BANKER AND KNOX COUNTY PIONEER DIES IN THIS CITY.

Expressions of sincere regrets were heard from everyone last Friday evening when news of the demise of C. A. Benedict quickly spread over the city and community. Mr. Benedict had suffered somewhat from general impaired health through the recent months but after a minor operation at the sanitarium was sufficiently improved to be removed to the residence of his brother W. H. Benedict, with which family he had always made his home. Hopes were entertained for his recovery but soon unconquerable complications arose and at 9:30 o'clock on the evening of Jan. 25th his life came to a peaceful close. Deceased was 74 years 6 months and 5 days of age and had been a citizen of Knox Prairie since 1886. He had not only been a witness to the development of this fine section of country but had had an active part in its progress throughout the 43 years of his residence here. Mr. Benedict soon acquired holdings after locating here and as the years went by higher values accompanied the development of the west and later railways and townsites contributed largely to the enhancement of the land and city property, placing him in a most fortunate circumstance and one which he ardently employed in the advancement of Knox City's growth and benefaction of friends. Upon the organization of the First National Bank in 1905 he became a charter member and a director of that institution and later served as its vice-president for a number of years and at the time of his death was chairman of the board of directors. It was largely through his safe council that many important economic questions in the welfare of our early community life and problems were solved. In bygone years of stress and depression he bore faithfully his portion of responsibility in all matters pertaining to the continuity of our institutions and in aiding the producer to surmount the financial difficulties of those times. Work of a philanthropic nature appealed to him and his response was always cordial and liberal where charity was required. He was never married and so his happy nature and broad sympathies were always available to friends who shared his confidence and

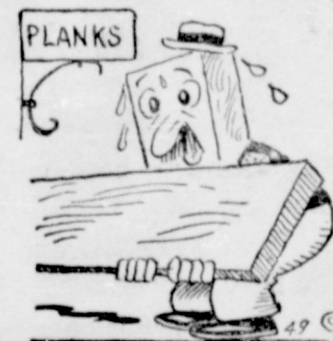

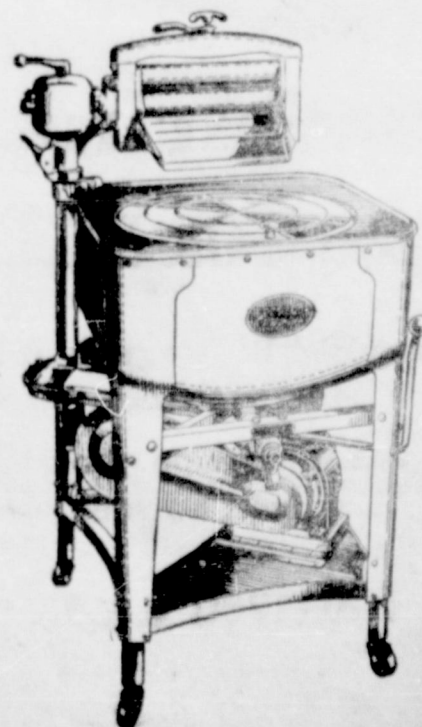

BALANCED RATIONS OF PLANT FOOD BEST FOR FARM CROPS

A balanced ration is best for both human beings and livestock. This fact has been proved by science. Food authorities tell us to use a mixed diet balancing the different kinds of food substances, making sure to obtain sufficient mineral material and vitamins.

Producers of livestock have found that proper feeds must be used in order that their stock may make the most economical gains. The progressive dairymen recognize the necessity of a balanced ration for their cows as a means of obtaining more profitable milk production.

Balanced Rations for Crops

Balanced rations for crops are just as necessary for best growth. It is not difficult to observe when plants in a field are starving to death, and each summer many fields are seen where the plants are dying for lack of plant food. In other fields it is apparent that the crop is receiving plenty of some plant foods but lacks others--an unbalanced ration. A balanced ration would be a fertilizer containing the right proportions of nitrogen, phosphoric acid and potash, according to the Soil Improvement Committee, The National Fertilizer Association.

The progressive dairyman is looking for cows of large capacity, cows that can eat large amounts of feed, for he looks on them as a sort of factory and takes the cheap raw feeds, such as hay, slugs, and grain, and changes them into a more valuable product--milk. As a rule, the more feed a good dairy cow consumes the more milk she will produce, and the more profit she will make for the owner.

The grower of field crops, the cotton grower for example, should look on his cotton crop in much the same way. The cotton plant takes cheap raw materials, which are called plant food, and converts them into much more valuable cotton lint and seed. As a rule, if it is a good variety of cotton, grown under favorable conditions, the more plant food the cotton plants use the more cotton will be produced and the more profit will be made.

Experiments conducted by agricultural authorities in many states, have definitely shown that cotton, and other crops as well, make most vigorous growth and are less likely to be seriously affected by disease when fed liberally with well balanced plant food. Complete commercial fertilizers of various analyses are manufactured to supply balanced rations for crops on different soils. The use of the proper fertilizer will result in a better crop and a more profitable production.
