Best yield reported was on the acre from 32 acres of a 50-acre field, while the entire field averaged 44 bushels per acre.

In general, Pallmeyer said, best yields were in the southeastern part of the county, around Vera and Goree.

In the Gilliland-Truscott communities, normally the best wheat area in the county, only 112,000 bushels were harvested. Normal production in the area is 300,000 or 400,000.


