"By now, most everyone is aware that our very good friend, Dr. R.G. Howell, is closing his practice in Knox City. This we regret very much, because to most of us he has been more than just a doctor. He is a friend with whom you can sit down and talk over your troubles. Our thanks and appreciation to him and his family who have been so patient with all his workload.

our information, a good doctor. In fact he is the only one contacted who did not ask for a guaranteed salary. Now our offer to him was to pay his moving costs, pay the rent on a house for his family to live in for one year, and pay the rent on the Clinic building for one year.

"The search for a doctor to come to Knox City has been going on for some time now, and without success up until now. We feel we are very fortunate to secure a man of Dr. Thompson's ability. Also the doctor believes that he may be able to bring in another doctor to help him in the near future. We hope so.

"All of this is going to take money, but at this point do we have a choice? If our doctors go, so goes the hospital, next the care home, then maybe our drug store,--and the rest of us will be hunting a place to go in case of an emergency.

"Together we can put this financial deal over. All of us can do what a few cannot do. In the near future, each of you will be contacted by someone on the finance committee, and you are asked to please give all you can to help get this doctor established in Knox City.

"We might also mention that the communities joining Knox City are very interested in getting this doctor, and all intend to help out on the finances."

Al Bateman Wins Third

Last weekend in Lubbock, five Knox City thinculds participated in the Region 1-A meet where Memphis picked up 80 points while Paducah had 40 1/2 points.

KC speedster Al Bateman placed third in the 100 yard dash with a time of 9.9 and fourth in the long jump with a 21'6 1/2" leap. He also picked up fifth in the 220 yard dash.

Other participants from Knox City were Jimmy Lynn in the 330 intermediate hurdles, Eddie Martinez in the mile run, and Bill Reynolds and Ricky Bishop in the pole vault division.

During this school year, Bateman set three new school records including the 100 yard dash with a time of 9.8; the 220 yard dash with 22.1; and the long jump with his longest jump measuring 22'3".

Also during this season, Jimmy Lynn tied the high school record of 15.1 in the 120 yard high hurdles.

Near Truscott

Well Completed In Knox County

Second well has been completed in the Truscott, Southwest (Atoka) Field four miles southwest of Truscott in Knox County.

It is R.L. Adkins Corp., Sweetwater, No. 1 Casey, spotting 467 feet from the north and east lines of Section 28, Block 3, D&W Survey.

No. 1 Casey had a daily potential of 147 barrels of oil. Flow was through a 14-64 inch choke with packer set on the casing and 365 pounds tubing pressure.

Production is from perforations at 6,272-80 feet with the 4 1/2-inch casing set at 6,338 feet, total depth.

It is a southwest offset to Cities Service Oil Co. No. 1 Brown, the field opener. KING-Taubert, Steed, Gull & Medders of Wichita Falls completed three wells in the Anne Tandy Field 17 miles southeast of Guthrie. All are on the S.B. Burnett Estate lease.

No. 8-NA Burnett is producing from the Conglomerate. Location is 2,590 feet from the northwest and 1,500 feet from the northeast lines of Section 2, Block X, R.M. Thomson Survey, A-642.

Daily potential was 80 barrels of water. It is pumping from perforations at 5,732-34 feet with the 4 1/2-inch casing set at 5,842 feet, total depth.

No. 9-NA Burnett, located 1,200 feet from the southwest and southeast lines of Section 2, is producing from the Tanehill.

Daily pumping potential was 75 barrels of 36 gravity oil, producing from perforations at 2,632-38 feet. The pay was treated with 1,250 gallons of acid.

