Win Third and Tournaments

The Houndettes brought home third place trophy from the Slaton tournament Thursday, Friday, and Saturday of last week.

The annual Knox City FFA Junior Livestock Show will be held Saturday, January 4, at the cotton warehouse north of the FFA Ag. Farm at the end of west 4th St. Breeding sheep and fat lambs will be judged beginning at 10 a.m.

After a lunch break, judging will resume with breeding swine, fat barrows and beef.

Livestock show judge will be Don Welch, Vocational Agriculture Instructor of Crowley. Welch is the son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Waldrip.

There will be approximately 100 animals exhibited. This show will be a preliminary show for the Knox County Junior Livestock Show. The County Show will be held the following Friday and Saturday, January 10 and 11, in Knox City.

Trophies and ribbons will be presented to class winners. The individual exhibitor accumulating the highest number of points will receive the Claud Reed Memorial Trophy. Last year's recipient was Kyle White, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jimmy White.

Assisting with the show will be several members of the Knox City Young Farmers Chapter. The Knox City FFA boys will have a concession stand with hot coffee, cold drinks and candy, according to Vocational Agriculture Instructor Leon Burkham.

Adult Classes In Progress

Adult and Continuing Education Classes are in full swing in Haskell, Knox, and Stonewall Counties.

Cotton Report Released By USDA

The USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service Office at Munday, Texas, classed 7,300 cotton samples during the week ending on Friday, December 20, 1974. This brings the season total to 26,000, according to Sidney Ferrell, In-Charge.

Light spotted cotton accounted for seventy-five percent of the cotton classed this week. Grade 42 was predominant with forty-eight percent; grade 32 was sixteen percent; and grade 52 was eleven percent. Seventeen percent of the cotton was white. Grade 41 accounted for twelve percent of the white cotton. Grade 43 accounted for five percent of the spotted cotton. Seven percent of the cotton was reduced in grade because of bark or grass.

Staple 30 continued as the predominant staple length with forty-three percent, followed by staple 31 with thirty-four percent, and staple 32 with eleven percent.

Mike readings remained about the same with ninety-one percent in the 3.5 to 4.9 range, four percent below 3.5, and five percent miking 5.0 or higher.

Local market activity remains very slow. Prices dropped from 100 to 400 points, but not enough information was available to quote any average prices.

Doctor bills for October, November, and December may in some cases count toward the \$60 annual deductible for both 1974 and 1975 under the "carry over" provision of Medicare medical insurance, according to Carl Beisner, claims representative from the Vernon social security office.

Medicare medical insurance doesn't pay for the first \$60 in covered medical expenses in a calendar year. "But people who haven't had covered expenses over \$60 before October should be sure to send in all the bills for covered services they receive in October, November, and December," Beisner said. "Any expenses you have during the last three months of the year can also be counted toward the deductible for the next year," he said.

The carry over rule helps people who might otherwise have to pay the \$60 deductible twice in a short period of time-at the end of one year and at the beginning of the next year, Beisner explained.

Bills for covered medical services should be attached to a filled-out Request for Medicare Payment form and sent to Medicare, Group Medical and Surgical Service, P.O. Box 22147, Dallas, Texas 75222. Requests for Medicare Payment forms are available at any social security

The medical insurance is the voluntary part of Medicare, funded by individual premiums and Federal general revenues. Cousins Take Two Five Point Bucks

Cousins Shane Johnston and Jodie McGaughey brought home a pair of five point bucks taken in the same canyon within a two minute time span Monday morning of last week near Ozona. The bucks were the first antlered deer either of them had ever killed.

The boys, accompanied by their fathers, had circled two large fingers of land with a canyon between and had apparently driven the deer ahead of them into the mouth of the canyon. Jodie's buck ran within twenty yards of him and was felled by a bullet which splintered the jawbone, front leg, and rib cage. A heavy fog had made the four power scopes mounted on each rifle useless until that time.

year in tiny rural one-room schools. Mr. Robbins said he was one of the lucky ones; he attended a "seminary" for two years.

He farmed until he was 28, then went into the general merchandising business for three years. The lure of new opportunities apparently proved too much to resist and he came to Haskell, Texas in 1901. He worked for a time as a bookkeeper.

In 1912 he worked in a small bank in Weinert, Texas, but in January, 1913 moved to Walnut Springs in Bosque County.

