

### Half Dollars Still Short

WASHINGTON-It's undoubtedly been a long time since you've received a half-dollar in charge. And a Treasury Department official said Thursday it will probably be early next year before the supply will be large enough to permit normal circulation of the coins.

Despite record and near-record production of halves, they have failed to find their way into commercial channels mainly because they are being saved as mementoes of the late President John F. Kennedy, Treasury officials believe.

Since 1964, all half-dollars placed in circulation have borne all likeness of the assassinated president. Many have been taken overseas, also as souvenirs and mementoes.

Robert A. Wallace, assistant secretary of the Treasury whose jurisdiction includes the U.S. Mint, said the overseas movement of the Kennedy halves has apparently stopped but they are still scarce.

He expects them to circulate more freely once Americans realize they will be the coin of the realm for the next 25 years and there's little need to collect






