## Soil Maps For Sale

A multi-colored general soil map of Texas has now been published and is available for sale to the public, according to the Soil Conservation Service.

Arche Lieb, district conservationist for the U. S. Soil Conservation Service at Knox City, said the beautiful 36-by-45-inch map can be seen in his office. It shows soil information compiled from years of detailed soil survey work by the Soil Conservation Service in cooperation with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. Lieb said the map lists basic soil information which should be useful to teachers, planners, conservationists, contractors, engineers, developers, realtors, farmers, ranchers, researchers, and others.

The map gives color delineations of the 73 major soil associations (containing 161 separate soil series) in the state and their extent. It also lists special limitations of the soils that affect their use.

Inset maps show rainfall, temperature, and length of growing season across the state. Current and potential urban and rural uses by soil associations are also listed.

Published cooperatively by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and the Soil Conservation Service, the map is available in two sheets or printed front and back. Printed front and back, the map costs \$1.00. Printed on two separate sheets, the map costs \$4.00.

For mounting on a wall, Lieb recommended the two-sheet style.

For folding and filing, He said the map printed on both sides might be the best.

The map may be purchased from the Department of Agricultural Communications, Texas A&M University, College Station, Texas 77843.

## Santa Rosa Telephone Coop Receives Loan

Congressman Bob Price today received notification from the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Rural Electrification Administration, that the Santa Rosa Telephone Cooperative, Inc., Vernon, Texas, has received a loan in the amount of \$437,900. At two percent interest. The purpose of this loan is to finance facilities to connect 468 additional subscribers, replace and expand existing toll facilities, construct 64 miles of new line, and to finance direct-distance dialing facilities in 11 exchanges and various system improvements. Of the total amount of the loan, \$198,900, is to be used in Texas to serve Wilbarger, Childress, Clay, Cottle, Foard, Hardeman, Knox, Motley, and Wichita Counties. The remaining amount of this loan will be used in other counties in Texas and Oklahoma.

The Lay Witness Mission is Knox City's observance of Key '73 and plans were begun by representatives from the churches several months ago. Many persons have been busy with stacks of correspondence, finding housing for the visiting lay people, arranging for hostesses for the coffees, planning for meals as well as contacting women to be responsible for bringing food to the gatherings, planning and scheduling youth activities, arranging for a prayer chain through the night Wednesday before the beginning of the event on Friday, and working with committees on welcome, transportation, nursery, and visitation.

Friday at 5:30 p.m. team members will meet at The First United Methodist Church with Dr. Robert Chapman of Fort Worth, coordinator in preparation for the weekend activities.

Following this meeting, at 6:30 p.m. the entire community is invited to eat chicken and share in the fellowship at The First United Methodist Church. After the meal, the crowd will break up into many small groups for the final fellowship of the first evening of the three day mission.

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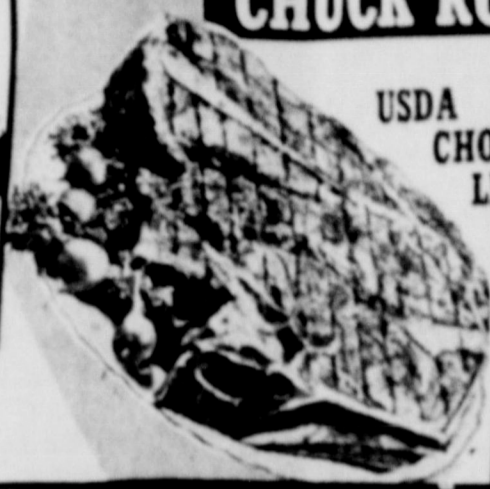

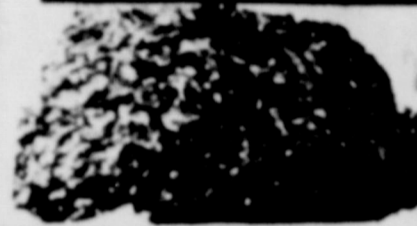

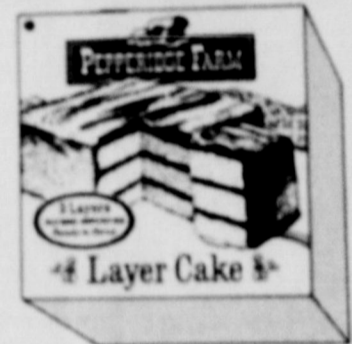
