To Perform At 11:18 A.M. KCHS Band To Compete In UIL Contest At Abilene Wed.

The Knox City High School Marching Band under the direction of Teresa White, senior drum major, will be among 23 bands competing in the University Interscholastic League marching band and twirling contests for Region II (south zone) next Wednesday, November 5, Director Wes Hays said the contests would be held at Rose Park Stadium in Abilene, and Knox City is scheduled to perform at 11:18 a.m. Other Class A bands participating include Spur, Albany,

Rotan, Robert Lee, and Roscoe, Class B bands will be Bronte, Jim Ned, Rochester (scheduled at 10:54 a.m.), and Jayton, while Class AA bands are Anson, Haskell, Merkel, Stamford, and Hamlin. Sweetwater, Cooper, and Abilene High are listed in Classes AAA and AAAA. Junior High bands, listed as Classes CC and CCC include Franklin, Jefferson, Lincoln, Madison, and Mann.

Contest chairman is Charles Traylor, associate director of the Abilene Christian College band and theory instructor. Judging the marching contest will be Dean Killion of Texas Tech, James Mallow, band director at Brady, and J. W. King of Hale Center. Ernie Ritchie, Cisco Junior College band director, and John Postlewaite will serve as twirling judges.

Mr. Hays explained that each band must perform its show in a minimum of five minutes and a maximum of eight minutes. He said there are also certain required movements to be performed during the show.

The team effort is scheduled immediately following their solo routines at 10:12 a.m. Twirling tryouts will be held on the east parking lot, weather permitting. Otherwise, they will be moved to the armory or the gym at Rose Park.

Class A ratings will be announced at 3:00 p.m. In preparation for the contest, Ed George, ACC instructor of music, was here Monday afternoon as this year's clinician and worked with Mr. Hays and the band students for several hours.

Mrs. Norma Dozier of Anson was here Saturday afternoon and gave the majorettes instructions regarding their contest routines.

Those who can go are encouraged to accompany the band to contest. Rose Park Stadium is located at S. South 8th and Barrow and is more easily approached from South 7th as this is a through street. Ample parking for cars will be provided, and the contest chairman reports that there are numerous restaurants in short driving distance from the contest site.

Knox City Man Named To 1969-70 Who's Who

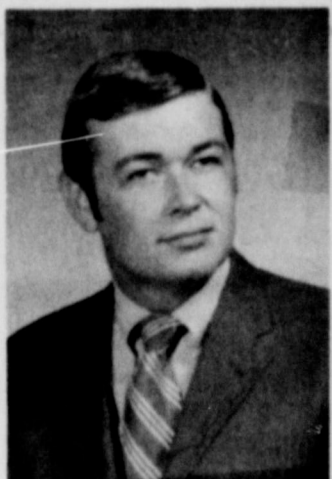

The master plan, advanced by the Army Corps of Engineers, suggests removal of natural salt from the river water in order to secure a source of

Pioneer Knox County Woman Dies October 22

Funeral services were held last Friday at 10:00 a. m. in the First Christian Church of Benjamin for Mrs. Myrtle C. Smith, 86, longtime Truscott resident. Baptist pastor K. E. Woolley and Rev. Travis White, pastor, officiated. Burial was in the Truscott Cemetery under the direction of Smith Funeral Home.

Mrs. Smith died at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday, October 22, in the Brazos Valley Care Home here after an extended illness.

Born in Wise County April 24, 1883, she came to Knox County as an infant with her late parents, James R. and Mary Craig, pioneer settlers of Knox County. She was a retired Knox County nurse and served 14 years on the Knox County Hospital Board. She was active in all county and civil affairs and a charter member and past president of the Knox County Historical Society.

She married Herbert A. Smith July 4, 1918. A retired Humble employee, he died in 1965. Mrs. Smith was Truscott correspondent for the Knox County Herald for several years before her eyesight began to fail. Survivors include one son, William Ralph (Billy) Smith of Fort Worth; two sisters, Mrs. Allie C. Moorhouse of Benjamin and Mrs. Van W. Browning of Stephenville; and several nieces and nephews.

