Hounds Place Second At Graham Sat.

Knox City's Greyhounds scored heavily in the relay events in Graham Saturday but it was not enough to help Coach Jimmy Rogers' team overcome speedy Munster in the race for the Division 1 team trophy at the annual Possum Kingdom Relays.

The Greyhounds scored 144 points to Munster's 172 in the ten team field.

Knox City took two first places with Al Bateman's copping the top honor in the long jump and the 440 relay team of Flint Richardson, Charlie Flye, Jimmy Lynn, and Bateman winning with a time of 44.8.

In addition to the 440 relay win, the Hounds took second in the mile relay with a time of 3:45.5 for 36 points but it was not enough for the team to take first place honors. Mile relay team members are Billy Bob Reynolds, Tommy Mangis, Jerry Eaton, and Tim Whitten.

Munster ran 1-2-3 in the 880 on the way to five first places.

Seymour and Jacksboro shared the Division II (AA schools) team title with 140 1/2 points apiece.

Seymour took both relays and three other first place honors.

Other places for the Knox City team included: 120 high hurdles, Eaton, second; Tim Whitten, fourth; and Jimmy Lynn, fifty; 100 yard dash, Bateman, second; Flye, third; and Richardson, fourth; 440 dash, Mark Clonts, 330 intermediate hurdles, Lynn, second and Whitten, fourth; 220 yard dash, Bateman, second and Flye, fourth; mile run, Ricky Bishop, fourth and Eddie Martinez, fifth; shot put, Grimsley, third; discus, Eaton, fourth; long jump, Lynn, third and Flye, fourth; and pole vault, Reynolds, second, Bishop, third and Howell, fifth.

Saturday, the Hounds will be participating in the Albany track meet.

Tax Rebate Reflects Christmas Shopping

AUSTIN--Comptroller Bob Bullock said Monday that a total of \$75.5 million was rebated to cities for city sales tax collected in the 1975 Christmas quarter, compared to \$64.2 million for the 1974 Christmas quarter.

"All the merchants said during the Christmas season that sales were up over 1974," said Bullock, "and they were right. Based on city sales tax figures, there was a 17.5 percent increase."

Bullock mailed checks totaling \$52.8 million to 837 Texas cities and towns Monday, representing their March city sales tax allocations.

The Comptroller said the March, February and January allocations to the cities represented the tax collected by merchants from October through December.

Merchants remitting the penny per dollar tax on a quarterly basis had to file their returns by January 31.

The biggest March checks went to Houston, \$11.1 million; Dallas, \$6.1 million; San Antonio, \$3.4 million; Austin, \$1.7 million; and El Paso, \$1.7 million.

Knox City's net payment was \$4389.92 as compared to Benjamin, \$340.97; Haskell, \$12,305.25; Munday, \$4,709.33; O'Brien, \$155.17; Rochester, \$2,201.36; Rule, \$2,866.70; Seymour, \$12,407.91; and Stamford, \$17,337.44.

GED Tests Set March 20

General Educational Development Tests will be given in Rule High School Saturday March 20 at 8:00 a.m.

Five tests will be given in English, Literature, Social Studies, Science, and Mathematics. If a person passes these five tests, the Texas Education Agency will issue a High School Equivalency Diploma. This diploma meets the educational requirement for employment as well as partial requirement for college entrance or job training schools.

A fee of \$15.00 is charged for all five tests and it takes about two hours for each test. A person must be eighteen (or at least 17 years old) and have been out of school one full calendar year. If a person is seventeen when the tests are taken the diploma will not be issued until the person is eighteen.
