KC Man Dies In Sun. Night Blaze

Antonio (Tony) Vallejo, 67, died from burns Sunday night in a blaze which destroyed the frame barracks in which he lived near Brazos Valley G'n here. A hole in his skull after his body was taken from the wreckage of the building caused some suspicion that he might have been shot to death. The hole, however, was found to have been the result of an operation he had had for a brain tumor several years ago. The body was carried by a Smith Funeral Home ambulance to Wichita Falls where an autopsy was performed Monday.

Graveside rites were held in the Knox City Cemetery Tuesday at 11 a. m. with the Rev. Gerald Petty, Baptist pastor officiating.

Cause of the fire has not been determined.

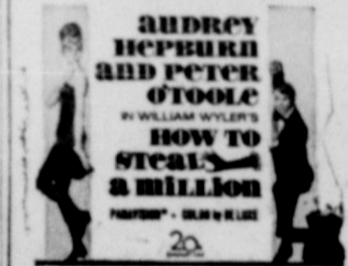

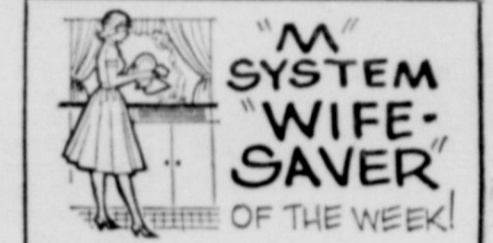

Kick Off Meeting Held Thursday Night at Stamford For Rolling Plains Cotton Growers, Theme-Organize for Cotton

The regular quarterly meeting of the Board of Directors of the Rolling Plains Cotton Growers was held on Thursday night, March 2, in Stamford, Texas. News media from the Rolling Plains were special guests to this "Kick-off" meeting for a new and aggressive cotton promotion program in the area.

The theme of the meeting centered around the need for an organized effort for cotton in 1967 not only in the Rolling Plains but nationally. Earl Younts of the National Cotton Council explained the need for 25 million dollars to carry out an adequate nationwide research and promotion program and added that chances are excellent that this goal will be reached. The passing of the recent dollar a bale program by producers has offered this bright possibility.

Bland Harrison, Farmer Fieldman for the ASCS, explained the new farmer certification program for certifying plant 4d acreage. Under this new program, farmers themselves measure and certify their planted areas. 25 per cent of those certifying will be spot checked for accuracy. All counties in the Rolling Plains are not under certification this year but all will probably be next year. Producers are urged to check on

conditions in their home counties.

The recent allocation of additional pounds of 18 counties was explained with the procedures used. Action is continuing in 5 counties with denied appeals being refiled. RPCG is continuing to work for fair and equitable treatment for all.

In the business session, it was reported by J. B. Cooper, Jr., President of RPCG, that the Department of Agriculture was considering widening price differentials for short staple cotton severely in 1967. If recommendations of some are followed, strict low middling light spot cotton with 3.8-4.9 micronaire will have a loan value of 14.00 cents in 1967. "It is most unfortunate that there are those who have misguided impressions as to the value of Rolling Plains cotton," he added, and it is one of the purposes of RPCG to correct these impressions which we fully intend to do."

The annual meeting of the Rolling Plains Cotton Growers will be held in Stamford, Texas at the High School Auditorium on Thursday, March 23, beginning at 2:00 p.m. All area farmers are urged to make plans and attend since a program has been designed to assist Rolling Plains farmers in quality improvement.

Reports from Group Medical and Surgical Services, the part of the Blue Cross Blue Shield organization in Dallas which handles Medicare doctor bills claims for the Knox County area indicate that payment of some claims is being slowed up because medicare identification numbers are not shown on the request for payment form.

Edwin Draughon, Social Security manager in Vernon, said the problem of missing medicare numbers has been most frequent on claims submitted by beneficiaries.

"Even though the number may seem like a very simple item, it is very important to the medicare carrier," he said. "Without the medicare identification number, it is very difficult for the carrier to find out if you are actually signed up for doctor bill insurance or if you have met your \$50 deductible for the year. When the number is not shown on the request for payment form Mr. Draughon said, the carrier must write to the social security district office or the beneficiary to get it. Naturally, time is lost and the payment is not made as quickly as it could be.

Mr. Draughon advised beneficiaries to be sure that they copy the number from their red, white and blue medicare card in the blank at the upper right hand corner of the request for payment form before sending it to Group Medical & Surgical Services.

While the missing medicare identification number has been noted as one of the most frequent errors on the claims forms, signatures, addresses and other items have also been reported missing from some forms.

"There are a couple of important things for beneficiaries who pay their doctor bills and send in their own request for payment forms to remember," Mr. Draughon said. "Be careful to fill in all blanks on the top half of the form and be sure to either have your doctor complete the bottom part of the form or you should enclose his itemized receipted bill."

Only 6 Weeks Left To Replace Your Auto Sticker

The director of the Texas Department of Public Safety reminded motorists today that only about six weeks remain before enforcement begins on the 1967 vehicle inspection stickers.

Col. Homer Garrison Jr., DPS director, said that the law allows for no extension of the April 15 deadline and urged drivers to have their vehicles inspected before the last minute lines begin forming.

Garrison pointed out that some two and one-quarter million vehicles in Texas remain to be inspected in order to comply with state law. This amounts to approximately 14 vehicles per working day for each of the 5,500 official inspection stations.

"Undoubtedly," Garrison stated, "many motorists will wait until the last day, and it may be very difficult to find an inspection station that is not swamped with late-comers."

"In order to secure an orderly flow of the remaining uninspected vehicles through the inspection stations we urge each motorist to have the inspection attended to as soon as possible. This can easily be taken care of during a routine visit to an authorized neighborhood inspection station."
