are published in local newspapers under the heading: 'Drunk and in Jail.'

"Malaya: The driver is jailed, if he's married, his wife is also jailed.

"Finland, England and Sweden: Drunk drivers are automatically jailed for approximately one year.

"South Africa: The drunk driver is given a 10-year prison sentence, a fine of \$10,000-or both.

"Turkey: Drunk drivers are taken 20 miles from town by police and forced to walk back under escort.

"Bulgaria: A second conviction of drunk driving is your last. The punishment is EXECUTION!

"San Salvador: Drunk drivers are executed by firing squads."

City Council Approves Motion To Suspend WTU Rate Increase

Larry Cheshire, representing WTU, appeared before City Council members Monday to request 9.4% rate increase.

Mr. Cheshire explained to the Council why WTU found it necessary to ask for a increase less than a year since the last request. The present rate went into affect February 12, 1982. High interest rates have soared the cost of construction, tripling the amount it cost to build existing generating facilities. Low earnings have dropped WTU below the capital competitive market place.

Larry went on to say that in this day and time all utility companies are in financial trouble. WTU has cut back and is working on a low management level along with encouraging the consumer to cut back on usage of electricity.

In the past WTU rate increases that were put before Public Utilities Commission have been settled without a hearing, because West Texas Utilities was willing to accept a lesser increase.

After discussion among the council members, a motion was made to suspend the request for 120 days.

Ray Willeford appeared before the council seeking approval on his terms

as lake keeper at Baird Lake. He told the council he would buy the old house at the lake to sell and be moved from the lake, and he would move his trailer out to the lake. At his expense, he would put in electricity and water for self-contained trailer hookups. He would in exchange keep the grounds clean and mowed and enforce rules set by the council.

The council is working on an agreement (contract) that will be agreeable to both parties, city and Mr. Willeford.

Sewer rate increase was discussed as well as the budget. There will be a special Public Meeting called next Monday on these two topics.

Councilman Buddy Brame, met with Mr. Andrews of Brownwood TV Cable and reported that to the council.

Mr. Andrews said that Baird would be provided with a 35 channel system by Feb. 15, 1983, and all existing cable replaced. For a charge of \$7.75 subscribers would receive 24 channels, eight more channels for an additional \$5.00, with HBO and two other channels for another \$7.95.

Lions Retrieve Lead From Bears In 2nd Half To Win 42-12

The final score 42-12 didn't reflect the Bears playing ability between them and the Albany Lions last Friday night. The Lions scored to win with some really big plays. Scoring with 30 seconds left in the half was the turning point.

Coach Conley said that after viewing a film of the game, he was happy with the offensive blocking, but was disappointed that defense wasn't comming around as it should. But he went on to say all players gave a good effort.

The Bears will play Cisco here this Friday night. The biggest team they've played all year. According to Coach Conley Cisco's defense is better than Albany's, but their offense is not good.

He looks for change and the Bears will get on the win column.

The J.V. and Jr. High go to Cisco Thursday night.

Coach Conley and the Bears appreciate everyone's support.

Callahan Residents Recieve Appraisal Notices

Citizens with errors on their notices should contact the county tax so the tax rolls may be corrected. The tax office will not accept any compliants about tax valuations. Those compliants should be directed to the county appraisal review board.

Types of errors that should be reported to the tax office include rural residents being listed within city limits of a town.

Hearings with the appraisal board are being set up for those wishing to protest property values. Instructions for filing a valuation protest are printed on appraisal notices. That number is 915-854-1362.

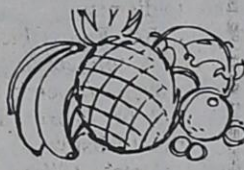

4 Locals Attend Green Thumb Training Program

For almost 1,000 older workers in the Texas Farmers Union Green Thumb program, the "battle of the budget" came to a happy conclusion with the recent Congressional override of the President's veto of a supplemental appropriations bill.

The bill provides money for a variety of programs and agencies ranging from the defense department to NASA to Title V of the Older Americans Act, which funds TFU Green Thumb and other senior employment programs, according to Diane Parrish, Green Thumb state director.

Speaking to 135 Green Thumb workers at a training session to DeLeon, Texas on Sept. 23, 1982, Parrish said the Congress-

sional override "was decisive" in saving the jobs of more than 54,000 Title V workers nationwide. The workers are all 55 and over, low income, and provide services for libraries, schools, senior centers, and museums.

