As you can see, we are very proud of the boys we've helped raise, and everyone one of them has been just as good as we originally thought them to be!

Billy McNelly, Former Rochester Star Athlete, Fatally Burned In Dallas

Billy Vaughn McNelly, 21, was fatally burned in a Dallas explosion Monday. He died in Baylor Hospital at Dallas at 8:15 p.m.

An explosion and fire ripped through an underground tunnel in North Dallas fatally burning McNelly and seriously injuring his cousin, Bill Neely, 21. The two had been fitting pipe connections with a gas welder in the tunnel at North Central Expressway and Valley View at 1:30 p.m. when apparently fumes ignited, sending heat and flames through 50 feet of the passage.

The men were pulled from the tunnel by firemen who entered through a nearby manhole and pulled them out before attacking the blaze.

Police said the men were about

50 ft. from the manhole when rescued. A patrolman said the men, employees of Epoline Co., of Grand Prairie, were using the butane torch to join pipe fittings with a special type of glue. He said the glue apparently ignited.

McNelly had been employed by the Dallas firm 14 months.

Born Jan. 7, 1945, in Knox City, he married Betty Briscoe Ju. 15, 1964, and moved to Fort Worth 18 months ago from Rochester. He was a star football player while attending Rochester High School.

Services were at 3:30 p.m. Wednesday at Rochester High School Auditorium with the Rev. Kenneth Blair of Haskell and Abe Martin, minister of Rochester Church of Christ, officiating.

Burial was in Rochester Cemetery with Smith Funeral Home in charge.

Survivors include his wife; his father, J. C. McNelly of Rochester, his mother, Mrs. Virgie Cammack of Odessa, three brothers, Richard of Rochester, Donnie of Fort Worth and Buddy of Odessa.

Palbearers were members of his high school team, Johnny Fletcher, Don Ballard, Joel Bevel, Royce Speck, Ossie Tibbett and Gayle Holmes.

Niece Of Vaughans Killed In Wreck

AUSTIN — Texas school districts are receiving speedup orders on desegregation.

Integration of faculties, as well as student bodies, is the aim of federal authorities in laying down new guidelines for compliance with the civil rights act of 1964.

Both the Texas Education Agency and the State Board of Education received the policy statements and promptly scheduled meetings over the state to post local school administrators as to the requirements.

Primarily concerned are 600 districts that submitted voluntary desegregation plans to the U.S. Office of Education for the 1965-66 school year to assure that they remained eligible for federal aid. Districts already fully integrated, those whose assurances of compliance have been accepted and those operating under court

desegregation orders are not immediately affected by the revised policies.

U. S. Commissioner of Education Harold Howe II estimates that revisions will result in doubling integration in 11 Southern states.

Guidelines provided that "race, color, or national origin may not be a factor in hiring or assignment of teachers and other professional staff." State Education Agency officials said evidence of compliance with this requirement is expected to be shown by next September.

Districts which have submitted desegregation plans, including those with geographical school attendance zones, must file by April 15, a form agreeing to observe the new guidelines. Office of Education will review spring reports and schools judged to have shown no reasonable progress will be ordered to take further steps be-

fore fall. School systems also must eliminate segregation in such programs as transportation, athletics and extra-curricular activities.

Where faculty members are displaced as a result of desegregation, staff vacancies later occurring must be filled by these ousted teachers if they qualify.

In other action the State Board of Education directed local school districts to raise their contributions to the foundation school program by \$6,100,000 next year. Local fund assessment for 1966-67 is \$138,000,000 compared with \$132,500,000 for 1965-66. Total cost of minimum foundation education program for the state this year is estimated officially at \$649,326,890. Legislature set local school districts' contribution for 1966-67 and thereafter at 20 per cent of the total cost of the preceding year's program. State puts up the other 80 per cent.

Board also approved investment of about \$7 million from the State Permanent School Fund. Some \$3 million will be placed in common stocks, another \$3 million in corporate bonds and an estimated \$1 million in short term Treasury bills.

AG RULINGS — Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr has ruled that a domestic corporation can't pay dividends out of its earned surplus to anyone not a stockholder; and that a life insurance corporation may pay dividends to policyholders from surplus funds — from profits made by the company.

In other action, the attorney general ruled that:

● Under present state law, a Commissioners Court or qualified voters of a county may not create a precinct or multi-precinct Airport District and transfer county-owned airport to such a district.

● Ward County school trustees should be elected April 2 from commissioners precincts as they now exist rather than as they will be formed under the boundary change effective next January 1.

● Texas courts may enforce child support order of out of state courts but extradition should be carried out only after bona fide civil attempts have been made to collect payments.

