Hounds Down Paducah 21-6

The Knox City Greyhounds stopped the Paducah Dragons 21-6 Friday night at Greyhound Stadium after the Dragons made their only score on their first possession of the game. The Dragons drove 80 yards downfield in 11 plays. Weldon Jones ended the drive when he scored with 6:49 remaining in the first quarter. The Dragons' run for extra points failed.

The Hounds returned the ball to Paducah seven plays later when the Dragons recovered a Greyhound fumble.

After several ball exchanges, Rusty Grimley recovered a Paducah fumble, and the Hounds scored five plays later when Jimmy Don Moore went in for the touch-down. The extra point kick was good, and the Hounds led 7-6 with 1:28 left in the half.

The Greyhounds came back with an on-side kick, covered by Flint Richardson. The Hounds, unable to make their first down, turned the ball over to the Dragons. Mark Howell stopped Paducah on their first play when he intercepted a Dragon pass, but Danny Garrett stole the ball on an interception for the Dragons two plays later. One other turnover of importance to the Hounds came when on the next play Charlie Fly intercepted another Dragon pass and returned it for a Greyhound TD with no time remaining in the half. The point after gave the Hounds a 14-6 halftime lead.

The ball was exchanged throughout the third, and into the fourth quarter, with Tim Whitten and Tommy Mangis each recovering a Dragon fumble and the Dragons recovering one fumble by the Hounds.

The Greyhounds began a drive late in the fourth quarter on the Paducah 21 yard line. See HOUNDS Pg. 4

Robert L. Adkins of Sweetwater has completed a well one and a half miles west of Knox City, the James B. Anderson No. 1.

Completed on a pump, it had a daily potential of 37 barrels.

The 4 1/2-inch casing was set at a depth of 4861 feet.

KING COUNTY

Taubert, Steed, Gunn, and Medders of Wichita Falls completed three wells in the area 15 miles southeast of Guthrie in King County.

No. 1-NA S.B. Burnett Estate is in the Anne Tandy (Conglomerate) Field. It spots 2,000 feet from the northeast and southeast lines of Section 1, Block X, R.M. Thomson Survey.

Daily potential was 206 barrels of 36 gravity oil flowing through a 14-64-inch choke from perforations at 5,715-23 feet.

Operator set the 4 1/2-inch casing at 5,843 feet, total depth. Gas-oil ratio was 350-1.

No. 2-NA S.B. Burnett is in the Anne Tandy (5,400 Strawn) Field, spotting 990 feet from the northwest and 660 feet from the southwest lines of Section 2, Block X, R.M. Thomson Survey.

Add New Life To Dull Fireplaces

Is your fireplace looking dull and lifeless? Does it need a "pick-me-up"? Homemakers need worry no longer for help is here.

Fireplaces can look "clean as new" again with a mild acid bleach wash. It may be as simple as using a solution of vinegar or detergent and water. This will remove minor soot and smoke stains from the fireplace.

But, if your fireplace dirt and grime problems are the more stubborn variety, a mixture of one part muriatic acid (available at hardware, drug, or builder supply stores) to 10

parts water may be needed. Apply this mixture with a scrub brush to wet the surface thoroughly. Start at the top and work down. Rinse the brick with water immediately.

It's a good idea to wear rubber gloves and some type of eye protection. Be careful not to get this mixture on skin or clothing.

The muriatic acid mixture will discolor stonework, buff or gray brick and shouldn't be used on these surfaces. The homemaker may want to test the acid on other bricks in an inconspicuous spot to see if the brick will discolor.
