

It is with a prayer on our lips that we enter this small discussion of dancing. The thing that prompts this article is the fact that the school board of the Knox City schools has voted in favor of using the buildings of the public schools for square dances. We want every honest-hearted, openminded individual to consider the following things.

1. It has come to the attention of members of the church of Christ in Knox City that the Supreme Court ruled that the Bible could not be taught in our public schools because there might be just "one" atheistic student in the class and his conscience would be offended and we have no right to so offend him. (We are not advocating the union of state and church nor school and church, but notice:) Certainly if "one lone atheist" can keep the Bible out of the schools upon the grounds that it would offend his conscience then by what right would the board here vote for the giving of square dances when many are opposed to this and these things are contrary to their consciences?

2. We appreciate the efforts of the board toward the advancement of our school system, but we do believe that they should have considered those who oppose such things on both moral and religious principles.

3. We realize that no child is "forced" to take these square dance lessons, but that the children who do not take them are considered old fogeys by their friends, and much persecution is turned in their direction.

4. Read the following scriptures: 1 John 2:15 (Is dancing of the world?) Also Galatians 5:19-21 where "lasciviousness and Reveling" are both condemned. Dancing comes under the heading of lasciviousness and reveling.