● Public school - sponsored clubs which perpetuate their membership on the basis of decisions of their own members, rather than free choice of any qualified pupil

are prohibited.

● Jury fees must be paid before a jury is sworn in juvenile cases.

BONDS SOLD — Texas Water Development Board has sold \$15 million worth of development bonds to the First National City Bank of New York City and associates, the low bidders.

Effective interest rate was 3.5 per cent of the 25-year issue.

First National City Bank was one of five bidders for the bonds. This brings to \$85 million the amount sold by the Board from an authorized total of \$200 million. Another \$200 million authorization in water development bonds will be voted upon by Texas in November.

Bond money has been used to finance reservoir projects by the purchase of water storage space, and in the purchase of outstanding development bonds of Texas cities and water districts.

VERNON CENTER LAUDED — A model demonstration center for aged, to be located at Vernon "will be finest of its kind in the nation," says Gov. Connally.

According to the governor, the center will include facilities for all phases of geriatric care. It will provide cottage-type units for ambulatory patients and a pre-admission unit to screen elderly persons considered for admission.

Center will place patients in community rest homes, nursing homes and convalescent centers in which they would receive proper care.

SADLER SPEAKS—Texas Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler, in testimony before a congressional committee in Washington, urged the creation of Guadalupe Mountain National Park in Culberson and Hudspeth Counties.

However, he stated that while he is interested in the creation of the 71,650 acre park, he also is interested in the 45,171 acres of oil and gas rights which the state school fund owns in the proposed park.

According to Sadler, the mineral rights should be retained by the state for the benefit of the 3 million school children aided by the Public Free School Fund, which is financed from mineral rights.

Sadler said the state and federal government should work together as partners in the project. This would mean that Texas and the federal government each would get half the benefits of the mineral deposits in the area.

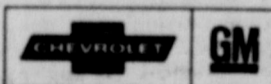

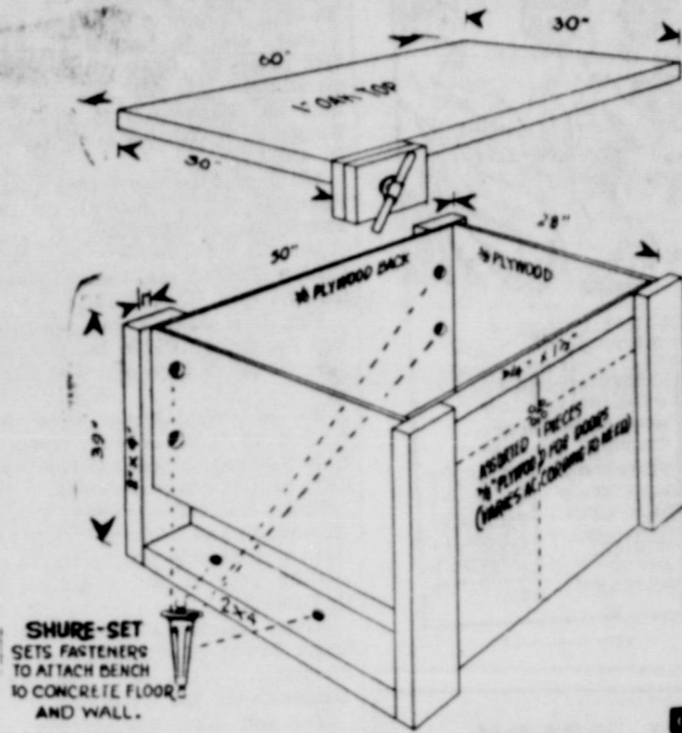

FASTEN AT SPRING NEWS

Build Your Own Workbench



SHURE-SET
SETS FASTENERS
TO ATTACH BENCH
TO CONCRETE FLOOR
AND WALL.

A well-designed workbench is the basic requirement of any home workshop. And few things are as satisfying or as practical as building your own — it's not as difficult as you might think with planning and the proper tools.

Make your bench rugged, and most important, functional. Length and width depend on needs and available working space; 30 x 60 inches is a good size for most small workshops. To reduce stooping, the bench top should be just as high as the top of your hip bone—about 40 inches if you're of average height.

First thing—have the following pieces cut to size:
four legs, 2 x 4 x 39
two horizontal braces, 2 x 4 x 28
bench top, 30 x 60 x 1 inches (oak or maple)
two 3/4" plywood sides, 28 x 29
back, also of 3/4" plywood, 49 1/2 x 29
top bracing strip, 3/4 x 1 1/2 x 49 1/2
assorted pieces of 3/4" plywood for doors and shelves

Construction begins with the frame—where the strength is. Brace each pair of legs at the bottom with a horizontal 2 x 4

cross member, use clamps to align and hold the legs and braces in place while drilling. Before bolting, glue all joints. Result: two solid square "u" supports.

