Animal Identification to be Highlighted at Big Country Beef Conference

The much-discussed National Animal Identification System will be highlighted at the 2005 edition of the Big Country Beef Conference. This biennial conference begins with registration at 8:00 A.M. on August 25th in the Big Country Hall, located on the grounds of the Taylor County Expo Center in Abilene.

An update on the national identification system and information on how beef producers can receive premiums for source-verified cattle will be the focus of this year's conference.

Beef producers must know about animal identification to remain profitable and the U.S. beef industry is constantly changing to improve beef quality. Due to demand by both consumers and foreign markets, retailers are beginning to pay premiums for beef from source-verified cattle.

Identifying cattle as well as managing the information are key factors to ensuring the nation's beef supply is a safe, wholesome and a quality product. Our goal is to equip regional beef producers with the latest information on beef cattle management so they can do all that is currently known to increase their profits.



Goldsmith Interns in Marchant's Congressional Office



Washington, D.C. - For June and July of this year, a Baird native endured the summer heat of Washington, D.C. and graced the halls of the United States Capitol.

Sage Goldsmith, a 2003 graduate of Baird High School, explored his political side while spending two months as an intern for Congressman Kenny Marchant (TX-24).

The twenty year-old junior is in the Business Honors program at the University of Texas. He is the son of Scott and Sally Goldsmith.

Goldsmith claims a lifetime penchant for politics. This curiosity, coupled with

hearing the stories and experiences from friends who interned in Washington, D.C., led him to Capitol Hill.

His duties within Marchant's office included answering phones, conducting U.S. Capitol tours, organizing and inputting constituent mail, and assisting the legislative staff with special projects.

During his time in Washington, D.C., Goldsmith enjoyed the many perks of being a Congressional intern.

He saw many distinguished speakers, such as former Speaker of the House Newt Gingrich. He also worked on interesting

assignments, such as preparing an extensive briefing book for Marchant's recent trip to Iraq and Afghanistan.

Goldsmith managed to take time out of his busy intern schedule to enjoy the many sites in and around the nation's capital. He toured the White House, Mount Vernon, Ford's Theatre, the National Cathedral, and various monuments including the Lincoln, Jefferson, Washington, and Iwo Jima.

"If you name a landmark or tourist attraction in the D.C. area, chances are I've probably seen it during my stay here," remarked Goldsmith. "My favorite experience was the Capitol Dome

tour I went on with Representative Neugebauer's office.

Getting to see the artwork of the dome up close was amazing, and the tour provided the best view of Washington, D.C. in the entire city."

Goldsmith will now return to Austin and college life. He was recently admitted into the Professional Program in Accounting, a five year program in which students concurrently earn their bachelor's and master's degrees in accounting.

Upon his graduation in 2008, Goldsmith is considering law school or a job with an accounting firm.

As for his long term goals, Goldsmith hopes to one day return to the United States Congress, but this time as an elected representative. "I definitely want to pursue a career in politics at some point in the future," Goldsmith said. "After a few years in the private sector, I would like to run for public office at the local, state, or national level."

Marchant said of Goldsmith, "Sage was an asset to this office and the entire staff, we were pleased to have him here as an intern."

His positive attitude and intelligence will take him far in life, I am eager to see the great things that are in store for him in the future."

A Montana Adventure By Walter Williams

A brisk forty-five minute climb from the Missouri River to the top of the White Cliffs yielded a spectacular view of Eagle Creek campground, and La Barge Rock. An eagle's cry mingled with the low moan of the Montana wind added sound to the hurried activities of the canoeists in the cottonwood campground more than three hundred feet below.

For a few moments, while I caught my breath from the ascent, I was at peace in some of the most

beautiful scenery in Montana.

Because the area is accessible only by canoe, I saw the same untouched landscape viewed by Louis and Clark as the Corps of Engineers made their way through this area in 1805.

