All six phases of construction have been completed with the exception of some work on the treatment plant. However, Beecher stated, "We could get started if we had the water.

Presently the authority has a permit from the Texas Water Development Board to Knox City, who has been impound water at an elevation employed by the United of 1,331 feet, but an addi-States Department of Agri- tional permit would allow raising the water level to 1,337 feet.

With 1,331 feet, the reservoir should contain enough water to last the four member towns through a seven-year drought. The 1,337 foot level would take care of an additional four towns.

If more than the additional four towns were added to the authority, a new permit would have to be obtained to raise the spillway level. Beecher

The present water treatment plant is also capable of handling more than the four towns which make up the authority.

At present, persons in the four towns consume approximately 2,200,000 gallons of water per day and the treatment plant can handle 3.5 million to 4 million gallons per day, Beecher said.

The cost of water to other towns is not known at this time, but Beecher hopes to know before Monday's meet-







A five-month geodetic survey of more than 760 miles is being conducted in 30 counties of New Mexico and Texas, it was announced today by the Commerce Department's National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.

The survey, estimated to cost \$200,000 is being carried out by NOAA's National Geodetic Survey

A geodetic survey is a survey which provides the basis for all forms of mapping; for the development of natural resources and large engineering projects; including the alignment of

highways and buried water and sewage lines and electrical conduits; and for the construction of bridges, dams, tunnels and nuclear

plants. The monitoring of the earth's movement at nuclear plant sites by geodetic surveys is essential to the selection of stable land sites. Geodetic surveys also provide the basis for determining land boundaries and establishing accurate tax apportionment. The measurements take into consideration the curvature of the earth.

The field parties will conduct the survey in eight different areas of New Texas. Mexico and establishing over 90 geographic positions of latitude and longitude every eight to ten miles.

On 18-man surverving team, neaded by Ivan R. Crabbe, of Lewiston, Idaho, will work Areas 1 through which will cover portions of Knox, Haskell, Jones, Throckmorton, Stonewall, Baylor , Archer , Clay, Young, Stephens, Hamilton, and Atascosa Counties, Texas.

The surveys are designed to fill gaps in the existing distances. This network along with a similar network of elevations, provides the basis for all accurate land measurements. The surveys will provide geographic positions that will be used as accurate starting data for mapping natural resources for alignment of highways and public utilities and for land boundaries. The networks are maintained by the National Geodetic Survey

The surveying crews will conduct operations from atop the towers, using high precision instruments, including those employing laser light beams. Accuracy of measurements will be increased by working at night, when atmospheric disturbance is at minimum. Distance will be determined by computing the time taken by a laser light pulse to travel to a set of mirrors at another site and return.

Preliminary field work to plan the project began in mid-August. This phase is being carried out in Areas 1 through 4 by surveying

technician Charles Lesley. The preliminary field work in Areas 5 through 8 is being conducted by surveying technician Wesley O. Means. The task involves selecting sites to be surveyed, securing landowners' permission for establishing the sites and computing the height of the portable





Protect Land To Prevent Erosion

If you can see signs of erosion on cultivated land, you are probably losing soil at the rate of more than 14 tons per acre per year.

"A loss this high shows that the land is inadequately protected," Arche Lieb, Soil Conservation Service District Conservationist, says. "Generally, losses much higher than this occur when rain or wind can strike bare cropland. Very steep unprotected land can lose more than 300 tons of soil per acre per year."

"It is not particularly important that the farmer or gardner is able to tell how many tons of soil is lost," Lieb continued. SCS conservationists can figure this for those who really want a good estimate. The important thing is that if the farmer and gardner can see erosion -something needs to be done,

"A common misconception is to blame all visible water erosion on running water. which we call runoff." Lieb said. "Runoff does cut ditches and rills, but is generally a sign of advanced problems, which actually start with raindrops striking bare soil. You can prove this to yourself by observing bare soil in a small blower box or enclosure. Beating raindrops will actually erode the surface of the soil by splash action with no runoff at all. On the other hand, if you cover the box of soil with clippings, or plant it thickly with grass, no measurable splash erosion will occur. What this tells us is that a cover on the cultivaled and either vegetation or a mulch, is the best soil

There are several things that farmers and gardners can do about erosion," Lieb said. First, practices can be used that keep a cover on the land. Believe it or not, this can be done even in fields of sorghum, cotton, small grain, or Guar with a practice called minimum tillage.

"Contouring, crop rotation, terracing, and other methods are also helpful to keep runoff from carrying sediment from the field." Lieb said.

"For the gardner, a compost heap is a good investment in soil erosion control." Lieb said. "Just build a big box of old boards or wire fence in a shady place in your back yard and put all your leaves, grass clippings, and organic waste in it. Over time, nature will transform this material into excellent organic fertilizer. Mixed into the garden, compost will make the soil more spongy. It will absorb and hold more water. Used as a surface mulch, it will prevent water erosion.

Home gardeners can also use farm-tested practices. Contouring rows and using terraces in a home garden shortens the slope and reduces erosion. The contoured rows capture the soil particles that the raindrops knock loose from the surface. Rotations, moving plants around in the garden, can serve as a conservation practice and will also reduce disease. And there are edible plants such as turnip greens that can be used as a protective winter cover crop.

"For the farmer, reduction of erosion starts with wise land use planning." Lieb said. "A conservation plan utilizing up-to-date conservation methods is the farmer's best bet for full production and income over the long term with the smallest lost of his basic soil resource."

Conservation planning assistance is available. Cost

sharing assistance is also available on many practices through the Great Plains Conservation Program or Rural Environmental Assistance Program.
