

lading and ship to the Associa-

## OPPORTUNITIES ARE NUMEROUS IN MEXICO

Possibilities for commercial and industrial development increasing daily.

## DEPARTMENTS WILL HELP

Department of Commerce, Industry and Labor Urges Inquiries on All Questions.

Consider reports compiled show that more than thirty thousand people recently crossed the Rio Grande from Mexico into the United States upon the occasion of the celebration of the Centennial Exposition of that country. Those who have been following closely the commercial and industrial situation in Mexico believe that this is the indication of a development along these lines unprecedented in Mexico's history. Business conditions in Mexico have more or less reflected similar conditions in the United States yet during the past few months Mexico has been visited by some of the most important dealers in the world with the result that possibilities for an early recognition of that country have been growing brighter each month.

Adjustment of matters pertaining to oil holdings, the extension of long lines of credit by some of the most powerful commercial organizations in the world, the possibility of an early payment of interest on national debt have all contributed to the advance of Mexican interests.

The United States has been offered an opportunity of developing a strong market for its manufacturers and many manufacturers and exporters have been taking advantage of the opportunity. During the year 1920 the total exports of the U.S. amounted to \$152,044,271 of which \$27,881,000 went to the Mexican market.

To bring before the country in visual form the vast problem it is helping to solve, the American Red Cross has prepared for its Annual Roll Call, Nov. 11 to 24, a poster showing how rather than diminishing the total of World War veterans entitled to Federal aid continues to grow. Red Cross Service to these men is costing \$10,000,000 a year.

Business between the two countries for the twelve months ending October, 1920, was \$43,203,130, of which Mexico bought \$26,300,000 and sold \$26,134.

Mexico bought during these twelve months \$11,186 worth of automobiles and parts; \$4,000 worth of cameras; \$1,000 worth of sewing machines; \$1,000 worth of typewriters; \$1,000 worth of word of corn and of baked rice. The market for dried fish is increasing in volume.

To my observer this more than dispelled the rumors that Mexico is ready to cast him aside, which have been constantly circulated by persons and interests to whom the Mexican government have failed to make concessions.

Mexico expended in the United States last year for meat and meat products \$7,154,859, of which amount more than five million was spent for lamb and lamb compound, the balance for ham, bacon, and sausages. Fresh meat is being imported into Mexico in larger and every day increasing quantities.

In Mexico, cattle raising is a very important industry and market for live stock and many ranchers are seeking their ranches again to replace those destroyed during the revolution.

Business has been found providing 100 per cent decrease in the cost import and export duties of a effective January 1st. While Mexico is especially bound in reducing the import of meat for meat breeding purposes. It also aids certain livestock owners by enabling them to pasture in Mexico.

#### Red Cross Gives \$310,000 to Aid 'Clean-Up' Drive

An appropriation of \$310,000 for  
Red Cross work in connection with the  
"clean-up" campaign instituted by the  
Government to bring the claims of all  
disabled service men who are entitled  
to Federal aid before the proper gov-  
ernment bureau for action, has been  
made by the American Red Cross.  
The Executive Committee of the  
American Red Cross in making the  
appropriation authorized the appropri-  
ation of \$35,000 of this sum to the  
American Legion to defray the ex-  
pense of the Legion representatives  
assigned to the various districts of  
the Veterans Bureau.

The remainder of the appropriation  
was authorized for apportionment  
among the several Divisions of the  
Red Cross for carrying on that part  
of the "clean-up" work that falls di-  
rectly upon the Red Cross organization.

#### Young America Sends Vast Relief To Needy Abroad

Various relief projects of the Junior  
American Red Cross in European  
countries resulted in helping 237,000  
destitute children during the last fiscal  
year, according to the annual re-  
port of the American Red Cross for that period. The growth of the activities  
of the Juniors abroad is manifested by a comparison which shows  
this figure is 200,000 larger than that of  
the previous fiscal year.

The National Children's Fund raised  
by school children, members of the  
Junior American Red Cross, was  
drawn upon for \$420,567 for these projects.  
Receipts for the National Children's Fund during the last fiscal year  
totaled \$155,817.

### FARMS TO BE COMMON

Comparatively New Branch of Horticulture is Becoming Popular in England.

Without doubt herb culture is the coming science. One of the most startling facts in the domain of medicine today is the progress made in pharmacy, London Tit-Bits states.

Herbs, from having been used ill in medieval times, fell into disrepute, and in modern times herbal remedies, apart from drugs which could be numbered on the fingers of one hand, were tabooed, save by the enlightened few.

Herb farming is a new branch of horticulture, writes A. R. Horwood, F. I. S., in the Homeopathic World. It is an interesting and intellectual pursuit specially suited for women.

Before the war there were numerous herb farms run on commercial lines by firms of manufacturing chemists. But there were no schools for the training of amateurs. Since the war, however, a school and herb farm has been started at Chalfont St. Peter, Buckinghamshire, by Mrs. M. Grieve, F. R. H. S.

One of the main objects of herb farming is to cultivate plants of medicinal value. Besides the drug plants in general use, such as belladonna, henbane, fox-glove, aconite, digitalis and so on, a vast number of herbs whose real value is known are used in medicine, including such common plants as dandelion, couch grass, red poppy, celandine, burberry, camomile, dill, fennel, blessed thistle, valerian and male fern.