Attach the plywood back to the 2 x 4's—flush with the top—with glue and nails or screws. Then attach the unit directly to the concrete floor and wall to add considerable strength to the bench and eliminate any possible wobbles. This task is quite simple when you use a fastening tool called Shure-Set. This versatile tool will drive steel fasteners through the two 2 x 4 inch horizontal braces into the concrete floor—and through the rear legs into the concrete wall—with the ease of forcing nails through wood. Available at hardware counters, the Shure-Set tool concentrates tremendous force on the fasteners and eliminates drilling—not to mention the cost of togglebolts, shields and plugs necessary with ordinary installation techniques.

Diagonal bracing is achieved by attaching the plywood sides flush with the top of the legs, with glue and nails or screws. Now place the top bracing strip across the front gap between the two "u" supports and screw in place. The simple and strong butt joint can be used in all cases.

The bench top should overhang the lower framework by 2 inches in front and 6 inches at the ends, to let you clamp work to the bench and to provide space for a vise. A pair of 3/4" plywood doors with deep shelves—which swing out to make their contents easily accessible—are fastened with continuous hinges for strength.

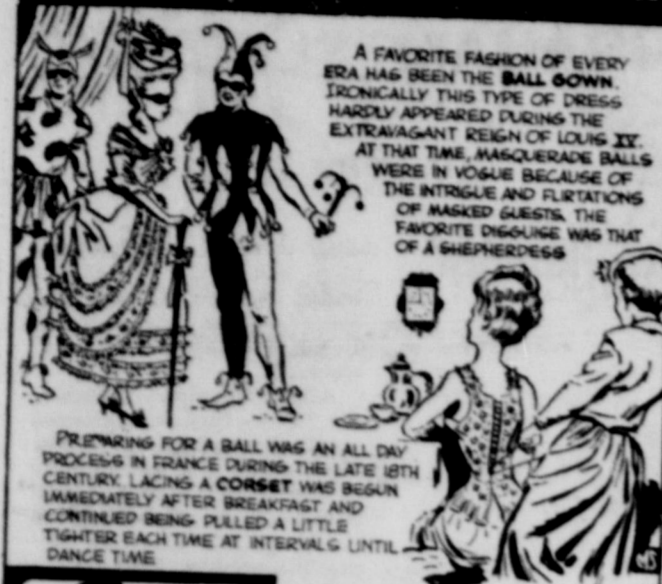

HANDLE WITH CARE

To clean your rugs, a housewife made use of a powerful cleaning fluid. But, working in a closed room, she inhaled so much of the lethal fumes that she died. Was the manufacturer of the cleaning fluid legally liable for her death?

After a court test, the company was indeed held liable—mainly because of a misleading label on the can. The brand name, in large letters, strongly implied that the product was safe to use. As for danger, the only warning was small and inconspicuous.

Damage suits are rising with growing frequency in the field of "product liability." One key issue is the responsibility of a manufacturer to warn the consumer of possible danger.

Sometimes the matter is covered by specific statutory requirements, such as marking poison with a skull and crossbones. But even without any specific requirements, a manufacturer generally has a duty to give warning, when needed, of dangers inherent in his wares.

For, in this age of synthetic and complex products, the consumer is often unable to detect those dangers for himself.

"Such a dependent society," said one judge, "must exact greater care than in more simple days and must require from manufacturers or producers increased integrity and caution as the only protection of its safety and well-being."

Nevertheless, the law will not blame the manufacturer for every mishap in which his product plays a part. He need not warn the consumer of hazards that should be obvious.

For instance, the manufacturer need not place a HANDLE WITH CARE notice on a hammer, just because it can mash your thumb. Or on a needle, just because it can puncture your skin.

Nor is the manufacturer liable if his warning, although properly given, is not properly heeded.

In short, the manufacturer does owe you fair warning of danger. After that it's up to you.

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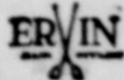

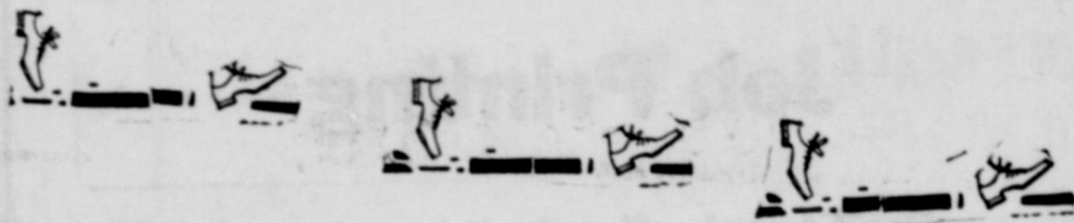

Ex-resident Retires From Air Force

Colonel W. V. Favor, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. W. V. Favor of Quannah and former resident of Knox City, was presented an Air Force Commendation Medal by Major General Frank E. Rouse, SAAMA Commander.

