**Ban Put Back On Returning Cotton Burrs to Land**

Returning cotton burrs to the land in Knox and a number of other West Texas counties, including Haskell, is again prohibited, according to an announcement this week by Commissioner of Agriculture John C. White.

Returning burrs to the land, because of the Pink Bollworm menace, was banned for a num-

ber of years, but the ban was lifted last year by Commissioner White, who urged farmers to make use of the burrs to help rebuild the organic matter of the soil.

White, in announcing that the ban is again in effect, said, "The present existing conditions in the counties named indicate that greater precautions must be taken to prevent further spread of the pink bollworm."

**4-H BOYS STUDY HOGS AT APRIL MEETINGS**

Subject of the April 4-H meetings for the boys of Knox County was swine. Slides were shown on fitting, showing and judging hogs to all nine clubs in the county, and boys were encouraged to observe and practice correct methods in handling animals, grooming them, and trimming them for shows.

Pointers were also given by County Agent W. C. Pallmeyer on how to select a good animal, and in connection with the meeting, experiments with antibiotics are being carried on to determine the gains that can be realized by use of antibiotics in hog feed. Litters owned by Arnold Pack, Knox City, Maynard Moore of Rhineland, Gene Montandon of Munday, and Lee Jordan and Johnny Jones of Goree are being used in the experiment, and a litter owned by Nickie Leaverton of Benjamin will be tested.

Present experiment is with pellets which are implanted behind the pig's ear. The pellets are said to increase weight of the animals at weaning time by 10 percent. Results of the experiment will be released when completed.

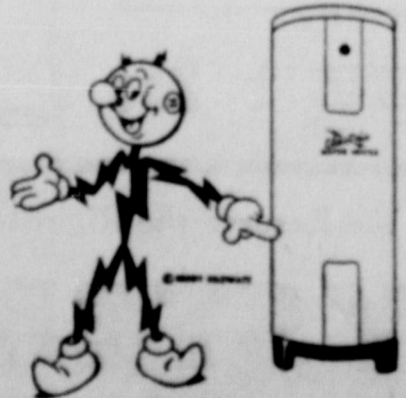

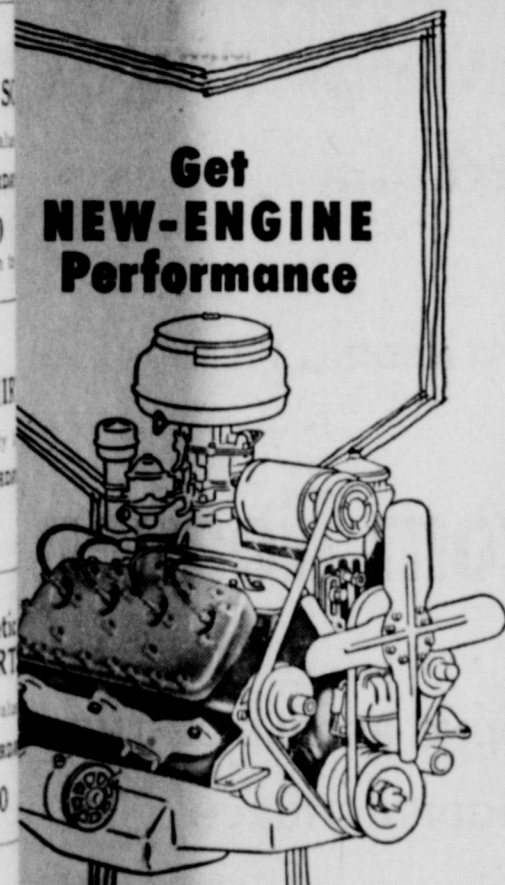

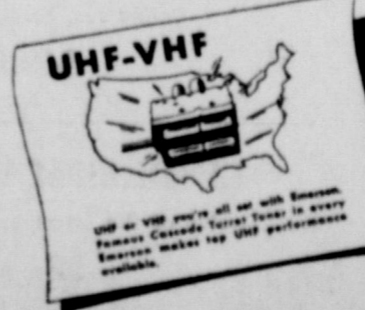