In fact, they even stayed in the same campground. Captain Meriweather Lewis called it Stonewall Creek probably due to the Grand National Wall just downstream. Inspired by the view, I could easily understand how Crow chief Arapooish could look at the



Montana landscape and say, "The Great Spirit has put it exactly in the right place; while you are in it you fare well; whenever you go out of it, whichever way you travel, you fare worse."

The previous day our group of five had launched from the small ghost town of Virgelle using the Missouri River Canoe Company. I stayed in a rustic but authentically furnished Shepherder cabin. Other alternatives include the spacious Geiser Homestead with two rooms and three beds. I awakened the following morning with

the crow of pheasants, and a splendid view of the prairie river valley complete with a small herd of Mule deer making their way over the skyline on the opposite side of the Missouri.

The smell of frying Whole Hog sausage and Baked Stuffed French Toast with a honey, lemon, and ginger sauce complemented the dark Montana coffee. The owner, Don Sorensen will make sure each guest receives a filling and satisfying breakfast before



Making A Difference

Meekness and Leadership, A Good Combination

Moses is described in scripture as the most humble or meekest man upon the face of the earth (Num. 12:3). This fact has always fascinated me. How is it possible that this meek man is also remembered as one of the greatest leaders in history?

How did he accomplish so many great things for God with such a humble spirit?

We know that humility, meekness, or gentleness as it is variously translated in different versions of scripture is something all Christian people are commanded to develop (1 Tim. 6:11). Scripture even tells us "the meek will inherit the land" (Psm.

37:11). But meekness and leadership don't seem to fit together--that is, until you understand more about both meekness and leadership.

Meekness does not mean weakness. It does not mean ineffectiveness, indecisiveness, fearfulness, or lack of confidence. Meekness means a quiet sense of one's own limits and one's dependency upon God and others.

Leadership, on the other hand, is not about self-aggrandizement and personal

power--at least good leadership is not about these things. The best form of leadership maximizes the contributions of others. It seeks to bring out the best in followers, colleagues, and even other leaders.

Moses was a meek man and a great leader because he did the will of God, he worked on behalf of his people, and he acknowledged that all of his talent and accomplishments were sourced in God in Heaven.

Too many corporate CEOs have forgotten about the meekness. Too many politicians have developed an air of detachment more akin to narcissistic celebrities than elected servants of the people. Too many religious leaders have checked their meekness at the door of the church, dominating their parishioners like feudal lords.

Meek leadership is not as contradictory as it sounds. Meekness is a matter of character and good leadership puts it in practice.

It seemed that the old lady had called the law and reported that we had broken into her old house and wanted us arrested. I doubt that any one had broken into the house because when we examined it there was no sign of entry and everything was still secure. Besides on an earlier visit we could see that nothing was left inside.

The neighbor man suggested that if we would burn the cabin he would make it alright with the law, and we did, and he did. Of course this stopped our visits to Mrs. Dobbs' place who must have missed us. I will never forget this dear lady and drinking cool water from an old metal bucket, drawn from her well. I hope that the Lord blesses her with many children in heaven.

The other lady! Who knows? He may just bless her with lots of kids also.

Judges and the Rule of Law

Congress must consider the Rule of Law as it reviews nominees for the Supreme Court

Whenever I have visited an emerging democracy, I have noticed consistency on two points: first, everybody easily understands the need for democratic voting and free speech; second, they have a much harder time understanding the rule of law, which is just as essential for a democracy to function.

I once met with members of the Russian Duma and emphasized how eager Americans were for Russia's fledgling democracy to succeed. One member replied, "No you don't. Americans are not investing here."

I replied that for American companies to invest, there has to be an independent judiciary and respect for the rule of law, so the state cannot easily confiscate private property. This was extremely difficult for the Russian parliamentarians to understand.

We have grown up in the United States in a society of laws, not of men. We take that concept for granted. In most emerging democracies, the rule of law is an alien idea, almost incomprehensible. But if you want democracy to succeed, it must harness the two concepts of individual rights and majority rule — and it can do this only through respect for the rule of law.

