Strawn Sand Discovery Made South of Knox City

A wildcat has been completed as a Strawn Sand discovery one mile south of Knox City.

The strike is Petroleum Programs Inc. of Abilene No. 1, T.E. Robbins. Site is 1,650 feet from the north and 15,000 feet from the east lines of Section 49, Block 2, D1W Survey.

Daily potential was 100 barrels of 40 gravity oil, plus five barrels of water. It is pumping from perforations at 4,889-89 and 4,903-07 feet.

The pay was treated with 500 gallons of acid and fractured with 50 sacks of sand and 200 barrels of water.

Operator set the 4 1/2-inch casing at 4,974 feet, and the hole is bottomed at 4,980 feet.

A new field designation will be applied for.

In King County, Taubert, Steed, Gunn & Medders of Wichita Falls staked two locations in the Twin Peaks (Upper Strawn) Field.

Both are 17 miles southeast of Guthrie and slated for 5,400 feet.

No. 3-AW S.B. Burnett Estate will be drilled 1,980 feet from the north and east lines of Section 27, Block F, H & TC Survey.

Site for No. 4-W S.B. Burnett Estate is 1,660 feet from the south and 2,000 feet from the east lines of Section 28, same block and survey.

Boll Weevil Control Meet Set Here Mon.

All Knox County cotton producers are urged to attend a very important meeting on cotton boll weevil control Monday, October 30, at 7:00 p.m. in the Knox City School Lunchroom.

The cotton boll weevil diapause control program appears to be the best program available to growers. To obtain state assistance in this program it is necessary to form a county organization and ask for appropriations through the State Legislatures.

The program is designed to kill diapausing weevils before they leave the cotton fields to seek winter shelter. Areas with the program in operation have found good cotton crops may be made the following year before the boll weevil builds up enough in numbers to do much damage.

Stonewall and Haskell counties are planning to organize and according to County Extension Agent Herman H. Collier, this is one meeting all cotton producers should make plans to attend.

Bonfire Slated Thursday

The annual bonfire and pep rally will be tonight (Thursday) at 8 o'clock on the gin yard west of Lewis Paint and Body Shop.

and Munday has won 2. KC has lost 1 and Munday 4. Neither team has tied a game. The Greyhounds have scored 183 points to Munday's 45. Opponents have scored 44 against KC and 135 against the Moguls.

Knox City's Greg Clonts is the leading scorer in District 7A with 50 points. Second place scorer is another KC Greyhound, Phillip Newton with 42 points. Quarterback Joey Swain captured seventh place in district with 30 points.

United Fund Drive Continues

Even though the United Fund drive has been underway for a couple of weeks, a number of residents are still confused as to what organization will benefit and also as to the amount considered a "fair share" for contributing.

Hounds Win 7A Opener

Staff of the Hounds took maximum effort last week's opener work their offense been sporadic in the past.

The Hounds new offense lined up and Phillip Newton followed Rob Harrison through the hole in the line 6 straight times for 31 yds. Harrison carried for 8 then Newton again for 4. Here the drive stalled. Two rushes and an incomplete pass brought up 4th and E.

On the snap from center to the punter the wet ball sailed over Whiteley's head and was recovered on the Hounds' 11 yd line for a 32 yd loss. Getting a second break in the

first quarter the Dragons drove into the endzone on four plays. Bobby Reeves made two tackles before the score with three minutes 42 seconds, left in the first quarter, it was Paducah 7, K. C. 0.

On the kickoff Bobby Reeves covered the ball on the Hounds 26. Quarterback Joey Swain had no gain as the wet ball slipped out of his hands and he recovered on the first play. Phillip Newton ran for 8 then 4 for a 1st down.

Newton ran for three, Robert Taylor carried four and two. On 4th and one Swain carried for two and a first down. An incomplete pass and two running plays gained only 1 yd. On 4th and 9 Whiteley pointed the wet ball only 6 yds.

Paducah, trying to take advantage of this break as the second quarter began, ran for two yds but was stopped by Cliff Ray. The Dragons ran for two more yds and Reeves and Clonts made the stop. The Dragons then completed a pass for 5 yds and a 1st down. Ricky Hacker saved a touchdown on the next play catching the runner after a 20 yd gain. Four plays later Paducah tried a field goal on 4th down needing 15 yds. It was no good.

