These trappers furnished by the U. S. Biological Survey have saved enough sheep for me to pay my entire taxes for 1936". Mr. Hendrix continued. Four trappers hired by the Ranchers and Commissioners Court are trapping, shooting, and poisoning coyotes, and it is becoming easier to raise turkeys, chickens, calves and sheep in King County.

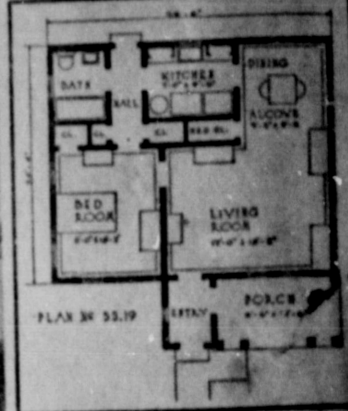
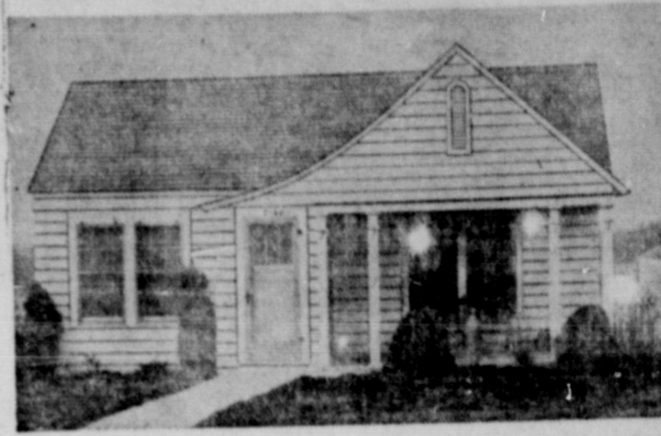
