According to Mrs. Cyle Carver the blaze was started from the exhaust of a truck they were loading while combining.

"Due to the quick response of the fire department only ten acres of wheat were destroyed and this loss was covered by insurance," Mrs. Carver explained.

"Wheat in the entire area is yielding above average, by far the best crop most wheat farmers have ever experienced and the loss of the entire field would have been very costly," she said.

Mrs. Richards died at 9:15 p.m. Friday at her home in Santa Anna.

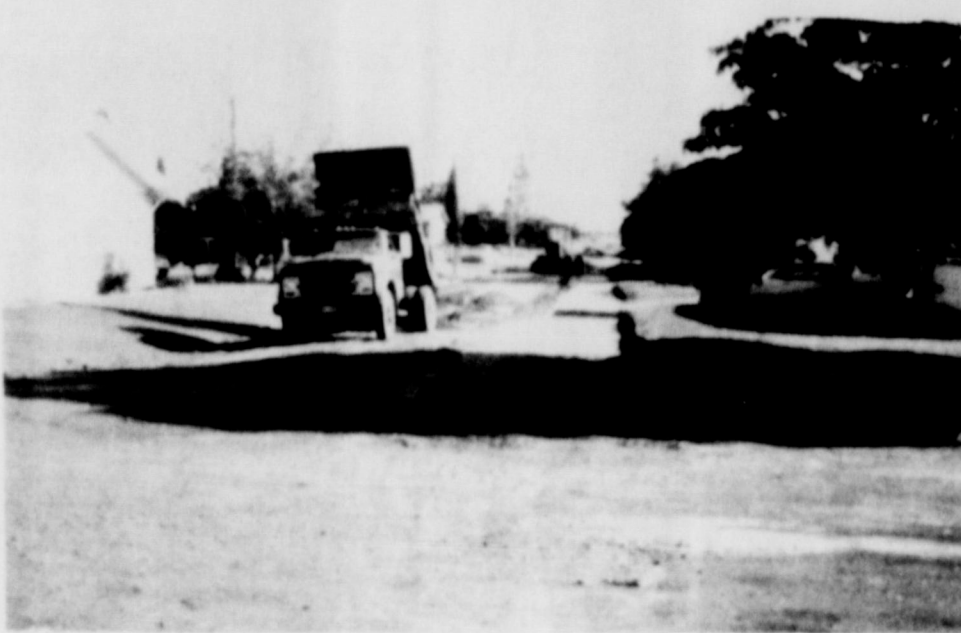

## Even the Bible Tells of Water Gate Confessions

A contemporary translation "The Living Bible", published two years ago and now appearing on best seller lists, tells about weeping and confession of national sins at Jerusalem's Water Gate, 2500 years ago.

Then as now, the participants were high government officials. But in that incident the confessions were voluntary! It all came about when the Jewish nation, after 70 years of captivity in Babylon, returned and rebuilt the ancient gates of their capitol city. One of these was the Water Gate.

A mass meeting was convened at this gate to discuss the fact that the clergy, political leaders and average citizen alike were disobeying the laws God gave to Moses a thousand years earlier. Two of these same laws, "Thou shalt not steal" and "Thou shalt not lie" . . . are prominent again in today's Water-gate affair.

In the earlier event the people broke out into weeping and confession when they realized how many of God's laws they themselves had broken along with their leaders.

But it ended for the good of all concerned. A national reform was decided on, and agreement reached for everyone. . . politicians and average citizen alike. . . to obey all of God's laws thereafter. A happy celebration was begun, giving gifts and feasting, because everyone felt that righteousness had again prevailed and God's laws were being enforced again. The Living Bible tells of this historic event in the Old Testament Book of Nehemiah chapters eight and nine.

## Graduates To Attend Summer Program

AMARILLO, TEX.—West Texas State University's new freshman summer enrollment program is proving very popular, Registrar Donald Cates said today.

Three dates—June 12, July 6, and July 31—were set aside for orientation, advisement and early registration of freshman students already accepted for admittance to WTSU next fall.

Rebecca L. Swain and David A. McGaughey, both of Knox City, have registered for the July 31 session of the summer orientation program.

Two hundred students and their parents have been invited on a first-come, first-serve basis to each of the sessions. The June session is filled, Cates said, but places remain on the two July dates.

Cates said, "This program will help the student make the transition from high school to college while at the same time help the parent understand more about that transition."

The purposes of the summer program, Cates said, are to assure the student of more individual attention in orientation, program planning and registration of classes; to provide an opportunity to visit and become acquainted with the campus; and to help him learn more about educational and career opportunities and financial aid programs.

"These freshmen will be able to come in smaller groups," Cates said. "They will be given individual academic counseling by faculty members on a one-to-one basis. "It is very important for interested students to send in their confirmation cards as soon as possible so that they may have a better chance of

getting in the session they want."

Orientation is scheduled from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Students will meet in a general assembly in the Activities Center and then break into four smaller groups for counseling, orientation and campus tours.

During the time the students are being advised, their parents will have an opportunity to meet and talk with university deans and administrators, Cates said.

Registration for classes with the student's advisor is the last step in the process.

There is no charge for the program. The tuition and fees incurred from registration will be billed to the student's home after the program, Cates said. Arrangements can be made with the director to the Testing and Counseling Center by students who wish to attain college credit for some courses by examination.

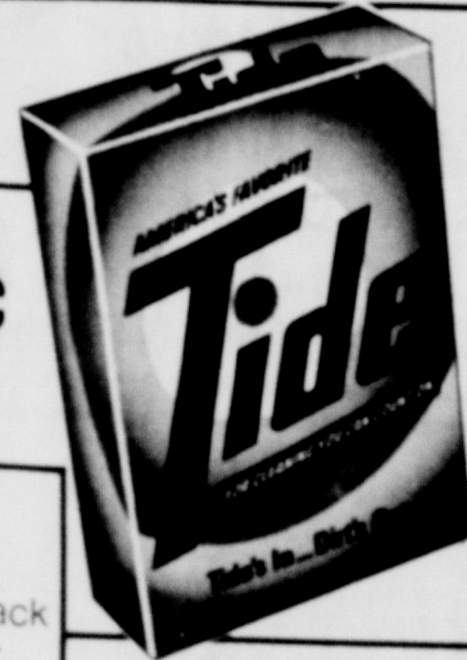

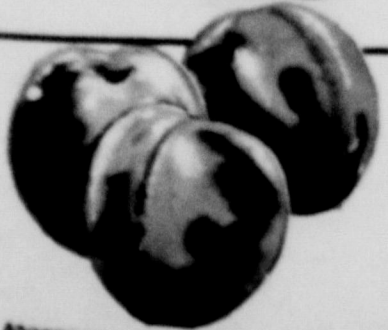

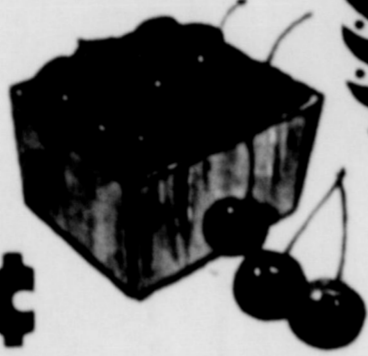
