


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

Many opinions have been ge- filling station attendants, and merated by the recent meat boycott. One of the strongest we have read or heard is the following commentary written by columnist Bob Brumfield of We include it here in its entirety for readers who may have missed it and might want to apply-or debate-the points it raises.

HUNGRY, HON? EAT YOUR HEART OUT!

It would serve this country's whining, complaining, pennywise and pound-foolish housewives right if all the farmers started selling everything they produce to foreign housewives.

The typical modern American urban housewife, for all of her virtues-real or imagined-is a short-sighted, lazy, pampered little ingrate whose primary interests are her underarms, her hair, her hands, her hips, her over-indulged and overeducated children, her overweight and overpaid husband and the next thrilling episode of "General Hospital"-in that order.

A hard day's work in a grocery or a bakery would do her a lot of good. So would taking over the duties of a farm wife for a while. Maybe then she'd realize that these people have a right to make a decent living just as much as her union scale husband.

Whoever gave the urban housewife the idea that she's the only damned person in the world having a hard time making ends meet? When was the last time she had to send her kids off to school with a couple of cold biscuits and a hunk of fatback to hold them until suppertime, or flopped down, bone-weary after working from sunup to sundown, and worried about whether the frost was going to kill the money crop?

EARLY SEASON BOLL

WEEVIL CONTROL Early season boll weevil control has been used effectively during the past few years in several fields in Jones County. In a result demonstration last year a yield of 382 lbs. cotton lint per acre was produced in the part of the field where early season boll weevil control was carried out and 300 lbs. was produced in the untreated part. To establish result demonstrations on early season boll weevil control fields must be selected that have heavy overwintered boll weevil populations each year. Starting about 25 days after planting these fields, should be inspected closely to determine if overwintered populatons are present. When overwintered boll weevils are found in numbers of fity or more per acre early season boll weevil control can be demonstrated. Control measures listed in L-508 for early season boll weevils should be applied prior to the time that onethird grown squares (about the

Several diseases are hitting the Texas grain sorghum crop, according to a plant pathologist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Downy mildew and Maize dwarf mosaic virus (MDMV) are the main culprits. MDMV causes mottled upper leaves in plants and certain hybrids show a prominent red leaf. Downy mildew is identified by the striping of a plant's leaves. Both diseases can cause heavy losses. Producers are urged to check their fields closely and to plant resistant varieties next year.

Some folks might look on that as a blessing but to ranchers it's actually a problem, says Garlyn Hoffman, range brush and weed control specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Ser-

vices. The problem is that the cutworms have stripped the mesquite of their foliage to the extent that the usual spray program to control the brush is in shambles. The damage seems to be worse on older.

"The mesquite control program using aerially applied her-Next, add cheese by bicides is designed to take advantage of lush mesquite foliexplains the Texas A&M University specialist, "The Herbicide is taken up by the foliage and kills the topgrowth. But without foliage,

spraying is not an effective

sapon against mesquite." Hoffman offers this guideline for ranchers who are contemplating a control program. If more than 10 percent of the mesquite trees have been affected by the cutworms, then an alternate method of control should be considered. Such methods include individual tree grubbing, chaining and root plowing.

Plants can be individually treated with 2, 4, 5-T, a herbicide, and diesel oil, but this is almost .impossible with the current energy crisis, notes the specialist.

Chaining is effective where there is sufficient soil moisture to allow maximum uprooting on single stem trees. Root plowing may be considered during the spring and early summer when forage grasses would re-establish, FARMERS CAN SAVE

ON FUEL USE COLLEGE STATION-With the nationwide fuel shortage now a reality, farmers as well as all Americans are being called on to stretch each gallon

of fuel as far as possible. Although farmers are in a priority group to receive special consideration for allocating fuel, it's still vital that they take measures to conserve fuel consumption emphasizes Henry O'Neal, agricultural engineer for the Texas Agricultural Extension Ser-

What are some of the key things a farmer can do to reduce fuel use?

O'Neal lists a few: Reduce tillage practices. Make just one tripover the field covering as many operations as possible. For instance, plant and apply herbicides or fertilizer at the same time.

Don't cultivate unless necessary.

Use the right tractor for the job, if there is a choice. Use a light tractor for light jobs and a bigger tractor heavier jobs. Use a diesel where possible tractor diesel fuel is more plentiful than gasoline.

Operate the tractor at proper speeds and keep it properly tuned. The operator's manual is a good guide on proper use. Don't let the tractor idle for lengthy periods.

Consider moving large equipment by truck rather than driving it on the highways.

Where possible, delay certain operations that will not affect the current crop season such as ditch clearing and land

leveling. The Texas A&M University System specialist points out that farmers should inform their local county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office regarding any


