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

For a self-employed farmer to become eligible for old-age and survivors insurance benefits, must receive credit on his social security account for his income And with just a simple journal to record his sales, etc., he can main tain a basic record which will make it impossible to accurately report his annual self-employment income to the Director of Internal Revenue each year.

This report is filed as a part of his Federal income tax return. He pays a social security tax of 3 per cent of his net income of \$400 up to \$4200 in the taxable year. Payment of the social security tax is required by law even though

no Federal income tax is due. Tate points out that if the far-mer fails to keep records to make proper reports of his earnings, he stands to lose valuable insurance protection for himself in his old age and for his family if he should die at any age. Farmers who de sire information on the new law should write to the Social Security Administration, 425 Post Office Bldg., Wichita Falls, Texas, for Booklet No. OASI-25d.

Farm and Ranch Notes

Small gains are making good growth over most of the county with some fields producing grazing for livestock. In checking fields last week I found that we are beginning to have some in sect trouble in many fields with cutworms, grain mites and white

The cutworm will first be noticed by a small spot where the wheat has disappeared. This will get larger each day. The cutworm feeds mostly at nights and gets under clods or in cracks in the soil during the day. They cut off the young plants just above or slightly below the surface of the soil. If you are losing wheat where you once had a good stand it would be good to check for cutworms. They can be controlled with two pounds of toxaphene spray or dust per acre. If they are just starting you can control by spot spraying. It is very difficult to detect the

grain mites but their presence is first indicated by a yellowing ap-pearance of the the leaves and later the tips turn brown. This usually starts in low places where the wheat should be the best. The infested plants are stunted but it is doubtful that the yields of grain will be increased by controlling them. However control measures may be advisable when additional grazing is desired or when stands on young plants are threat ened. The mites are very small 1-32 to 1-16 inch long, adults have reddish-orange legs and their bodies are dark brown. They feed during the night but may be found around the base of the plants and under the clods during the day. They can be controlled by 0.25 pounds parathion or 0.25 pounds TEPP per acre applied as a spray Livestock should not be grazed for 14 days after using the parathion or three days after TEPP The white grubs feed on the

roots and if they are in sufficient number, stands may be lost. Not much can be done to control them after planting, but good controls have been secured by treating the seeds before planting with two oz. of aldrin or lindane per 100 lbs. of seed. This should be done if you have had trouble with the



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
