

McCahill Picks Rayon Over Nylon



Situations often arise on the highway when even the best drivers find they must make a sudden switch from one lane to another at high speed to avoid an accident. At times like this, control of the car depends largely on directional stability of tires.

Tom McCahill, noted automotive test driver and reporter, recently

ran a series of tire comparison tests for the American Viscose Division of PMC Corporation to determine which type of tire — rayon cord or nylon cord — pro-vides greater handling stability. The tests were conducted at the Daytona International Speedway, Daytona Beach, Fla.

After comparing the handling of several leading makes of the two types of tires on both sedans and station wagons, McCahill concluded that cars equipped with rayon cord tires are more easily controlled during fast maneuver ing at turnpike speeds than those riding on nylon cord tires.

The tests were set up so that McCahill did not know which type of tires he was using until after

he had completed his evaluations. Switching lanes at speeds of 60 and 70 mph, he noted that certain tires caused considerable bobble or oscillating action which made the cars hard to control.

"Differences in tire stability were very marked during these tests," McCahill stated in his final report. "Perhaps the most outstanding difference I found is that in every test, directional stability and roadability ratings for the nylon cord tires tended to get definitely worse as the

"On the other hand, I found the handling of rayon cord tires definitely superior in violent maneuvering as speed went up."

Still another method which has ben mentioned would be reducing the payment rate on only that acreage between the minimum 12.5 per cent and the maximum 35 per cent which producers may voulntarily divert. This would be a substantial blow to producer income and many believe would create serious administrative problems, especially

here in the Rolling Plains. These and perhaps others, are some of the pessibilities that ACPA will be considering next Wednesday. If cotton producers from across the cotton belt can each agreement on what method would be most desirable they may be able significantly to in fluence the Secretary's final decision.

If not, Cooper said, the best interests of the cotton industry may again play second fiddle to lesser considerations.

Pat Leroux, pilot of Knox City, managed to get out of the plane as it hit the ground and escaped with bruise injuries and a burn to his right arm.


