## SCHOOL BOND ELECTION SET FOR SATURDAY

### Voters to Decide on \$200,000 Bond Proposal

Every eligible voter in the Knox County Independent School District was urged to vote Saturday on the proposal to issue \$200,000 in bonds for new construction and improvement of the school plant.

The election will be held at the American Legion Hall with C. C. Hoge as election judge. Claud E. Reed will be assistant judge, and clerks will be J. T. Gilpin and J. C. McGee.

A move by a group of citizens last week to petition the school board to increase the bond issue to a figure of \$300,000 or more apparently bogged down Guy Robinson, president, said Wednesday that no petition was presented to the board. The higher figure would have provided for construction of a new gymnasium.

The issue as proposed, according to members of the board, will provide what has been sorely needed for several years—adequate classrooms, properly equipped.

The 30-year issue would provide for removing the upper story of the present high school building, construction of additions on the east and west of the building, construction of a cafeteria (cafeteria which can be used for an auditorium), some remodeling of the present gymnasium, new furniture and equipment for the new classrooms that need new furniture, and possibly construction of dressing room at the Greyhound athletic field.

Additions on the east and west of the high school building would provide an additional 10,109 square feet of floor space, costing approximately \$130,000. The new construction on the west would be joined to the present grade school building by a covered passageway.

New construction on the gymnasium would amount to 332 square feet, and the cafeteria would have 3,800 square feet of floor space. Size of the cafeteria might be increased to 4,500 square feet if funds are available, according to Chas. E. Silk, superintendent of schools.

About \$30,000 of the issue would be earmarked to furnish and equip the new classrooms and to re-furnish and equip every classroom that does not have new furniture—from the fourth grade up, including the colored school.

Plans call for the present school cafeteria to be converted into a band building, including one large band room as well as several smaller rooms for practice and equipment. The present band room would be converted into a choral room.

"If we receive good, competitive bids," Mr. Silk said, "construction costs may be less than tentatively figured by the architects. In that event, the amount saved would be used for additional construction that is needed."

If approved by the voters Saturday, the issue will bring the district's total bonded indebtedness to \$357,000, which is within 7 per cent of the total valuation for tax purposes, and is considered a very safe figure by the state and by bonding companies, the superintendent said.

Average annual payments on the indebtedness for the first 20 years will be \$19,518, and for the next ten years payments will be \$18,495. These payments can still be made even if the district's total valuation should decrease considerably, Mr. Silk added. He concluded, "The school board, in deciding on this plan, chose a route that will take care of our needs and at the same time be safe over a period of years."

### Lions Toy Party Set for Wednesday

Members of the Knox City Lions Club were reminded Wednesday that next Wednesday, Dec. 21, is the date for the club's annual "toy party," and each member is to bring a toy to the meeting.

The toys will be "demonstrated" at the meeting, then turned over to the American Legion for distribution in Christmas baskets.

Club President G. W. Coats named Bud Thompson and Jack Fisher as team captains for the membership drive that will be conducted in January. The club membership will be divided into two teams for the contest.

Program at Wednesday's meeting was brought by a group of sixth graders, choral students of Mrs. Curtis Casey, county public schools music teacher. The children sang a number of songs in keeping with the Christmas season. Accompanying the group was their classroom teacher, Mrs. Nichols.

### Farmers Approve Marketing Quotas

Knox County cotton farmers joined others in the 21 cotton growing states in overwhelmingly approving marketing quotas on next year's crop.

The vote in Knox County was 306 for, 20 against. According to J. T. Gilpin, manager of the Knox County ASC office, about 976 farmers in the county were eligible to vote. Over the nation, the quotas were approved by a margin of 76.2 per cent.

Results of the referendum mean that quotas will continue in effect on 1956 cotton, penalties will apply on excess cotton, acreage allotments will be in effect, price supports will be available to "eligible" growers (who comply with their acreage allotments).

Secretary of Agriculture Benson has not yet determined what the support rate will be under the new flexible system, "which can vary from 75 to 90 per cent of parity. Cotton experts say the support may be reduced to as low as 80 per cent instead of the present 90 per cent. This would put the base rate at 29 cents a pound compared to 31.7 cents this year.

O'Brien schools will dismiss next Thursday, Dec. 22, for Christmas holidays, Supt. Ray V. Stark said Wednesday.

## Benjamin Enjoying New Water Supply

Benjaminites are smacking their lips over their coffee these days.

