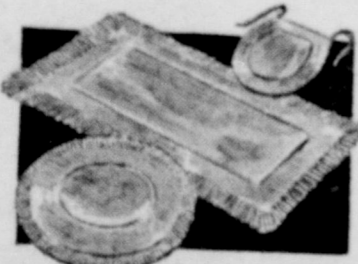
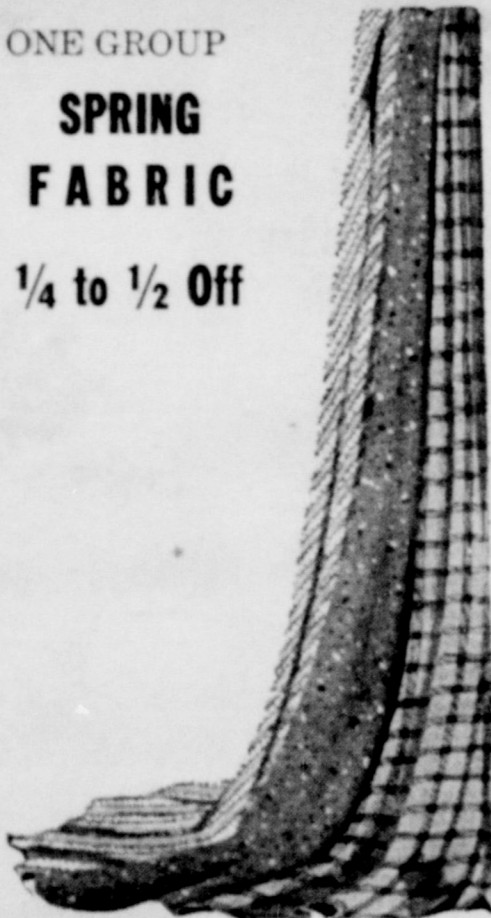

Crawford Takes Part In Operation

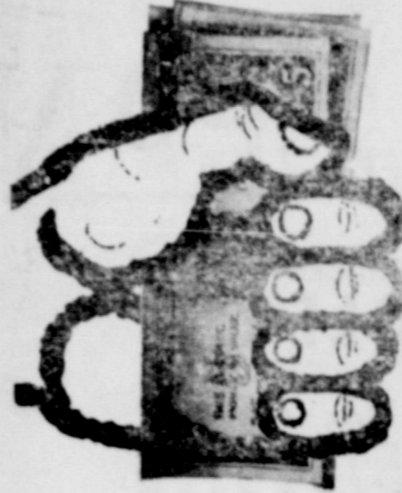

Being newcomers to this area, we inquired around town as to who would be a good representation of the farmers around Knox City and so we came across Park Woodward, Mr. and Mrs. Woodward live three miles southeast of Knox City and Woodward has farmed this same place for the last 35 years. He and his brothers own the farm and it is familiarly known as the Woodward brothers farm.

Before moving to their present location, Park lived north of Knox City for several years on the old Woolley place.

Asked why he hadn't started planting yet, Woodward declared that it had been too cold and that he was waiting for the weather to warm up. "A lot of people have already planted several times and I am trying to get by with one planting, if I can." He said he always waited until May before planting, or at least as close to May as weather and conditions would allow.

With all the modern facilities of machinery, medicine, atomic power and all the other things that go into making the world so smart and so far advanced, farming is still a matter of personal opinion as to when to plant and when to do this and when to do that. As a number of farmers will tell you—"It is one of the biggest gambles in the world, but it is also one of the most rewarding."

With our population increasing by the minute, and the farmers moving to the cities for "town jobs," it is our personal opinion that some day not too far distant, we will either have to go back to the farm, or plan a big garden to sustain ourselves.
