## Local Water Supply Plentiful; City Dads Announce Rate Increase

### Brush Killing Being Demonstrated Near Truscott

About two acres of brush on the Taylor farm at Truscott has been sprayed to determine the value of basal spraying of mesquite and other undesirable range plants, according to W. C. Pallmeyer, Knox County agricultural agent.

A mixture of 1 part 2-4-5T and 5 parts kerosene was applied to the mesquite, prickly pear, three species of cactus, and bear grass by Pallmeyer and Felix Taylor on June 16. The area will be inspected at later dates to determine the degree of kill.

It is hoped that the basal spray can be used in areas where aerial spraying is prohibited, and that it may be used for fence rows and small plots of brush, Pallmeyer said.

In the basal spray method, only the bottom 12 inches of the plant is sprayed, similar to the old method of mesquite control with kerosene.

Results of the demonstration will be given at a later date, and the people of Knox County are invited to stop by and inspect the plot, Pallmeyer said.

## Citizens Asked to Express Views on Agriculture and Livestock Program

Citizens of Colorado and Texas are being asked to express their views as to the agricultural program this week through publication of a ballot in their weekly papers, and in Texas, the editors of the home town papers are helping in the survey.

The secret ballot, which need not be signed, is being carried in this edition of the Herald. The reason for the poll is the apparent differences of opinion between some organized groups and the rank and file producers who say that statements of a few members of these organizations do not reflect the true feelings of the majority of the livestock producers and farmers.

While many other Texas towns are suffering serious water shortages and their citizens are being asked to conserve dwindling supplies, Knox Citizens have a bountiful supply of water, plus ample storage facilities and pumping capacity, Mayor G. T. Glenn reported this week.

Last summer's low pressure during mid-afternoon of the summer months was caused by a lack of sufficient storage, Mayor Glenn said. Since that time the new well and reservoir have been put in operation, and no low-pressure periods are anticipated this year.

In addition to the regular service to Knox Citizens, the city is furnishing about two carloads of water a day to Benjamin, furnishing Truscott with drinking water, and at present is supplying water for five oil wells.

Along with the good news that local residents need fear no water shortage, Mayor Glenn announced that the city commission approved an increase in water rates June 2. The measure was declared an emergency and the raise was made effective immediately, and will show up on the water bills for this month.

The minimum was lowered from 5,000 to 3,000 gallons, while the minimum charge remains at \$1.50. However, on all consumption over the minimum the charge was raised from 20 cents to 25 cents a thousand gallons.

On the first 5,000 gallons of water used by any customer, the mayor pointed out, the hike will mean an increase of only 50 cents.

"The water rate has remained the same for many years," Glenn said, "while the cost of servicing and maintaining the system has continually increased."

The increase was made necessary, he added, by the fact that the pipe in the entire system has deteriorated. "We have discovered," he said, "that when a line goes bad, we almost invariably have to replace the entire pipe to the main."

### BAPTISTS TO HAVE SPECIAL SUNDAY SERVICE

The Sunday morning service at the Baptist Church has been designated as "Bible Sunday," it was announced this week by the pastor, Rev. E. V. Becker.

Special emphasis will be placed on the Bible throughout the morning service, Rev. Becker said. Each person attending Sunday School was asked to bring his Bible, and more than 300 Bibles are expected, the pastor said.

The sermon subject for the morning worship service will be "My Bible."

## O'Brien Couple Injured When Car Is Struck by Train

William Smart, 60, and his wife, 55, were injured Monday when a southbound Santa Fe passenger train struck their 1939 model car at a crossing in O'Brien. The accident occurred between 6:30 and 7 p. m.

The Smarts were enroute to church services in Knox City. According to reports, the brakes failed to hold and Mr. Smart was unable to stop the car. They were hospitalized in the Knox County Hospital.

Mr. Smart suffered six broken ribs, cuts on the face and legs, and bruises on both hands. Mrs. Smart suffered severe shock and a leg injury. The car was demolished.

## 798,000 Bushels Wheat Harvested In Knox County

The 1953 wheat crop in Knox County totaled approximately 798,000 bushels, according to figures compiled this week by County Agent Bill Pallmeyer.

The figure includes all grain purchased by dealers in the county, plus approximately 50,000 bushels stored on farms in the county. While some grain was sold in adjoining counties, local dealers purchased enough from other counties to balance the total, Pallmeyer believes.

Total acreage seeded in the county was 81,000. Part of this acreage was abandoned, and it is estimated about 65,000 acres or more were cut.

Best yield reported was on the Roscoe Partridge farm, in the Sunset community. Mr. Partridge harvested 48 bushels per acre from 32 acres of a 50-acre field, while the entire field averaged 44 bushels per acre.

In general, Pallmeyer said, the best yields were in the southeastern part of the county, around Vera and Goree.

In the Gilliland-Truscott communities, normally the best wheat area in the county, only 112,000 bushels were harvested. Normal production in the area is 300,000 or 400,000.

The colorful show will hold the interest of all ages. Music will be furnished by the world-famous Hardin-Simmons Cowboy Band, and several Gainesville Circus acts will be featured. There will also be a parade of old time vehicles, including a miniature stagecoach, drawn by Shetland ponies. A number of ranch scenes, square dancing and novelty numbers will round out the show.

Final event in the evening's entertainment will be a Bathing Beauty Contest, with contestants judged on the basis of beauty, personality and poise. Officiating at the final rites was Rev. Harrison Woolard, pastor of the First Christian Church in Abilene, assisted by Rev. G. N. Goldston, pastor of the First Christian Church of San Angelo.

