NAMED FREIGHT TRAFFIC MANAGER OF SANTA FE



PAUL P. HASTINGS

The appointment of Paul P. Hastings as Vice President in charge of traffic for the Santa Fe Railway System Lines, effective March 1, 1938, was announced today by S. T. Bledsoe, president.

Hastings succeeds Fred B. Houghton, who has requested retirement after fifty-three years of continuous service, in which time he rose from telegraph operator at Peoria, Illinois, in 1884, to Vice President in charge of traffic. He earned the reputation of being one of the outstanding traffic authorities of the country. In retiring he carries with him the affectionate regard not only of Santa Fe officers and employees but a host of friends from coast to coast.

Hastings has been in the Santa Fe service since 1891, when he started as rate clerk and then advanced to his present position as Freight Traffic Manager. He has been continuously with the Santa Fe with the exception of two years during the War when railroads were under Federal control and he served as Assistant Director of Traffic, and two years thereafter as a member of the rate committee of the Transcontinental Freight Bureau.

He returned to the Santa Fe service in San Francisco in 1922 as General Freight Agent and on May 1, this year, was named Freight Traffic Manager.

HERALD THIRTY FIVE YEARS OLD LAST WEEK

Last week the Knox County Herald celebrated its thirty fifth year and the present editor did not know anything about it until the paper was printed and mailed.

We do not even know who established the paper and how many editors have been at the helm, but we can call to mind one of the editors who later became famous as a politician and was later speaker of the House of Representatives of the Texas Legislature and was elected from more different districts than any man in Texas. We refer to Lee Satterwhite who now resides in Austin.

No doubt there has been many editors at the masthead of the paper and its name has been changed several times but it has always been able to reach the public during the many years. We suppose that some editors made money while others went broke and went to greener fields.

During these many years the editors have endured many hardships and have witnessed many droughts and sandstorms poverty and despair but Knox City has always had a news paper, and today the Herald is the oldest paper in Knox county and while the present editor has only been here a short time we hope to be able to continue the publication another thirty five years.

We are going to interview some of the old timers here in the near future and see if we can get the list of all the editors and write a complete story of the history of the paper.

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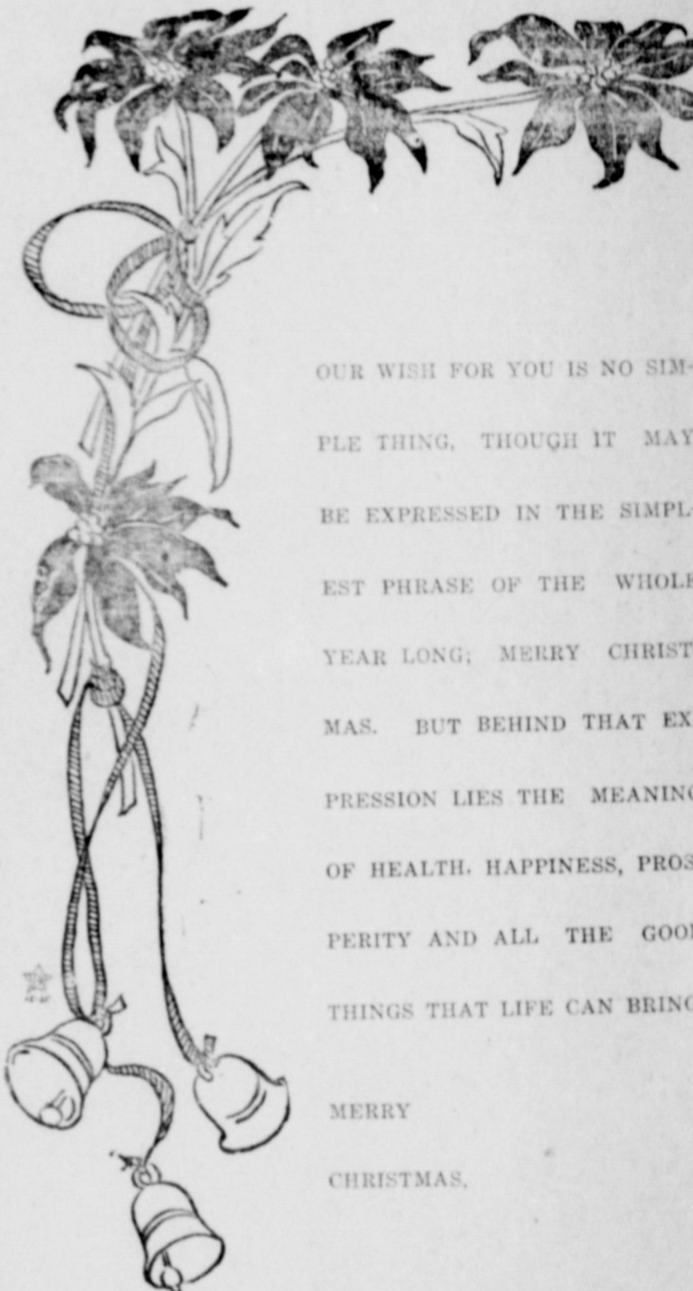

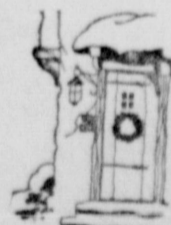
