Faith has been correctly defined as "belief in testimony." Where no testimony has ever been presented there can be no real faith. That would be opinion. For instance, if God had never in any way whatsoever revealed Himself to man and thus furnished him testimony of Himself, then man could have no faith in God If God had never revealed teslimony, the New Testament, concerning Jesus Christ, then we could not and would not have faith in Him who died for us. When testimony is presented and man believes this testimony, he then has faith. Paul so teaches in Rom. 10:17: So then faith comes by hearing, and hearing by the word

If I am going to walk by faith in religion then I must walk according to the revelation or testimony furnished by the Lord According to the Apostle Peter in 2 Peter 1:3 God has furnished us all things that pertain to life and godilness. This we have in the New Testament scriptures. That is why James refers to it is the "perfect law of liberty." James 1:25. Whenever religilously we walk or act exactly as the New Testament directs then we are walking by taith.

For example, God in the New Testament has furnished the testimony that we should sing in our worship to Him. Col. 3:16. Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly in all wisdom; teaching and admonishing one another in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing with grace in your hearts to the Lord Singing therefore is a matter of faith But there is absolutely no testimony given in the New Testament for us to employ mechanical instruments of music in worshipping the Lord Hence, to practice such is to be guided by opinion. No testimony- no faith. Surely it is then but the opinion of man. Are you walking by faith?