And for the first time, residents of the county seat can turn on their faucets and get plenty of cool, clear well water.

Source of the new water supply is the Knox County Water Control and Improvement District's wells on the T. B. Hertel farm four miles southeast of the Brazos River bridge. The wells are approximately nine miles from Benjamin.

The district, comprising the Benjamin School District, voted bonds for the \$135,000 project and is selling the water to the city.

The switchover to the new system was completed December 8. According to City Secretary W. M. Hertel, tests show that the water is softer than the municipal water in either Knox City or Munday. Housewives say very little more

soap is required than was required by the lake water.

Water from the wells is piped to a 500,000 gallon storage reservoir at the Benjamin city lake, and from there it is pumped to the city's old stand-pipe, which has a capacity of 55,000 gallons. Maximum amount that can be pumped by the system is 150,000 gallons a day, Hertel said.

New water rates are \$3.50 for the first 2,000 gallons, with a 50-cent discount if paid by the 10th of the month; 75 cents per thousand for the next 8,000 gallons; 60 cents per thousand for the next 10,000 gallons; and 50 cents per thousand for all over that amount.

The Benjamin school will pay the regular rates up to 40,000 gallons, but will pay only 12 cents per thousand gallons for all above that amount.

In the past, Benjamin has been without a water supply about 25 per cent of the time, and at other times the lake water was barely potable.

The water district's bonds run for a period of 30 years and the district has a contract to sell water to the City of Benjamin for the same period of time. The district's board of directors consists of Wallace Glenn, president; Johnny Hertel, secretary; Lloyd Griffith, Grady Chapman and O. D. Propps. An election has been called for January 10 to elect three directors, with Glenn, Hertel and Propps as candidates for re-election.

Hertel said Tuesday that the city lake will be used as a recreation center, and will be amply stocked with bass and channel catfish.

### New Light on an Old Subject

Mr. Evans from the Lighting Company gave an interesting talk at the Community Hall last night — on how farmers can cut electric bills. For those who missed it, here's a short recap.

Don't try to light up the cobwebs in the rafters. Use a reflector and a smaller bulb will probably do the job. Too many farmers use "aked bulbs that waste 50% of the light.

Try using moveable projector bulbs that beam light the way a searchlight does. A couple of these "spots" will often give you better illumination than a gang of juice-wasting overhead lamps.

From where I sit, it's amazing how often we misuse the things we have . . . like electricity. We also make a mistake if we misuse our right of personal choice—about which candidate to vote for, say, or whether beer or coffee makes the ideal mealtime drink—by trying to force our opinions on others. Respect for the other fellow's point of view should be our "guiding light."

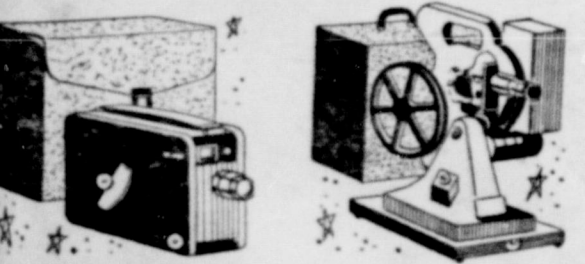

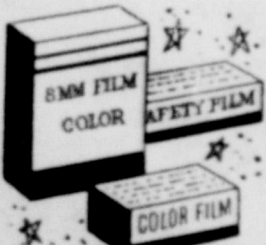

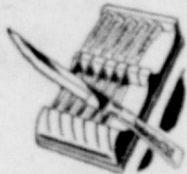

Loans are made by the Farmers Home Administration, primarily out of funds advanced by private lending institutions. The Government insures the repayments of the loan. The repayment period on loans to individuals can be up to 20 years, and can be secured by liens on chattels or real estate, depending on the amount and length of the loan.

Information about Soil and Water Conservation loans can be obtained from the local county agent, W. J. Bryan, Ray Blackwell, representative of the Soil Conservation Service, Jesse Gilpin, ASC and the local Farmers Home Administration office. Applications for loans are to be made at the county office of the Farmers Home Administration, located at Seymour, and in Knox City each Tuesday at the ASC office from 10 to 2 p.m. The three-member County Committee, Murval H. Jackson, B. E. Smith, John H. Atterbury, of the Farmers Home Administration, will certify as to the eligibility of applicants for Soil and Water Conservation loans.