"Without the override, the only hope would have been yet another appropriations bill," she said, "and there were no real guarantees that another one would have been passed and signed in time to keep the program going." The new bill funds the program through June 30, 1983.

Green Thumbers had already received letters informing them that their last day on the job was to be Sept. 24. Parrish said the letters had to be

sent out because "there was no assurance that both houses would override the veto. What we've seen is a minor miracle." The override vote in the Senate was 60 to 30, exact-

ly the two-thirds majority necessary.

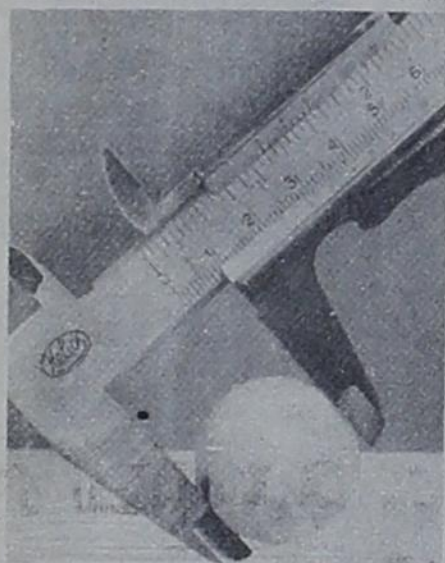

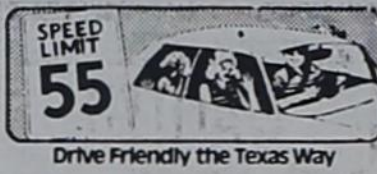

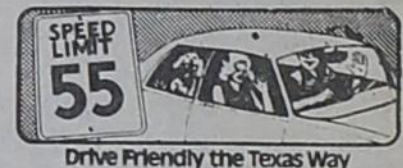

Texas Gas Production In June

Railroad Commission Chairman Jim Nugent announced that Texas oil and gas wells produced 491,085,900 Mcf of gas in June 1982, down 11.3 percent from field runs a year earlier.

Marketed gas production totaled 405,388,346 Mcf and reflected a 13.36 percent decrease from the June volume. Marketed production is the total gas to transmission lines, carbon black and plant fuel and lease use.

Gas exported from Texas in June totaled 219,-

201,749 Mcf. Exports of Texas-produced gas in June totaled 159,899,551 Mcf, and reflected a 16.96 percent decrease from the year-earlier month.

Texas gas production in June came from 225,119 oil and gas wells.

In May 1982, Texas wells produced 498,341,510 Mcf of gas. Marketed gas production in May totaled 404,422,197 Mcf. May exports of Texas-produced gas totaled 244,352,185 Mcf.

Through the first six months of this year, Texas produced 3,077,643,721 Mcf of gas. For the same period, marketed gas production totaled 2,576,791,-044 Mcf.

COMES NOW Lone Star Gas Company, a Division of ENSERCH CORPORATION (Lone Star), a public utility under Article 6050 et. seq. V.A.C.S. and Article 1446c V.A.C.S. (Supp. 1982) and files this its Statement of Intent to Change Rates in the environs of the City of Baird, Texas, under the provisions of Section 43 (a) of Article 1446c V.A.C.S (Supp. 1982), Article 6050 et. seq. V.A.C.S. and the Rules thereon of the Gas Utilities Division of the Railroad Commission of Texas, and would show the Commission as follows:

I.

This is a Statement of Intent to change environs rates for the unincorporated areas in the vicinity of Baird, Texas, and contains the same residential rate ordinance dated August 23, 1982. Neither the base rate nor the gas cost adjustment provision proposed in this Statement of Intent will result in cost recovery of more than five percent lost and unaccounted-for gas.

II.

Lone Star proposes to change its rates, and the details of the proposed changes in rates are as follows:

1. Name of Utility-Lone Star Gas Company.
2. Description of Area Affected-Environs of Baird, Texas

3. Proposed Tariffs & Schedules:

A. The following rates are the maximum applicable to residential and commercial consumers per meter per month for any part of a month for which gas service is available at the same location. Summer rates shall be applicable between the meter reading dates in May and October. Winter rates shall be applicable at all other times.

Residential:	Winter	Summer
Customer Charge	\$5.0000	\$5.0000
All Consumption @	3.9249 Per Mcf	3.6749 Per Mcf

If the service period is less than 28 days, the customer charge is \$.1786 times the number of days service.