The rule of law involves four basic requirements: Equality under the law; a respect for individual rights; an independent and honest judiciary; and transparent court proceedings.

This concept was built into our Constitution which established the judiciary as a co-equal branch with the legislative and the executive. Because of this, the Supreme Court can strike down laws through "judicial review" if it decides the law violates our supreme law, the Constitution.

Judicial review provides courts with a great deal of power which some people believe has been abused. Some believe the courts have taken judicial review so far that some judges are legislating from the bench rather than interpreting and implementing the laws passed by elected representatives. If the public begins to view the courts simply as a different avenue for partisan political contests, instead of a fair arbitrator of legal questions, their faith in the impartial rule of law will erode.

This would be an unhealthy development. Many times in our history, court rulings have been unpopular, but the general respect accorded to the law allowed the public to accept its decisions.

The importance of the courts explains why we must take the replacement of re-

tiring Justice Sandra Day O'Connor very seriously. The Senate has a responsibility to examine the president's nominees closely to determine whether they are qualified by experience, knowledge and temperament to sit on the high court.

The Constitution says Congress should ascertain whether the nominee is qualified and fair, not fight to make sure he or she has a certain set of approved views on a laundry list of hot-button political issues. If this process is perceived by people as a partisan contest, it will only serve to diminish the respect the people have for the justice the court is expected to deliver. This could further erode the respect for the rule of law which buttresses our government and legal system.

This concept is so important to the stable functioning of representative government that I joined with the Southern Methodist University Dedman School of Law to establish a Rule of Law program to bring jurists and officials from developing countries to the United States. The hope of all who participate in this program is that our foreign guests will build their understanding of the rule of law, and help this vital principle take root in their countries and foster the growth of strong and stable democracies around the world.



No surprise: House kills school finance, property tax legislation

AUSTIN - When Gov. Rick Perry called special sessions to solve school finance in late June and again in late July, armchair quarterbacks across Texas predicted failure, and they've guessed correctly, so far.

After all, to Texans with only a mild interest in the affairs of the state Legislature, it had become plain in the spring that House members, senators, the governor and the comptroller could not or would not agree on the numbers or a plan.

Last year, more than 300 school districts sued the state contending that the system violated the state Constitution by not providing equal educational opportunities. State District Judge John Dietz agreed, but Attorney General Greg Abbott appealed on behalf of the state.

The Texas Supreme Court has been deliberating on the state's appeal since July 6, arguably making further consideration of the issue by the Legislature a waste of time until the court rules.

Why legislation keeps failing House members, struggling to satisfy the disparate needs of their constituent school districts, have been unable to build a consensus on "recapture" levels - better known as "Robin Hood." This inability to settle on a

graduated formula seems to show that it takes more than sliding scales to balance wealthy and poor school districts so all children have a fair shot at getting a competitive K-through-12 education.

Plus, there has been no general agreement among lawmakers on:

- How much to decrease property taxes.
- How much money is enough to bring Texas schools up to the national average on dollars per student and teacher pay, or even if Texas should base its goals on national averages.
- How (or whether) to shift the tax burden by tinkering with sales tax rates.
- How (or whether) to apply business franchise taxes.

Enough Republicans crossed over and voted with Democrats to kill the school finance and property tax reform bills on July 26, with some members voting apparently in resentment over Speaker Tom Craddick's refusal to allow any debate on a long list of amendments.

House must originate money bills Article 3 Sec-

tion 33 of the Texas Constitution says all revenue-raising bills shall originate in the House. With the killing of House Bill 3, the House must decide whether to resurrect another version of the property tax reform bill.

But such a bill would have to be substantially different from the dead bill so as not to violate Article 3 Section 34, which says "After a bill has been considered and defeated by either house of the Legislature, no bill containing the same substance, shall be passed into a law during the same session. ..."

So, all the governor has to do to reinstate the whole process is adjourn the present session and then call a third special session - if he thinks calling lawmakers back to Austin will put them in a better mood to compromise.

