Clearing House Begins Sixth Year Of Operation

Being in the grocery business himself, Mr. Harrison said he realized the need of a way to handle the hundreds of coupons issued by manufacturers, and thus, the clearing house was born. It is one of four in the state of Texas and serves 600 accounts. Accounts come from five states including Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Arkansas, and Missouri. Mr. Harrison said that many of the persons using the services of the clearing house did not know where Knox City was when the business began but are now well-acquainted with its location.

The services of the clearing house are limited strictly to retailers and cannot accommodate individuals, Mr. Harrison said.

One business could possibly have from 80 to 120 mailings to various manufacturers for collection of its many coupons, but when handled by the clearing house, one mailing takes care of it all.

Mr. Harrison explained that the first three to six months the firm operated, no coupons were processed, as the clearing house had to be recognized by the manufacturers who issue redeemable coupons on their products.

The Harrisons, who also include Bobbie and Rob, moved to Knox City in April, 1962. They bought the building and moved to their present location July 5, 1970.

Jack Hightower Asks Return As State Senator

Now in the mail are formal requests for a place on the ballot for the Democratic primary by Jack Hightower as a candidate for re-election to the State Senate from the 30th Senatorial District.

Sen. Hightower has been an announced candidate for some time, but formal filing with the County Democratic Committees was delayed due to the litigation involving Senatorial district boundaries and the question having been resolved it is time of filing fees. Some of the legal questions having been resolved it is now known which counties are included in the new 30th Senatorial District.

Sen. Hightower is in his eighth year of service in the Senate. He also served one term in the Texas House of Representatives and was District Attorney of the 48th Judicial District seven years prior to his election to the Senate.

A legislative leader, Senator Hightower is Chairman of the Senate Administration Committee and has played a vital role in the improvement of the legislative process in Texas. In addition to his membership on the major Senate committees in the last regular session of the legislature he served as President Pro Tempore of the Senate. On April 3, 1971, while serving as Acting Governor, the people of the 30th Senatorial District honored Senator Hightower and his family at "Governor-for-a-Day" events in Austin.

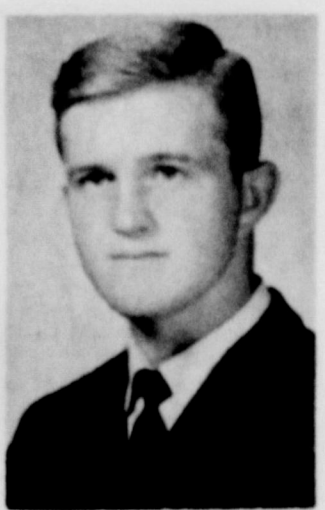
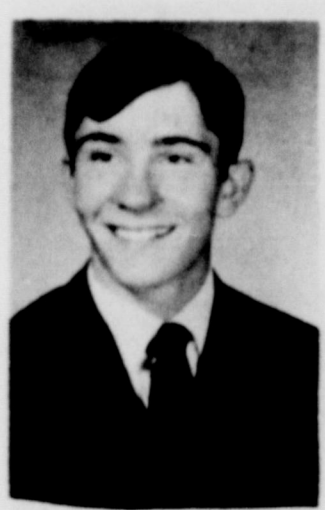
Knox County 4-H'ers At Fort Worth

Bond Sales Reach 70% Of '71 Goal

December sales of Series E and United States Savings Bonds in Knox County totaled \$3,110 according to County Bond Chairman M.L. Wiggins. Sales during 1971 amounted to \$12,135. This represents 70 per cent of the sales goal of \$169,000.

Texas purchased \$15,207,564 in Savings Bonds during the month. Total Bond sales for 1971 were \$199,830,508 for 110 per cent of the state's goal of \$181.5 million. One hundred six counties and twelve districts in the state achieved their 1971 sales goal.

Nationwide December sales totaled \$439 million - a 14.4 per cent increase above December 1970. During the calendar year 1971, sales of E and H Bonds amounted to \$5.5 billion. This is 114 per cent of the National goal of \$4.8 billion.

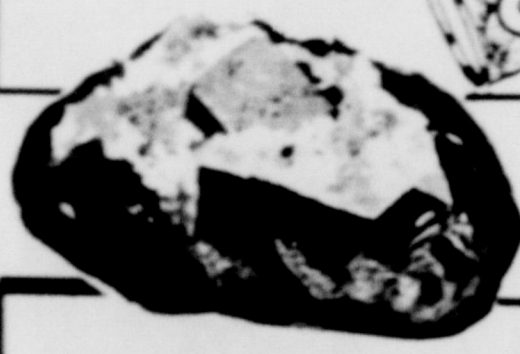

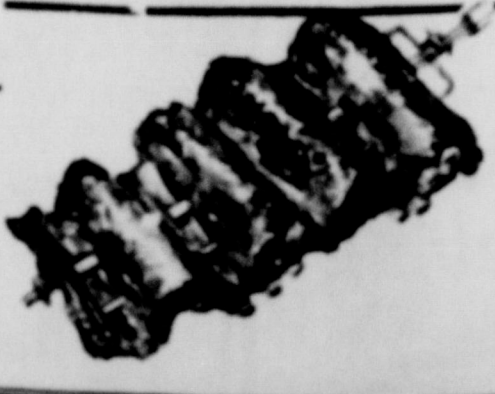
