man's Forum on Medicare. Majority Of Area Farmers Agree On Uniform Spray Date -- Continue Check

At the meeting of area farmers Friday night at the American Legion Hall, 95 out of 97 farmers had agreed to participate in a uniform spraying program, according to the survey team.

June 20th had previously been set for the first spraying date, but survey teams that have been checking the area cotton for the Rolling Plains Cotton Growers Association have not found overwintered weevils feeding on the young plants up to

Besides the survey team, Emory Boring, area entomologist with the Extension Service in Vernon, and entomologists with Kerr-Mc-Gee will assist in a weekby-week check to determine when the weevils are beginning to move into the cotton. Spraying date will be set before there are large amounts of third-grown squares in the cotton fields.

The executive committee, which includes Sammy B. White, Eddie Shaver, Herb-

ert Bellinghausen. Charles Reese. John Crownover. Lynward Wilcox, and Jack Tankersley, will take the advice of these entomologists to determine the date.

The success of the farmerparticipation in the program was attributed to person-toperson contact by the following survey team: Sam E. Clonts, Reese, James Albus, Verlin Cypert, Harvey Freeman, Wilcox, White, and Buddy Angle.

When the date has been determined, it will be published in the Knox County Herald and also, a sign will be displayed in the window of Jones Drug Store. All farmers are asked to watch for this all-important date.

The group hopes to have an aerial applicator in the area the week that the spray is to be applied. Each farmer will have to do his own contracting for the low-volume malathion and application. They will also try to have sufficient ground rigs to put on heptachlor.

AUSTIN - State Board of Insurance is distributed over the 'growing tendency" of some insurance companies to cancel out or refuse to renew auto coverage on certain classes of driv-

At its mid-week (June 15) rate hearing, Board debated whether it should ask for new legislation or put into effect new administrative regulations to deal with the situation.

Board Chairman Wm. Hunter McLean said more and more drivers are being forced into higher-cost "assigned risk plan" coverage because of "unwillingness of companies to voluntarily issue insurance to young drivers, older drivers and drivers with poor driving records.

Another insurance rate boost is anticipated due to increasing accidents, injuries and traffic deaths, and higher repair and hospital costs. Rates were boosted 13.4 per cent in 1965.

McLean placed these among items for consideration at the mid-week meeting:

 Revival of a 'penalty sys tem' based on number of accidents and serious traffic violations in figuring rates. A version of the system was abandoned four years ago after a brief trial and strong public opposition.

 Alteration of the assigned risk plan to force all companies to take a proportionate share of 'sub-standard' risk coverage.

· Action to curb mass cancellation due to class, age, territory or agency and individual cancellations of policies of those who have no record of accidents or moving traffic violations.
