

The corporation was orga nized to assure the provision of a clinic and housing for the incoming physician, Dr. W.F. Thompson, who will begin practice here July 15.

Lee Smith explained to the group that several Knox City men were purchasing the clinic from Dr. R.G. Howell and Associates and that persons did not have to be concerned with financing this project. What the corporation is vitally concerned and interested in is soliciting donations from families served by the Knox County Hospital and the clinic for the purpose of paying the doctor's house rent for one year, the rent on the clinic building for one year, and the moving expenses of the new doctor and his family. Other expenses will include taxes, insurance, and

Stock producer for the rodeo is Runt Sloan of Newcastle. Sloan is well-known throughout the Big Country as he produces numerous rodeos in this area, including the annual Abilene Junior Rodeo held in the Taylor Coliseum each County January.

Bill Dennis of Stamford will be the rodeo announcer.

There will be two age divisions, with all-around cowboy and all-around cowgirl belt buckles being awarded in each age division. These titles will be determined by the amount of money won. Age divisions are 14 and under and 15 through 19

Rodeo events will include barrel racing, pole bending, flag racing, girl's goat tying, rescue racing, break-a-way, tiedown, and ribbon roping, bareback and bull riding, and chute dogging.

She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Baker of Knox City.



### **Rehab Center In Need Of More Equipment** West Texas Rehabilitation

Center has been successful in its two-month drive to replenish its equipment stock but needs more help to help the handicapped persons who often cannot afford expensive wheelchairs and other necessary items

James McBryde, shop supervisor at the 4601 Hartford Center in Abilene, said the drive has resulted in a hydraulic lift, six wheelchairs and a number of walkers and crutches being donated.

"We were about to the point of having to turn people away." McBryde said.

The Center now has close to 50 wheelchairs being used free of charge by handicapped persons who would not be able to afford to buy their

equipment still in use is getting old and wearing out. An adult's wheelchair typically costs from \$400 to \$500. Although many Big Country residents have received the benefit of the equipment. Abilenians have contributed most of the equipment in this drive, with the only donations outside the city coming from







Dr. Dale A. Lovelace, Area Extension Agronomist from Vernon discussed each of the varieties, presenting information on origin, quality and maturity range

Dr. Robert W. Berry, Area **Extension Plant Pathologist** pointed out that many varieties were showing medium to heavy leaf rust infestation and that some head smut was evident in a few varieties. He stressed the importance of not keeping seed wheat from a field where smut is very noticeable unless you plan to treat the seed before planting. The infection will spread to nearby heads causing an increase of the problem the following year. Root rot or many times referred to as foot rot is a problem in many fields where wheat is planted a fews years in succession and crop rotation aids with this


