A water quality study of the Seymour Aquifer north of Abilene, being conducted for the Texas Water Quality Board to find out the extent and severity of salt pollution in the aquifer and the causes of high nitrates in the water, has started in the Knox City, O'Brien, Rochester, and Jud areas where sampling of water wells is being accomplished by the ground-water consulting firm of Rollin W. Goodson, all of Knox City. A weekend revival has been scheduled by the Gillespie Baptists for Saturday and Sunday, May 15 and 16. The Saturday night service will begin at 8:30 o'clock while Sunday services will include Sunday School at 9:45 a.m. followed by the morning worship service at 11:00 o'clock. The Rev. Foster Smith, Gillespie pastor, will be moderating each of the sessions. The public is invited to join the Gillespie fellowship in worship, led by Bro. Boggs. Sunday noon, a "dinner on the grounds" is also being planned with an invitation to all to attend. The Suffolk Baptist Church of Sedge Fen, England began in November, 1965, when four American military families stationed in the Lakenheath, England, area gathered in the home of James Dickerson, a military lay preacher. In Assisting Doctor

Group Hears How Money To Be Used

Approximately 60 persons were on hand Tuesday night in the basement of the former Baptist Church building to hear a report from the committee of the recently-formed corporation, the Brazos Valley Health Resources, Inc. The corporation was organized to assure the provision of a clinic and housing for the incoming physician, Dr. W.F. Thompson, who will begin practice here July 15. Lee Smith explained to the group that several Knox City men were purchasing the clinic from Dr. R.G. Howell and Associates and that persons did not have to be concerned with financing this project. What the corporation is vitally concerned and interested in is soliciting donations from families served by the Knox County Hospital and the clinic for the purpose of paying the doctor's house rent for one year, the rent on the clinic building for one year, and the moving expenses of the new doctor and his family. Other expenses will include taxes, insurance, and maintenance. Those attending were assured that the new doctor had not asked for, nor received a guarantee to come here. The charter recently applied for by the corporation has been approved by the Secretary of State and the steering committee will meet again tonight (Thursday) to formally adopt the by-laws and constitution. Permanent officers will be elected at this time, also.

Lee Smith, A.A. Cox and Mrs. R.A. (Jinx) Shaver III. These 15 directors are working diligently toward collecting funds to finance money needed to provide the community and surrounding areas with a doctor, and will see that these funds are administered solely for this purpose. The committee reported a bare minimum of \$20,000 is needed by Thursday, May 20, and suggested that families of three or four members should try and donate \$300 while individuals might come up with \$120. For those who can pledge more easily than paying the entire amount at one time, pledge forms are available from committee members or from the Citizens State Bank. The signed pledge would give the bank authorization to draw the designated amount from a person's account each month and no interest would be involved. Also, the corporation is designed so that donations are tax deductible. The donations are not refundable; however, each contributor becomes a member of the corporation and is entitled to a vote regardless of the amount donated. It was emphasized that every business and every individual should be concerned and willing to donate without being asked to do so by committee members, so everyone is asked to come forward and help finish up this important project by the May 20 date. It was also brought to light that no doctor has been secured for the time Dr. R.G. Howell closes his practice on May 31 and the time Dr. Thompson begins on July 15. In a telephone conversation with hospital administrator Glen Rumley early Wednesday, it was learned that contacts are still being made in an effort to find a doctor for this interim period. However, if no doctor is available the hospital will close for a period of several weeks, he said.

Registration will begin at 2:00 p.m. Saturday at the school with class meetings, a chance to see and visit old school chums, and also coffee, tea, and refreshments. A short business meeting will be held prior to the 8:00 p.m. Jamboree. Sunday, a catered noon meal consisting of chicken fried steak, baked potato, gravy, salad, green beans, Texas Toast, and pecan delight will be served and officials are hopeful that interested persons will note that the meal will be by advanced reservations only in order that the caterer will know approximately how many plates to prepare. Temi Baker Named WTC Captain

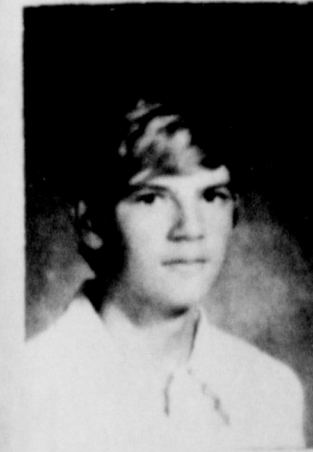

Rehab Center In Need Of More Equipment

West Texas Rehabilitation Center has been successful in its two-month drive to replenish its equipment stock but needs more help to help the handicapped persons who often cannot afford expensive wheelchairs and other necessary items.

James McBryde, shop supervisor at the 4601 Hartford Center in Abilene, said the drive has resulted in a hydraulic lift, six wheelchairs and a number of walkers and crutches being donated.

"We were about to the point of having to turn people away," McBryde said.

The Center now has close to 50 wheelchairs being used free of charge by handicapped persons who would not be able to afford to buy their own.

Included in the gifts, he said, were an electric wheelchair which costs about \$1,000, and a child's wheel-

chair. He said that some of the equipment still in use is getting old and wearing out.

An adult's wheelchair typically costs from \$400 to \$500.

Although many Big Country residents have received the benefit of the equipment, Abileneans have contributed most of the equipment in this drive, with the only donations outside the city coming from Snyder and Hamlin, McBryde said.

"The Center is in particular need of wheelchairs," he said.

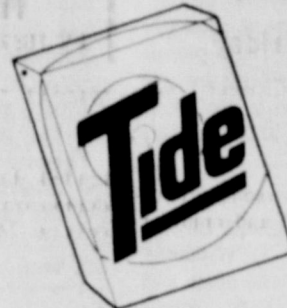

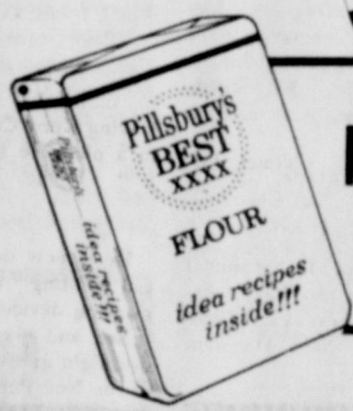