Knox County beef producers are invited to take a tour of the Texas Experimental Ranch located between Seymour and Throckmorton on Friday, March 25. The tour at the ranch begins at 1:30. Anyone interested can be at the ranch at that time or meet at Mitchell's Restaurant at 12 noon.

Dr. Dub Waldrip, Seymour, who is in charge of the ranch, says the four pasture rotation system is really beginning to pay off. He plans to have some of the cattle up for closer inspection.

All Knox County 4-H boys and girls who were 14 or older on January 1, 1966 are eligible to enter the rifle contest Saturday, March 19. The contest will be held on League Ranch just north of the Brazos River Bridge north of Rhineland. Starting time is 8:30 a.m. The contest will be with .22 rifles firing at the standard NRA target at 50 feet. All the boys will have an opportunity to fire the course with the new target rifles just purchased. Each boy will need to bring one box of Long Rifle .22 cartridges. Targets will be furnished.

Guar produced on conserving use acres may be used as a cover crop or harvested as a cash crop. Guar produced on conserving use acres in 1966 can be harvested as a cash crop — this is a change from 1965. Therefore, farmers in some instances may be able to realize a cash crop from their conserving use acres in 1966.

Guar can be produced as a cash crop on acres diverted for payment under the 1966 farm programs for wheat, feed grain and cotton. However, only half of the diversion payment will be paid on the diverted acres devoted to guar to be harvested. A recent ruling by the USDA will be of interest to area farmers planning to produce guar for harvest on diverted acreage. To establish the payment for each farm, the new ruling specifies that substitute crops guar) will be considered to do on feed grain and wheat acreage which is diverted for payment, before any acreage is considered to be on cotton diverted acreage.

This new ruling may make the production of guar on acres diverted for payment more economical since the diversion payment is usually higher for cotton than for wheat or feed grain and, consequently,

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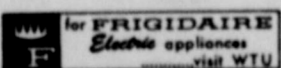


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Seniors Entertained With St. Patrick's Day Dinner Here

Good Management And Reserve Funds Very Essential

Good management and a reserve source of funds for an emergency is essential for any business to prosper, and so it is with Coastal-Bermuda grass reports Wesley Robbins, Soil Conservation Technician working with farmers and ranchers of the Wichita-Brazos Soil Conservation District.

The one thing a person must know before he can understand the reasons behind good Grazing and Hayland Management, is "Mow Grass Grows," when this is fully understood then all reasons fall into place.

Grass plants get only about 5 per cent of their plant food from the soil and the other 95 per cent is taken from the air. Roots gather raw materials; water, nitrates and minerals which are converted into plant food by the leaves. The leaves work as food factories. In the presence of sunshine they combine carbon dioxide, from the air and water, nitrates and minerals from the soil to make plantfood. With this in mind, lets stop and think for a minute—without leaves to manufacture food after a cold winter of dormancy a plant must call on its food reserves stored all winter long in the roots to send up the first green leaves in the spring to start manufacturing plant food in the presence of sunshine.

If undisturbed these first leaves become larger and increase in number. As the grass grows and the tops become larger so does the root system because with the leaves producing more food than is necessary for the growth of the plant then some food can be put back into the root system for expanded growth to gather more raw materials for the food factories in the leaves. If enough food can be produced then some will be returned to the roots and stored to be used during an emergency.

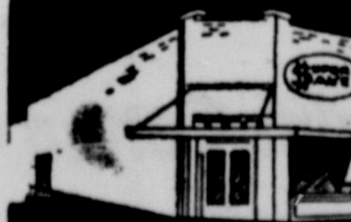

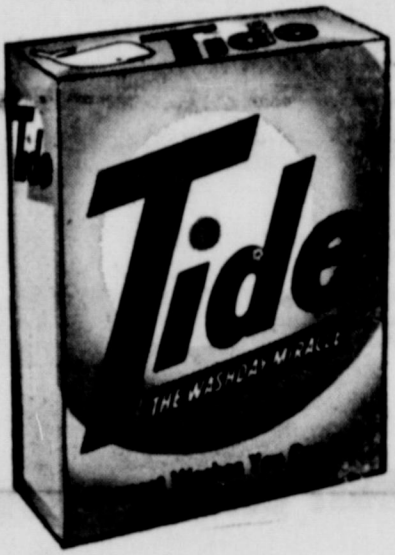
