Gulf States Energy Corp. of Dallas No. 1 D.J. Brookreson II is a planned 6,000-foot Mississippi test.

Location is 15 miles north of Old Glory on a 320 acre lease. It spots 1,980 feet from the north and 660 feet from the east lines of Section 2, GH&H (on some maps BBB&C) Survey, A-1584.

William E. Hendon Jr. of Midland will re-enter to 6,200 feet an abandoned wildcat 12 miles northeast of Aspermont.

It is No. 1 Oldham Estate, spotting 467 feet from the north and west lines of Section 39, Bock D. H&TC Survey.

The venture was plugged in 1955 at 6,215 feet by Anderson & Word.

Taubert, Steed, Gunn & Medders of Wichita Falls No. 13-A-Y S.B. Burnett Estate will be drilled 17 miles southeast of Guthrie in the Anne Tandy (Lowere Stawn) Field.

Having a proposed depth of 5,900 feet, it spots 980 feet from the south and 2,720 feet from the west lines of Section 11, Block X, R.M. Thomson Survey.

Low-Angle Parking Comes To KC

On the agenda of the city council at a recent monthly meeting was that of low angle parking for downtown Knox City.

Mayor Buddy Angle and councilmen Carl Shelton, Lynn Worley, Celso Gonzales Jr., A.P. Denton, and Ted C. Alexander Jr. discussed the 30 degree low angle parking

and felt that it would not only make safer driving conditions for residents, but also for travelers through Knox City.

Downtown streets were marked at the new 30 degree angles last week, and the visibility for drivers has been doubled to 100 feet when backing out. The old 45 degree angle provided only 50 feet visibility. There is now complete visibility through a driver's rear window and corner posts do not obstruct the view. It will also be noted

Historical Papers Will Be Presented

State Rep. Charles Finnell of Holliday will present his Constitutional Convention papers to the Fort Belknap Archives board on Saturday, December 7. Finnell accepted the invitation of Dr. Kenneth Neighbors, Midwestern University history professor and president of Fort Belknap Archives Inc., in Young County, to donate his papers at the annual meeting. Finnell, an 8-year veteran of the Texas House of Representatives, served as delegate to the seven-month Constitutional Convention in Austin earlier this year.

"The convention was a learning experience not only for those who served as delegates but for all Texans," Finnell said. "The knowledge we have gained will be beneficial in many areas of public concern."

Finnell observed, "If and when there is to be another effort toward this end, there should be delegates elected solely for that purpose. Never again should the Texas Legislature sit as an 'ex-officio' Constitutional Convention."

"I am honored to have been asked to leave these papers to such a worthwhile area-wide historical organization," Finnell said.

The public is invited to attend the event at 10:00 a.m. on Saturday at Fort Belknap near Newcastle.

USDA Office Makes First Cotton Report

USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service Office at Munday, November 25 and classed 2,300 samples during the first week of operation. At the same time last year, 43,000 had been classed.

Grade 42 accounted for thirty-eight percent of the cotton classed, and grade 52 accounted for twenty-one percent. White grades totaled nineteen percent, with grade 41 at nine percent. Grades 43 and 53 accounted for ten and four percent respectively. The predominant staple length was 30 with thirty-eight percent, followed by staple 31 with twenty-six percent, and staple 29 with twenty-two percent. Staple 32 and longer accounted for twelve percent of the cotton classed.

Mike readings were excellent with ninety-eight percent falling in the 3.5-4.9 range. Just under two percent miked 5.0 or higher.

Prices quoted on the Dallas Exchange this week include grade 51 staple 30 at 30.75 cents per pound, and staple 31 at 32.25 cents; grade 42 with staple 30 at 31.00 cents, and staple 31 at 32.25 cents.

G.E.D. Tests To Be Dec. 12

General Education Development Tests will be given in Rule High School Auditorium Thursday, December 12, at 8:00 a.m.

Five tests will be given in English, Literature, Social Studies, Science, and Mathematics. If a person passes these five tests, the Texas Education Agency will issue a High School Equivalency Diploma. This diploma meets the educational requirements for employment as well as partial requirement for College entrance or job training schools.

A fee of \$15.00 is charged for all five tests and each test takes about two hours. A person must be eighteen (or at least 17 years old) and must have been out of school for one full calendar year. If a person is seventeen when the tests are taken, the diploma will not be issued until the person is eighteen.

Notes From Nancy

With the holiday baking season beginning, homemakers are searching for ways to substitute other sweets for expensive cane sugar.

Honey, molasses, or sorghum, corn syrup and cane syrup are sweetening agents that will work as well as white sugar in baking.

Some general guidelines for these substitutions will help homemakers achieve economical -- and high quality -- baked goods.

Honey: For one cup of sugar in baking, use one cup honey and reduce liquid one-fourth cup for each cup of honey used.

If about half the sugar is retained in a recipe an honey substituted for the other half, a better quality product will

result. In baking, use one-fourth teaspoon soda for each cup of honey. This is in addition to baking powder in the recipe when honey is substituted for sugar.

Molasses or sorghum: For one cup sugar, use one and one-half cups molasses or sorghum and reduce liquid one-fourth cup for each cup of molasses or sorghum used.

Corn syrup: For one cup of sugar, use two cups corn syrup and reduce liquid one-fourth cup for each cup of corn syrup used.

Cane syrup: One and one-half cups of cane syrup is equal in sweetness to one cup of cane sugar.