Commercial:	Winter	Summer

All Consumption @	3.9249	3.6749

If the service period is less than 28 days, the customer charge is \$.2857 times the number of days service.

Bills are due and payable when rendered and must be paid within fifteen days from monthly billing date.

B. Gas Cost Adjustment:

Each monthly bill at the above rates shall be adjusted for gas cost as follows:

- (1) The city gate rate increase or decrease applicable to current billing month residential and commercial sales shall be estimated to the nearest \$.0001 per Mcf based upon:

(a) A volume factor of 1.0526 determined in establishing the above rates for the distribution system as the ratio of adjusted purchased volumes divided by adjusted sales volumes.

(b) The city gate rate estimated to be applicable to volumes purchased during the current calendar month, expressed to the nearest \$.0001 per Mcf (shown below as "Re").

(c) The base city gate rate of \$.31847 per Mcf.

(2) Correction of the estimated adjustment determined by Item 3B (1) above shall be included as part of the adjustment for the second following billing month. The correcting factor (shown below as "C") shall be expressed to the nearest \$.0001 per Mcf. based upon:

- (a) The corrected adjustment amount based upon the

actual city gate rate, less

(b) The estimated adjustment amount billed under Item 3B (1) above, divided by

(c) Distribution system residential and commercial sales Mcf recorded on the Company's books during the prior year for the month that the correction is included as part of the adjustment.

(3) The adjustment determined by Item 3B (1) and Item 3B (2) above shall be multiplied by a tax factor of 1.02631 to include street and alley rental and state occupation tax due to increasing Company revenues under this gas cost adjustment provision.

In summary, the gas cost adjustment (GCA) shall be determined to the nearest \$.0001 per Mcf by Item 3B (1), Item 3B (2), and Item 3B (3) as follows:

Co. Selects Advisory Board, United Names Administrator

County commissioners named a representative from each of the four precincts of Callahan County to set on the Hospital Advisory Board.

United Hospitals officials have named an administrator and director of nurses for hospital to be leased by the firm beginning Friday.

Named to the Advisory Board by the commissioners were Mrs. John D. Montgomery of Cross Plains, Jerry Barron of Baird, Ray Falk of Clyde and Mrs. Walter P. Stephenson of Eula.

The board will be responsible for overseeing an escrow account, set up for hospital maintenance and improvements, which will be financed by the \$2,000-a-month lease payments made by United.

Russell Payne, formerly with a chemical company in Odessa, was named hospital administrator and Betty Alridge, who was director of nurses from 1979 until last year, has been named the new director of nurses.

The hospital will be known as Callahan Memorial Hospital.

Utility Assistance Available To Low-Income Families

Low-income Texans faced with home energy cut-off for heating or cooling may qualify for payments from \$3 million in federal funds set aside for energy crisis intervention (ECI), according to the Texas Department of Human Resources.

The money, made available to Texas counties, will be distributed to energy suppliers on behalf of eligible households.

One payment is allowed each household between October 1 and March 31. Another payment is allowed between April 1 and September 30. A maximum of \$90 per period can be paid if the household applies and is found eligible.

Officials at DHR explained that once the fund is exhausted, no further payments can be made.

The department has negotiated contracts with local agencies to handle outreach, applications, eligibility determination, and payments to energy suppliers.

Qualification for ECI payments is limited to households with a total gross monthly income of less than \$305.50 for a one-person household; \$499.50 for a two-person household; \$684.50 for three; \$845.50 for four; \$998.50 for five; and \$1,166.50 for six.

At least one person in the household must be a U.S. citizen or a legally admitted alien. If a household's past due energy bill exceeds \$90, and funds from other sources are not

available, the household

might not qualify for ECI help. The goal of ECI, officials emphasized, is to maintain the flow of energy to the household.

Discharge papers, marriage certificates or child custody evidence should be secured from fire, theft or loss, as well as government and commercial life insurance policies, and VA correspondence with identifying claim numbers, social security numbers, wills and—where applicable—naturalization papers.

The VA reminds potential beneficiaries that they should be aware of survivors' benefits which may include VA pensions, dependency and indemnity compensation for service-connected death, burial benefits and interment in a national cemetery for the veteran and his or her dependents.

The few minutes spent by the veteran in organizing and protecting his or her documents—and informing the family or their whereabouts—can do much to avoid needless anguish during times of emotional stress.

Veterans should also alert their families through veterans' service organizations or by calling the Waco VA Regional Office toll-free number listed in your telephone directory.

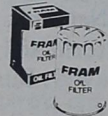