Survivors are a daughter, Mrs. S. P. Hannegan of Abilene; four sons, Charles E. Coombes, Jr., of San Angelo, Joe of Odessa, Jerry of Boulder City, Nev., and Zach of Stamford; and two granddaughters.

Judge Coombes, who held many public offices in West Texas, ranging from deputy clerk of Knox County to mayor of Abilene, was known as a gifted speaker. He was closely identified with many civic projects, particularly the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and the Texas Cowboy Reunion.

Judge Hill passed away in the Knox County Hospital at 5:20 p. m. Tuesday, June 23. He underwent major surgery in a Dallas hospital May 1, and was recuperating at home until his condition became worse about two weeks ago. He was then admitted to the local hospital.

John Franklin Hill was born April 10, 1892 in Oxford, Miss., and came to Texas with his parents when he was four years of age. On February 28, 1912 he married Miss Doshia Smith at Gibtown, in Jack County, and the couple came to Knox County in 1921. They lived in Goree, where they were in the cafe business, for a number of years before moving to Benjamin in 1946.

Mr. Hill became deputy sheriff of Knox County in 1946, a position he held until elected to the office of county judge in November of last year.

He was a member of the Friendship Baptist Church at Hefner, and a member of the Masonic Lodge.

Survivors are the wife of Benjamin; two daughters, Mrs. Cecil McGraw of Wylie and Mrs. Jack Coy of Dalhart; two grandchildren; a brother, Ed Hill of Gibtown; and three sisters, Mrs. M. B. Knox of Amarillo, Mrs. Walter Barron of Arp, Texas, and Mrs. Dan Newsom of Marlow, Okla.

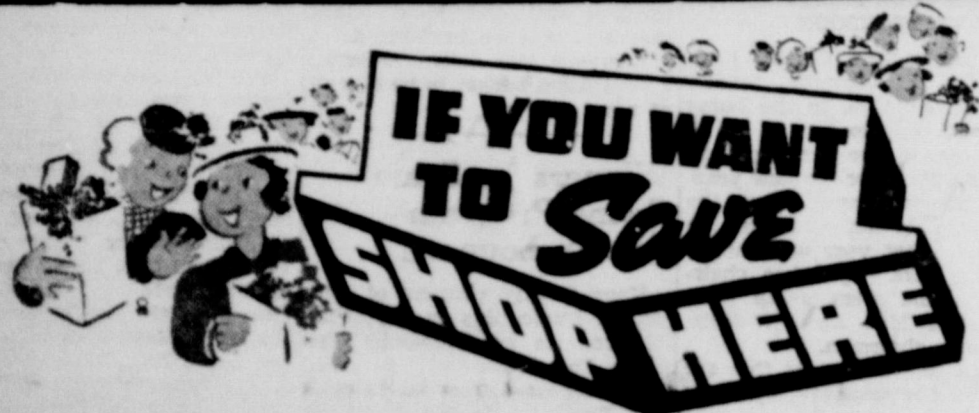

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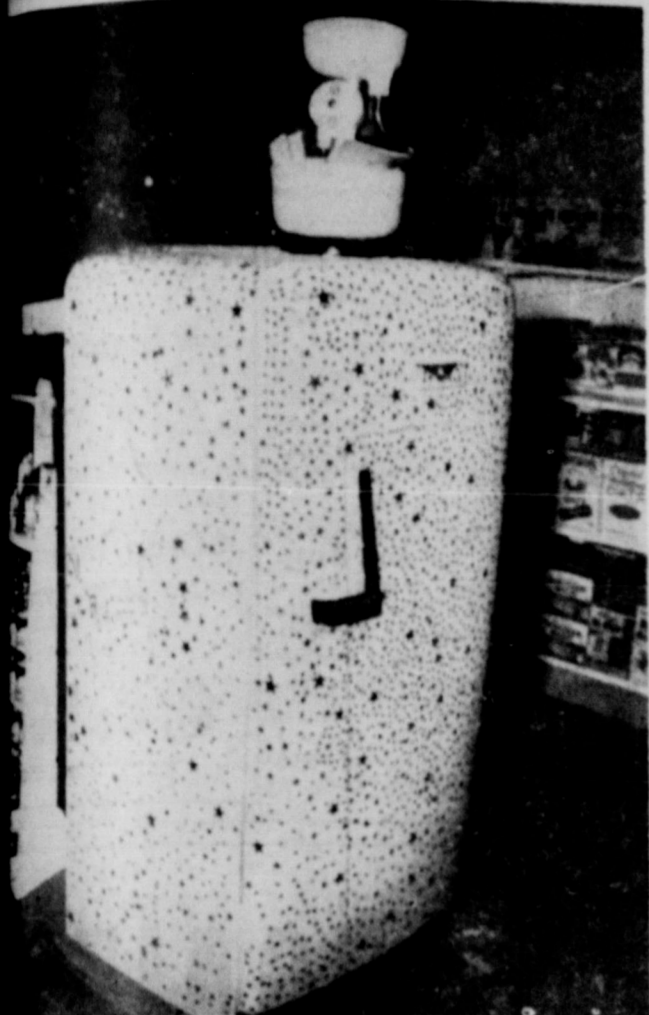

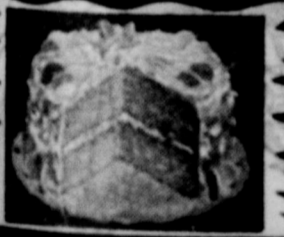