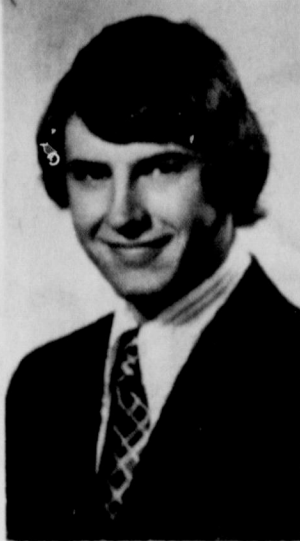

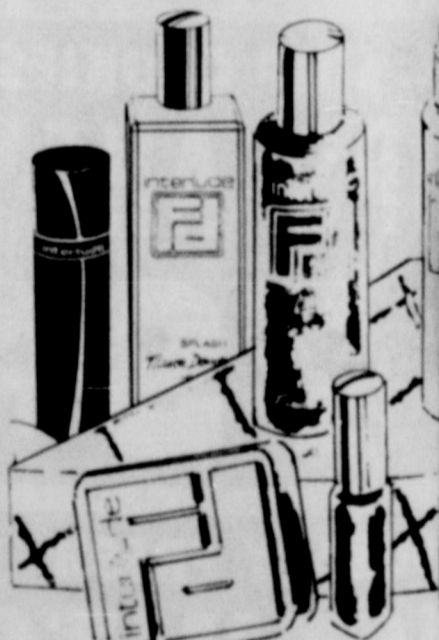

Truscott Bicentennial Coin Sale Continues

All the towns of Knox County will be featured on the bicentennial coin being issued by the Truscott Bicentennial Committee according to Mrs. Virginia Casey, chairman. The farm and ranch community between the Benjamin and Crowell undertook the coin as a local project, but when no other group sponsored a Knox County coin they decided to use one side of the Truscott coin for a Knox County design. Response to the coin has been very good according to the coin chairmen, Mrs. Vivian Brown and Mrs. June Looney. A tentative order was placed in January, but was increased last week due to the unexpectedly large number of orders.

The medal was designed by Michael Hutton, Wichita Falls Jewelry designer, and John Hernandez, also of Hutton's Jewelers, Wichita Falls. Names of Knox County towns circle the edge, separated by stars, and inside this wheat stalks from a miniature mural of past and present symbols of Knox County. In the background are the long flat ridges of Knox County's horizons and centering the design is a sprawling mesquite. A railroad track is included since the coming of the railroads in the first decade of this century were vital to the county's development. The importance of cattle and ranching is emphasized by the cowboy and steer and the use of four brands in the design. These brands are placed in approximation of the directional location from Truscott of the ranches.

The other side of the medal represents the part of Knox County which is "Between the Wichitas", that is between the North and South Wichita Rivers. This includes the Wichita Divide where Truscott and Gilliland are located. The top of the design represents east and the viewpoint is as if one were standing on the west side of the Wichita Divide and looking east to the point where the two rivers join. The brands chosen for the major roles played by these ranches in the development of the land between the Wichitas and include the Masterson Ranch JY, Angus Wynn's Big Four Ranch 4, the Waggoner Ranch Three D, and the Old L Bar of the Wichita and Brazos Stock Company whose owners were among the founding fathers of Knox County. The coins are available in gold-plated silver, silver, brushed silver, and antique bronze. A four coin set in a lucite case is priced at \$104.00; a single gold coin, \$52.00; a single silver coin, \$26.00; brushed silver, \$5.20; antique bronze, \$3.64; and a two coin disk set of the brushed silver and bronze, \$15.60. The sets can be framed in shadow boxes and would be good graduation gifts. This price includes the tax, but one dollar should be added to the total for each mail order. Jewelry in the form of pendants and key chains will be sold in several styles. Collectors are invited to inquire about bidding on the first five four coin sets. 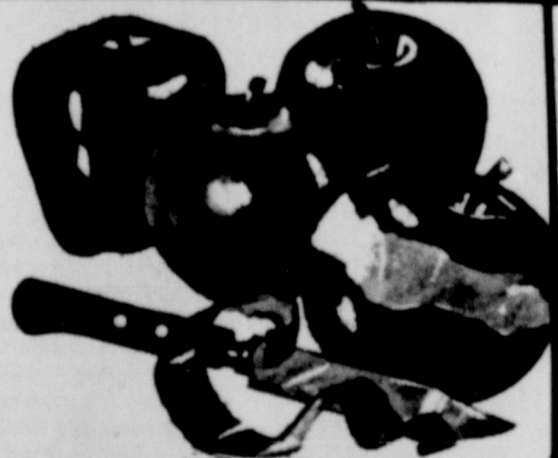