Banking proved to be his life. For some 31 years, from 1925 to 1943 he served as an officer in the Citizens State Bank in Knox City, Texas, and eventually became president. He still maintains a keen interest in fiscal and banking matters and is amazingly well informed.

After his retirement in 1943 he went back to farming where he remained until his age forced him into another "retirement." He came to Gladewater in 1969 and made his home with his daughter, Mrs. Sumpter Reed.

Married in January, 1914, his wife of 57 years died in 1971.

Although he is almost blind and slightly hard of hearing, Mr. Robbins said he has spent only six days in a hospital and has never had any surgery. He said he has always enjoyed perfect health.

He takes most of today's technological advances in stride but pointed out that he has never been in an airplane.

At an age when most people in their nineties are content to simply sit back and let the world go by without taking any close looks, Mr. Robbins is an avid listener to the news and events shaping the world. He keeps up by

listening to his radio and a special video sound track set. His eyesight is not good enough to watch the TV screen but he is an avid "fan" of the news programs on the tube.

Through the free talking book service he receives recordings of news magazines and books. He listens carefully and can discuss most current events intelligently and at length.

His opinions on modern life and living are sometimes a bit on the wry but thoughtful side.

setting up of His Kingdom on this earth."

He describes himself as an independent voter and said he has always taken an interest in politics.

When asked about his philosophy of life, Mr. Robbins thought for a long moment and replied: "I suppose no one is satisfied with their life. I would try to do it better but I would do the same. I have no complaints."

He said senior citizens "should have an active interest in life and living comfort."

He indirectly attributed his longevity and zest for life to his labors. "My main objective has been to work and be honest."

Having lived almost a century, Mr. Robbins can speak with authority about the era which he considers best. "The best time I can recall having lived was from 1890 to 1910. The conditions were as stable then as at any time in my lifetime."

Mr. Robbins is perhaps living proof of the values that brought greatness and power to America. He combines the simple dignity of an elder statesman and devout humility carved by a long lifetime of hard work. He is an exceptional man.

Perhaps his most devastatingly accurate comment was on present life and times in the U.S.:

"There is too much money and too little work."

On where the present economic trend began: "I think our present troubles started with the election of President Franklin D. Roosevelt in 1932."

On morals today: "Our moral standards are deteriorating. The ultimate cure for conditions as they are for the world is the second coming of Christ and the

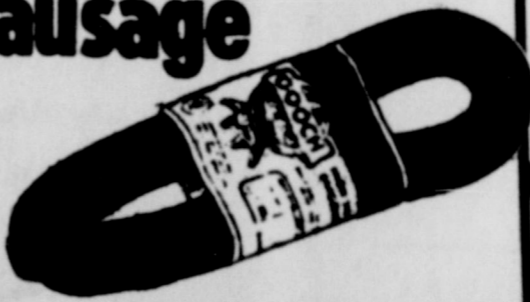

The middle Davis will study is the most complex organism that lives in the Antarctic area, he said. It has large chromosomes which make study of the insect practical.

"The polar regions have often been described as 'simple' ecological systems although a better terminology might be to call these 'low species diversity systems,'" Dr. Atchley said.

"Few of the previous studies on polar organisms have seriously approached the problem of what the underlying causes are for low species diversity.

"In the Arctic, most workers refer to a 'harsh' or 'strenuous' environment and only superficially discuss whether low diversity results from environmental severity, unpredictability or both. Rigorous studies to answer this question in Antarctica are non-existent."

Atchley said the overall significance of this study will be that it is the first attempt to integrate research findings into a comprehensive view of an adaptive strategy in an Antarctic organism.

Davis will spend three and one-half months in the Antarctic. He will arrive in late December and return in late March or April. The Texas Tech biologist spent a winter there in 1970-71 so the area and the environment are not new to him.

Tech's portion of the research is supported by an \$18,000 grant from the National Science Foundation, Atchley said.

In addition to his contribution toward research financed by the National Science Foundation, Davis also expects to collect information to be used to prepare his dissertation under the direction and supervision of Dr. William R. Atchley, associate professor of biology and statistics at Texas Tech.

Davis said genetic basis of adaptation in polar insects has been studied in Arctic organisms; but little critical data is available for Antarctic organisms.

Genetic studies will be undertaken to examine the extent of chromosomal change and its possible relation to environmental variation and the possible occurrence of organisms "facultative parthenogenesis," which

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
