Child Care Act Effective Jan. 1

A new child care law signed June 21, 1975, by Gov. Dolph Briscoe will greatly affect home child care in Texas. The law becomes effective January 1, 1976, and repeals the current statute.

The law, Senate Bill 965, will provide for four child care licenses and a new program entitled "Registered Family Homes". The registration program will be of great interest to those people who want to "baby sit six or fewer children in their homes.

The purpose of the new law is to guarantee a safe, healthy environment for Texas children when they must be left away from their parents. Care of unrelated children has become a big business as more mothers return to work.





SOIL TESTING TIME

Having the soil on your crop or pastureland tested now can save you time and

Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture, and the Fertilizer Institute have launched a campaign to encourage soil testing this fall. Theme of the campaign is "Soil Test in '75, Profit in '76."

A soil test is an analysis of soil that measures nutrient levels, acidity, and the amount of soluble salts in the soil. It pinpoints deficiencies in the soil and can help you determine how much lime and fertilizer to use next year.