Knox City set to work at their 20. Newton carried for 4. A personal foul added 15 more yds for the Hounds. Newton carried for 6. Harrison

AN ORDINANCE FIXING AND DETERMINING THE GENERAL SERVICE RATE TO BE CHARGED FOR SALES OF NATURAL GAS TO RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL CONSUMERS WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF BENJAMIN, KNOX COUNTY, TEXAS, AND PROVIDING FOR THE MANNER IN WHICH SUCH RATE MAY BE CHANGED, ADJUSTED AND AMENDED.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BENJAMIN:

SECTION 1. Effective with the first gas bills rendered from and after thirty (30) days from the date of final passage of this ordinance, the maximum general service rate for sales of natural gas rendered to residential and commercial consumers within the city limits of Benjamin by Lone Star Gas Company, a Texas Corporation, its successors and assigns, is hereby fixed and determined as follows:

First 1,000 cu. ft. or fraction thereof \$2.444 Gross; \$2.20 Net
Next 3,000 cu. ft. @ \$1.256 per Mcf Gross; \$1.13 per Mef Net
Next 6,000 cu. ft. @ \$1.133 per Mef Gross; 1.02 per Mef Net
Next 15,000 cu. ft. @ 1.044 per Mef Gross; .94 per Mef Net
Next 75,000 cu. ft. @ .978 per Mef Gross; .88 per Mef Net
All over 100,000 cu. ft. @ .944 per Mef Gross; .83 per Mef Net

No gas bill will be rendered to any residential or commercial consumer served under the above rate not consuming any gas during any monthly billing period.

ADJUSTMENTS

The amount of each net monthly bill computed at the above-stated rates shall be subject to the following adjustments: Plus or minus the amount of any increase or decrease, respectively, above or below the 42.5 cents per Mef level in the intracompany city gas charge as authorized by the Railroad Commission of the State of Texas or other regulatory body having jurisdiction for gas delivered to Lone Star Gas Company's distribution system for sale to residential and commercial consumers where such changes are caused by increases or decreases in the cost of gas purchased by the Company; plus an amount equivalent to the proportionate part of any new tax, or increased tax, or any other governmental imposition, rental, fee or charge (except state, county, city and special district ad valorem taxes and taxes on net income) levied, assessed or imposed subsequent to April 1, 1972, upon or allocable to the Company's distribution operations, by any new or amended law, ordinance or contract. Each gross monthly bill shall be adjusted proportionately. Company, at its option, may forego the application of any adjustment if such adjustment would result in an increase in the monthly bill; however, failure of Company to apply any adjustment shall not constitute a waiver of Company's right from time to time, or at any time, to make any adjustment, in whole or in part, in any subsequent current monthly bill that may be applicable to such bill.

Net rate shall apply to all bills paid within ten days from monthly billing date, gross rate shall be applicable thereafter.

The above rate is applicable to each residential and commercial consumer per meter per month or for any part of a month for which gas is used at the same location.

In addition to the aforesaid rates, Company shall have the right to collect such reasonable charges as are necessary to conduct its business and to carry out its reasonable rules and regulations in effect.

SECTION 2. The rate set forth in Section 1 may be changed and amended by either the City or Company furnishing gas in the manner provided by law. Service hereunder is subject to the orders of regulatory bodies having jurisdiction, and to the Company's Rules and Regulations currently on file in the Company's office.

SECTION 3. It is hereby found and determined that the meeting at which this ordinance is passed is open to the public as required by Texas law, and that advance public notice of the time, place and purpose of said meeting was given, and that this rate ordinance is in compliance with the applicable general criteria issued by the Price Commission under the Economic Stabilization Act of 1970, as amended.

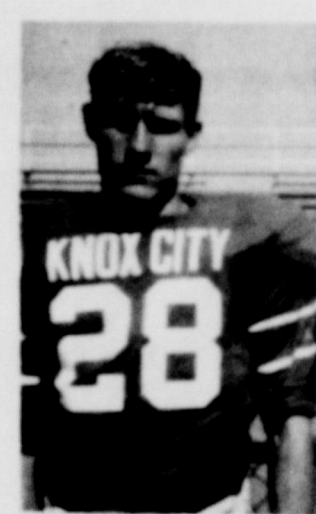

The Barnards recently received a letter from him and as it had interesting information, we are passing parts of it on to our readers.