In cakes and cookies, replace sugar with syrup, mea-

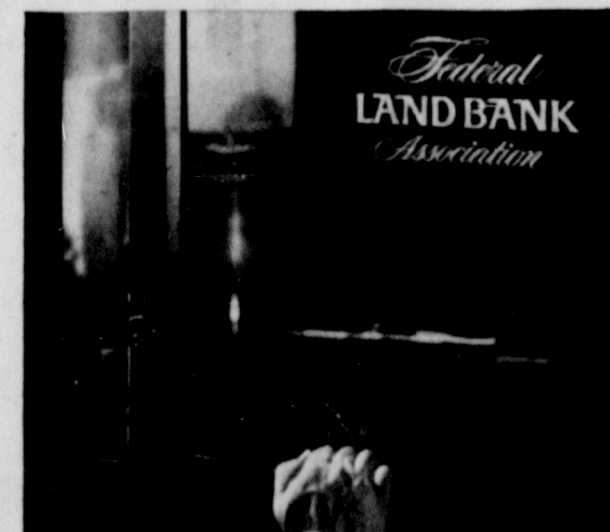

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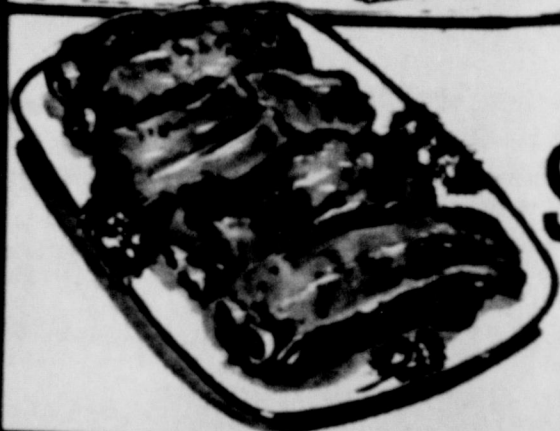
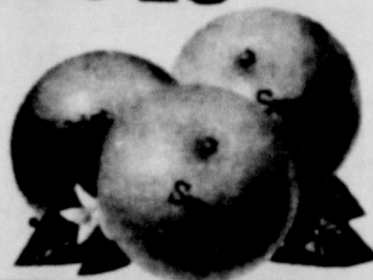

Hunting Is Big Business

This time of year, farmers and ranchers all over Texas are hearing booming shot-guns, or cracking rifles. Deer and quail season opened in many Texas counties this month. To some, hunters mean headaches; to others they mean dollars. Whether we like it or not, hunting in Texas has become a million dollar business. Add to this the fact that many farmers and ranchers like to hunt, wildlife offers a gold mine that has been largely overlooked in Texas.

According to recent census reports, Texas has over 5,000,000 hunters. These hunters spend an average of 10 days per hunt per year. They travel a total of 125,818,000 miles. At 10 cents per mile, that's \$12,581,800.00. In addition they spend over \$35,575,000 for licenses, leases, guns, ammunition, eating and lodging. This combines to make a staggering total of over \$48 billion being spent annually by hunters in Texas.

Just how much of the millions being spent on hunting finds its way into local land owners and merchants pockets depends on the land owner and merchant.

Locally led conservation programs have recognized the potential wildlife offers in our area. The Wichita Brazos Soil and Water Conservation District cooperating with the Soil Conservation Service, local Chambers of Commerce and farmers and ranchers offers assistance in improving wildlife and hunting areas.

It is a fact that the rangeland and cropland in our area provides excellent quail and dove habitat. To the interested land owner, much can be done to improve the wildlife habitat. Our knowledge of birds and animals in the wild will grow with time, but records from captive specimens may be all we will have from some creatures. The average life span of the dove is 12 years, the quail ten years. Hunters kill only about 10% of the annual quail crop. Disease, hunger, exposure, and predators kill a much higher percent each year. To increase our dove and quail population we must provide the best habitat possible.

Most game birds and animals are "edge" creatures; they exist in greatest numbers at the edge of wooded and open areas. They prefer to feed in the open where food plants are more plentiful and more nutritious, yet they want wooded areas nearby for escape cover. Clearing strips, blocks or patterns in dense brush increases the edge preferred by wildlife.

Properly planned grassland restoration can be done in such a way as to benefit wildlife and livestock. Improved highly productive grasslands offer a more stable wildlife food supply. Depleted grass land infested with solid brush offers plenty of cover but little food during stress periods such as droughts or severe winters. Brush control can harm wildlife habitat if it is poorly planned and not followed by grassland restoration. Wise brush control can, when used with proper management, greatly benefit wildlife.

The wildlife you want to see and harvest is an agricultural crop. It is called "farm game" because it is grown on privately owned farms and ranches that produce other agricultural crops such as cotton and livestock. Wildlife must have food and a place to live. Food, cover, and water for wildlife are by-products of soil and water conservation practices. That is why ponds, range seeding, grassed waterways and many more con-

Holiday Jobs May Affect SS Eligibility

Earnings from holiday jobs can affect the monthly payments of students, housewives, and other people getting benefits from social security, according to Carl Beisner, claims representative from the Vernon social security office. The amount people earn from holiday jobs will cause a reduction in their social security checks if their total earnings for 1974 are over \$2,400.

"For every \$2 you earn over \$2,400, \$1 in social security benefits is withheld," Beisner said. "But no matter how much you earn for the year, you can get your full social security payment for any month in which you neither earn over \$200 nor do substantial work in your own business."

People planning to take holiday jobs should notify social security as soon as possible if they know their earnings for this year will go over \$2,400, according to Mr. Beisner.

"Refunding overpayments to social security could cause financial hardships," he said.

People can get information about earnings and social security benefits by calling or writing any social security office. The Vernon social security office is at 1701 Cumberland. The phone number is 817-552-9346.
