Even the Bible Tells of Water Gate Confessions

A contemporary translation "The Living Bible", published two years ago and now appearing on best seller lists, tells about weeping and confession of national sins at Jerusalem's Water Gate, 2500 years ago.

Then as now, the participants were high government officials. But in that incident the confessions were voluntary.

It all came about when the Jewish nation, after 70 years of captivity in Babylon, returned and rebuilt the ancient gates of their capitol city. One of these was the Water Gate.

A mass meeting was convened at this gate to discuss the fact that the clergy, political leaders and average citizen alike were disobeying the laws God gave to Moses a thousand years earlier. Two of these same Laws... "Thou shalt not steal," and "Thou shalt not lie,"... are prominent again in today's Watergate affair.

In the earlier event the people broke out into weeping and confession when they realized

how many of God's laws they themselves had broken along with their leaders.

But it ended for the good of all concerned. A national reform was decided on, and agreement reached for everyone... politicians and average citizen alike... to obey all of God's laws thereafter. A happy celebration was begun, giving gifts and feasting, because everyone felt so glad that righteousness had again prevailed and God's laws were being enforced again.

The Living Bible tells of this historic event in the Old Testament Book of Nehemiah chapters eight and nine.





FARMERS, MOTORISTS SHARE ROAD SAFETY

Farm activity is now in full swing and that means more tractors and other farm equipment on public roads. It's a time when road safety is especially critical, both on the part of the tractor operator as well as the motorist.

Tractor operators should make sure the slow-moving vehicle (SMV) emblem is properly displayed, clean and clearly visible before traveling a public road with farm equipment. This emblem is required by law.

Extreme care is essential when entering or crossing a road with a tractor or other farm equipment. Make allowances for the additional time needed to turn with a trailer or other long implements.

When traveling on a public road with farm equipment, pull over when possible to let traffic pass. Be sure to signal turns and check for passing vehicles before turning.

A tractor can turn over easily at high speeds so steer it with caution and avoid sharp turns.

Motorists are cautioned to learn to recognize the SMV emblem. It's a fluorescent yellow-orange triangle with a dark red reflective border and identifies all vehicles designed to travel at speeds less than 25 miles per hour.

Since tractors and other farm implements travel at such low speeds, motorists should take immediate action when sighting them or the SMV emblem. A motorist should decrease speed immediately as he will approach the tractor rapidly due to the great differences in speed of the two vehicles. With a tractor moving 15 to 20 miles per hour and a car travelling 60 to 70 miles per hour, there isn't much time—only a few seconds—to react once a motorist sights a tractor in the lane ahead.

Safety on public roads is the responsibility of everyone. There is always room for plenty of courtesy along the way.


