Postmaster Urges Sending Yule Cards By First Class Mail

To insure that your friends will hear from you this Christmas, all cards should be sent by first class mail, Postmaster Jeff Graham said this week.

According to the postmaster, many thousands of cards are undeliverable each year, either because of hastily scribbled addresses or because they are sent by third class mail-which cannot be forwarded or return-

Loosely-wrapped gift packages-another trouble that can be easily avoided-are also often undeliverable.

To offset these perennial problems. Graham recommends that everyone begin now to bring address books up to date.

"And by all means mail your cards and packages-this week or next if possible."

"Wrap shipping cartons carefully, with a good cord pulled over and under several times. Stuff packages properly to protect any fragile items they may contain, and use heavy wrapping paper to help insure safe delivery.

Packages are limited to 70 exceed 100 inches in length and Knox City. girth combined.

Special care should be given writing or printing clearly all names and addresses. Christmas seals may be placed only on the backs of packages. Stick ers are also allowable.

The postmaster emphasized that little is saved in sending greetings in unsealed envelopes because third class mail rates have been raised to two cents.

First class mall also has sev eral advantages: Cards may carry written messages; are dispatched and delivered first; if necessary, they are forwarded to new addresses without additional charge; and if undeliverable, they are returned if the sender's address is