Lone Star Asks Rate Increase

Lone Star Gas today asked the City of Knox City to increase local residential and commercial natural gas rates to enable the company to earn a reasonable rate of return on the fair value of properties used in rendering public service.

The application for rate increase, the first major request since 1953 based on an income deficiency in the Knox City distribution system, listed increased wages and salaries, higher interest rates on borrowed money and increased taxes as primary reasons for the deficiency.

The company indicated that it had used every means available to avoid a request for rate increase, but inflationary pressures not under the company's control necessitated the application. 'Obviously our wish to keep gas rates low must be balanced with the economic pressures we face,' Guy T. White, manager of the Seymour distribution office, said. 'These pressures can no longer be offset in any other way.'

Approval of the company's application would increase the average monthly residential gas bill approximately \$1.65. Lone Star Gas serves approximately 662 customers in Knox City.

The doctor told his mother that he would like to have been in Dallas for the Texas - O. U. game and went on to say that he really misses the "world" as the states are referred to.

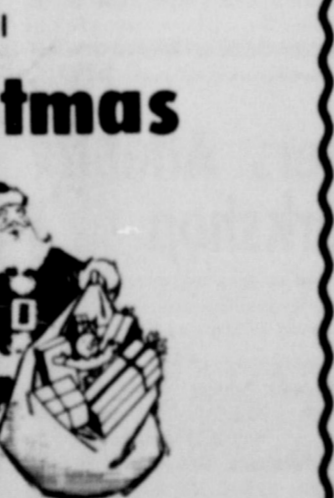

Weather Again Halts Harvesting

The weather has done it again. Harvesting has come to a complete halt in the Abilene territory, reports B. B. Manly, Jr., Officer in Charge of the U. S. D. A. Cotton Classing Office, Abilene, Texas. It appeared for a while that receipts would really pick up, as much of the crop over the area has been desiccated and is ready to strip.

We processed 7500 samples last week compared to 32,000 for the same week last year. This brings the seasons total to 26,000 compared to 65,500 for a seasons total last year at this time. Grades were about the same as last week with 38 per cent in the white category, 56 per cent in the light spotted category, and 5 per cent in the spotted category. Bark bales were 4 per cent and below grades were only 1 per cent.

Staple was a little shorter last week, with 46 per cent, 29; compared to 42 per cent for the previous week. Other staple lengths were: 28, 7 per cent; 30, 32 per cent; 31, 9 per cent; 32, 3 per cent; 36, 2 per cent; and 37, 1 per cent. Micronaire readings were about the same with 92 per cent in the premium or 3.5-4.9 range; 7 per cent, 5.0-5.2; and 1 per cent, 5.3 and above.

The Consumer and Marketing Service, Abilene, Texas, reports that prices are good on the cotton market and cotton is bringing producers from 125

Dyess AFB Has Announced Low Level Flying Routes

The world wide commitments of the 516th Tactical Air-Lift Wing (TAW), Dyess AFB, require continuous low level flying training. The highest possible degree of proficiency must be maintained and the 516th TAW aircrew must be current in all modes of aerial delivery. As a result, C-130 and C-7A aircraft are flown at low level altitudes over the "big country" on a daily basis.

These low level flights may be scheduled between 8 a. m. and midnight, Monday through Friday, and less frequently on weekends. Daylight missions are flown at an altitude of 500 feet above the terrain while night low level activities are conducted at least 1,000 feet above any obstacle, man made or geographic, within three miles of the prescribed track of the aircraft. Airspeeds will vary from 115 to 290 miles per hour.

All flights are made along specific routes which are approved by the Tactical Air Command, only after coordinating with the Federal Aviation Administration and local airport managers. Minimum disturbance of farms, ranches, and communities is the primary consideration in selecting low level routes. Towns, local airports, resorts, hatcheries and stock pens are avoided when possible.
