## Burkburnett Firm Has Low Bid

In a regular meeting of the City Council Monday night, Bowles Construction Company of Burkburnett was declared the apparent lowest and best bidder with an \$84,824.28 bid for the Community Development Block grant to be used for water mains extensions and fire hydrant additions.

Attending were Mayor R. Kenneth Crowover, city secretary Faye Railsback, and councilmen Celso Gonzales, A.P. Denton, Vernon Bridges, and Charles Auburg. Councilman Lynn Worley was not present. On hand to open the bids was city engineer Ernest L. Andrews of Wichita Falls, who has served in this capacity since 1971.

A public hearing was also conducted Monday night to hear ideas for projects and to determine on which projects to file for pre-application for 1976 funding of Community Development Block grants.

## Directors Hear Chamber Plans

At the regular breakfast meeting of the Knox City Chamber of Commerce Tuesday morning at Korner Kitchen, officers and directors heard plans for the downtown parking area discussed as well as the housing project by David Counts, president.

Also on the agenda was the discussion of the status of the KC Jamboree which has been sponsored by the Chamber the past three months. It was agreed that the Jamboree organization could probably be more effective in serving the community as a separate group rather than through a sponsoring agency.

Also, suggestions were made for the guest speaker for the March chamber banquet.

W.R. Baker made a motion that the Chamber make a resolution commending the city council for its very effective stand on the proposed gas rate increase. The motion was seconded by J.B. Tabor and members voted in favor.

Chamber secretary-manager Mrs. Doris Crowover also gave a progress report on the Merchants' Appreciation Programs slated December 6, 13, and 20.

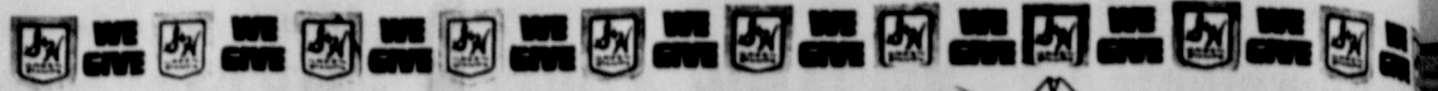

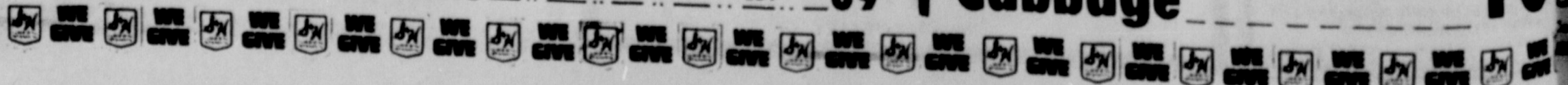

## Farm And Ranch News

**SOIL TESTING TIME**  
Having the soil on your crop or pastureland tested now can save you time and money later.

That's why the Extension Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture, and the Fertilizer Institute have launched a campaign to encourage soil testing this fall. Theme of the campaign is "Soil Test in '75, Profit in '76."

A soil test is an analysis of soil that measures nutrient levels, acidity, and the amount of soluble salts in the soil. It pinpoints deficiencies in the soil and can help you determine how much lime and fertilizer to use next year. And, a regular testing program is important as it provides a field history that is much more useful than a single test. Sampling all fields at two to four year intervals or sampling a fourth or half of a field annually to help determine changes in fertility levels and to adjust fertilization and liming practice for profitable production is recommended. Annual testing may be necessary where high rates of manure or fertilizer are applied.

Testing early is just good management sense. Knowing how much fertilizer the soil needs gives you more time to make decisions and order the right amount of fertilizer now. Furthermore, both under fertilizing as well as over fertilizing reduce profits. If you wait until spring to test soil, it could take longer to get results because testing labs are usually much busier in the

## SS News

Medicare is now paying \$5 million a week for health care expenses of about 23,000 persons who have kidney disease, according to Carl Beisner, Claims Representative from Vernon.

Medicare health insurance is available to workers insured under social security, or their dependents, who have permanent kidney failure.

Medicare coverage begins the fourth month after renal dialysis (artificial kidney treatment) starts. "The coverage lasts for 12 months after dialysis ends or the patient has a successful kidney transplant," Carl Beisner said.

Medicare also helps pay for a wide variety of the health care expenses of persons 65 and over and disabled persons of any age who have been entitled to social security disability payments for 24 consecutive months or more.

The program is administered by the Social Security Administration, an agency of the U.S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare.

"You can get information about Medicare by calling or writing any social security office," Carl Beisner said. The Vernon office is at 1701 Cumberland (Corner of Cumberland and Peace). The phone number is 817-552-9346.
