The Agriculture Department is ued a report this week showing that U. S. cotton farmers are sus taining further losses in their export markets.

Exports during the first four months of the present marketing season, which began last Aug. 1, were reported at 532,000 bales. This was a decline of 55 per cent from the 1,117,000 bales exported in the corresponding period last of the year, but they involve loss-

The department said the decline can be attributed mainly to three

1. Expectation by foreign buyers able later at lower prices;

2. Availability of large quantities of foreign-grown cotton at prices as much as 3 cents a pound -or up to 25 per cent-below those of comparable quality U. S. cotton; and

3. A recent decline in mill consumption in cotton-importing coun-This was said to be due in part to anticipated reductions in cotton prices.

The administration has proposed changes in the government price support program which would alow a downward adjustment of two

to three cents a pound in cotton prices. Officials contend such a reduction would put this country in a better position to compete abroad.

Some increase in export sales has been made this month as a result of a special offer of a part of the government's stocks of lower quality cotton at competitive bid prices below regular U. S. sales prices. These sales have to-taled 326,956 bales since the first es to the government.

Three shots are said to give a high level of protection against polio, the second shot given one month after the first shot, and the third shot following seven months later

Texas children who received second shots summer or fall are now ready to have their third shot.

The success of the shot was announced April 12, 1955, after exhaustive nationwide studies. But by then countless numbers of children had already been exposed in a rising seasonal incidence. Result: 1955 was pretty much an ordinary year for polio for the na-tion as a whole, despite the fact that Texas' 1955 season was below the 5-year median.

Too, vaccine was in short supply during those early days, and production difficulties unsettled public confidence in the product.

Both these problems have since been overcome, Dr. Holle pointed out. Supplies are increasing daily, and, concerning production safeguards, "health and medical men agree that the vaccine is as as human hands can make

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

The number of farms in the United States has decreased from 1950 to 1954 by 600,000 according to figures recently released by the Department of Commerce. has been a decrease in every State except Florida, and an overall decline of 11.1 per cent of the farms in the Nation. There are fewer farms today than at any time since 1890. The figures further show that the size of the farms definitely getting larger, and

By 1954 this number had increased to over 130,000, and farms consisting of 500 acres or more have increased 55 per cent during the last thirty years.

The total area of all land farmed in the country is about the same as it was in 1950 and represents roughly 3/5 of our total land area. This report of the Department of Commerce shows in very dramatic figures the way that our population is shifting from the land to the great metropolitan centers. Although there are 12,000,000 acres less land producing crops now that there were in 1949, the land under irrigation has increased three and three-fourths million acres during the same period making a total acreage now irrigated of over 29,000,000 acres out of approximately 333,000,000 acres farm land in cultivation.

In Texas there was a decrease of 43,000 in the number of farms between ten and two hundred and sixty acres, and a decrease of farm tenants in Texas of about 23,000.

The census report shows, among other things, that there are 111, 000 farms in Texas having tele phone service, 269,000 with elecricity, 90,000 with television sets, 199,000 with running water, and 117,000 that have ponds, reseroirs, or earthen tanks on them.

These figures would seem to ndicate that even though many of the modern conveniences have ome to the people living on the farms, that people are still inclined to move to the cities. This migration unquestionably has been greatly contributed to by the delining farm income.