Dear Family, It is Sunday afternoon and I have the 1600 to 2000 watch in the missile house so I decided to drop you all a few lines just to show Dad I can still write a letter.

We have traveled 4500 miles since we left Mayport and are having war games with some other NATO nations. There are also some Russians up here, too, seeing what we are doing. They probably think we are crazy and are wondering why anyone would come up in this cold, God-forsaken country to have war games. About all we have accomplished is the qualification of becoming a Blue Nose of the Great Cold Domain of Thor, the Great God of the Norsemen. After being in this cold and experiencing these very rough seas, I do not know if being a Blue Nose is worth it or not. It would not be so bad if we were steaming around at 18 or 20 knots, but this 5 to 7 knots is about to drive me crazy. The ship is like a cork in a five gallon wash tub. You can't sleep, you can't eat, and you can barely walk. The really bad part is that we have got 15 days of this left. This ship is going to cause more trouble in Rotterdam than in any other port on this cruise, and

I sure hope I don't poll shore patrol in Rotterdam.

Mom, do you think you could send me the K. C. paper from time to time. I would kinda like to know who dies, who gets married, and who leaves town. If you all can remember, throw in an Abilene Reporter every once in a while. I would sure appreciate it.

Dad, I would like to have you mail me those country and western eight track tapes you have at home. A couple of other guys in the division and I have about worn out the C & W tapes I brought with us on the cruise.

I just read our schedule and thought I'd let you know where we will be: Oct. 8-9, Rota, Spain; Oct. 9-11, transit to Barcelona, Spain (and incidentally, Rick called his folk from Barcelona Saturday night); Oct. 12-20 Barcelona, Spain; Oct. 21-29, Operations at sea; Oct. 30 Nov. 3, Naples, Italy; Nov. 4-9 operations at sea; Nov. 10-11 anchor at Augusta Bay; Nov. 12-18, operations at sea; Nov. 19-20 anchor at Soudha Bay; Nov. 21-22 enroute; Nov. 23-26 Genoa, Italy; Nov. 27-28 enroute; Nov. 29, Dec. 3 Barcelona, Spain; Dec. 19-Jan. 5 Athens, Greece (dependent's charter) (Editor's Note: Carla

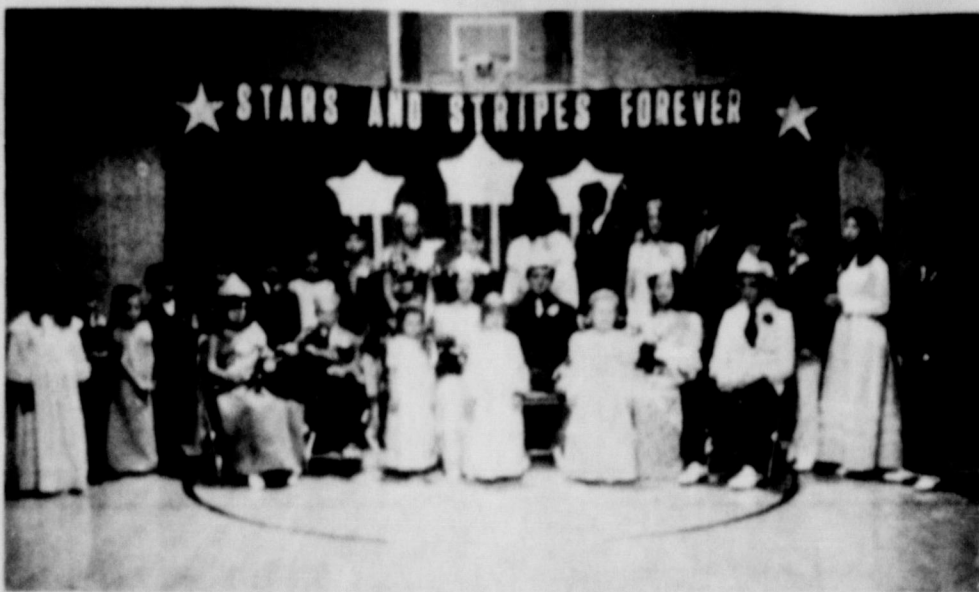
