After the order is received in late May, display will be set up at the Munday and Knox City banks and at the Chamber of Commerce offices in those cities. Order blanks will be available then also.

The medal was designed by Michael Hutton, Wichita Falls Jewelry designer, and John Hernandez, also of Hutton's Jewelers, Wichita Falls. Names of Knox County towns circle the edge, separated by stars, and inside this wheat stalks from a miniature mural of past and present symbols of Knox County. In the background are the long

flat ridges of Knox County's horizons and centering the design is a sprawling mesquite. A railroad track is included since the coming of the railroads in the first decade of this century were vital to the county's development.

The Wichita Valley line arrived in Munday in 1906 and the Orient Railroad at Knox City, Benjamin and Truscott in 1907-08. With a magnifying glass one can see that an engine is approaching from far down the line.