'Legal' Meth Sales Limited As Of Monday

The legislation limits access to over-the-counter sales of tablet forms of pseudoephedrine products, which must be kept behind a pharmacy counter or in a locked case within 30 feet and in direct line of sight of the sales clerk. Sales are limited to two packages or six grams. Purchasers must display a driver's license or other picture identification, and stores are required to keep a record of the customer's name, date of birth, date of purchase and the pseudoephedrine product purchased; these records must be kept for two years and may be viewed by state and local law enforcement agencies. It also requires pharmaceutical wholesalers to record and report sales of pseudoephedrine and requires them to notify the Texas Department of Public Safety about transactions involving suspicious quantities of pseudoephedrine tablets.

launch. The Virgelle Mercantile offers a variety of bed and breakfast options combined with canoe packages, all reasonably priced, and is the perfect place to spend the night before starting a trip through the Missouri Breaks by canoe (1-800-426-2926).

After a day and a half on the river, Mike Arnst of Eagle Buttes Adventures met our team and took us to his ranch house located in a very remote 5000-acre area on the Upper Missouri River Breaks National Monument. Mike rents ATV's and leads a hike to the infamous Hole in the Wall.

As beautiful as the Missouri was from the breaks looking up, the landscape was even more beautiful from the eroded cliffs looking down on the river. The Citadel, a massive, red limestone formation that rises a

couple hundred feet from the river is spectacular in early morning and evening.

Antelope, coyote, and Mule Deer are abundant with an array of geological formations called Hoodoo's. Captain Lewis stated, "The hills and Clifts which we passed today exhibit a most romantic appearance...As we passed on it seemed as if those seens of visionary enchantment would never have an end".

The hike from the rim down to the river and overland to the Hole in the Wall is exhilarating, but once on the bottom, the temperature can heat up, so take plenty of water. I had the opportunity to meet Jack Larmoleux and his family at one of the wooden shelters on the river and explained that I would probably write a story about the adventure. With a laugh, he said, "Tell them the mosquitoes are as big as horses

and as mean as rattlers.

Like many of the locals from that area, he has been enjoying the "the monument" for years and is reluctant to see armies of tourists invade his sanctuary. Nevertheless, Jack conceded "the river is a perfect place to spend time with your family and friends". Mike combines the ATV trips with Missouri River Canoe Company to make a tremendous summer vacation package.

The less adventurous traveler will enjoy a stop at Fort Benton and the Grand Union Hotel. Fort Benton is the oldest town in Montana and is the farthest navigable point from the Gulf of Mexico at 3,484 miles. A Buffalo and Gold Rush town, it really boomed during the Steamship era, but

began to decrease in population when the Northern Pacific Railroad bypassed the town.

The Grand Union Hotel was built during the Gold Rush days with all windows facing the main street. This was fortunate for the ladies since they had front row seats to witness the frequent gunfights on "the bloodiest block in the West". The hotel has been remodeled and modernized, but still keeps the charm of the 1890's. The rooms are opulent and affordable. The Restaurant serves a tremendous Northern Plains Buffalo Steak with Bacon and Mushroom Risotto.

Another tourist favorite is the Montana Mixed Grille with ineffably tender Beef Tenderloin, Black Tiger Prawns, Whipped Potatoes and Wilted Greens. Diners are welcome in "Montana Casual" attire. The Old Fort

Benton Museum is just down the street and the statue of Shep is located in the park next to the Grand Union. Shep's owner was a shepherd who died in 1936.

The Collie observed his owners departure by train and continued to meet the train every day for the next 5 1/2 years. When #235 pulled into the depot on January 12, 1942, Shep was not able to get off the tracks in time and was hit by the train. Townspeople buried him on a bluff overlooking

the depot. Fifty-two years later, Bob Scriver, Montana's premier sculptor created a bronze statue with an inscription stating "Forever Faithful".
