Vicky Holcomb Is Betty Crocker Homemaker of KC



Vicky Ann Holcomb ranked first in a written homemaking knowledge test given to senior girls December 6 and becomes Knox City high school's 1967 Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow. It has been announced. Registered for the test were 881,334 girls in 14,753 of the nation's high schools, a new record for the 13 years the program has been offered by General Mills, its sponsor.

Vicky will be awarded a specially designed silver charm, and she remains in contention for state and national scholarship awards ranging from \$500 to \$5,000.

In the program's next step, a state Homemaker of Tomorrow will be selected from winners in all schools of the state. She will (Continued On Back Page)

IN THIS INSTANCE ON HUTCHINSON PLACE

In 1965 C. C. Hutchinson of Knox City entered into a Great Plains Conservation Program contract. He was not one of the first to participate in the program, but he had seen and heard about the program and was interested.

He knew something had to be done on his 320-acre stock farm west of Knox City. Mosquito brush was so thick in the pasture it was hard to walk in many places. The native grass was gone, the pasture was in poor condition. Gullies had begun to appear in the fields and were spreading every year. Sheet erosion from runoff was evident. Fences were down and stock water low.

It was time for action. He applied for assistance through the Wichita-Brazos District Soil Conservation Service technicians from the Knox City office to help him work up a soil and water conservation plan for the farm and he entered into a Great Plains Conservation Program contract at the time.

Brush control and range seeding with proper management practices were planned for the pastures. Grasses waterways and parallel terrace systems were planned for the fields. Plans were made to enlarge and repair stock ponds. (Continued On Back Page)

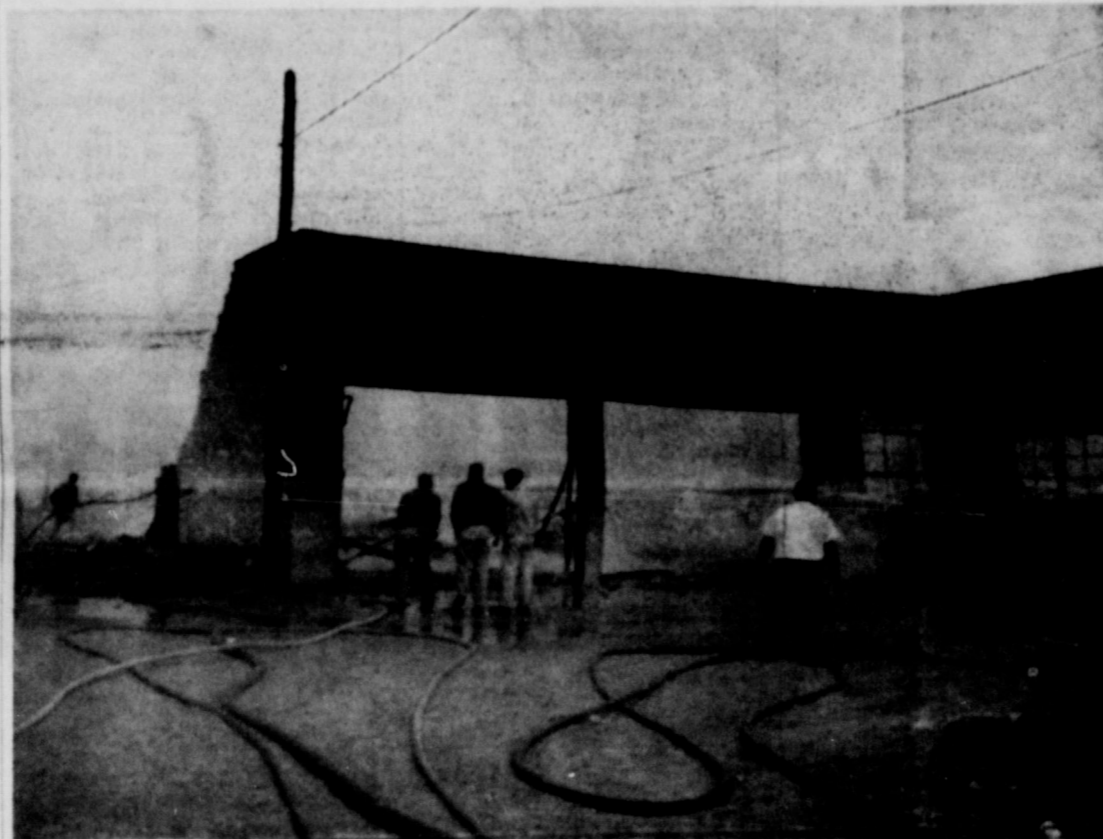
W. T. Hines of Rule, father of W. W. Hines of Knox City, underwent surgery last week in Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene.

Some Counties Receive Additional Pounds Added To Cotton Yields

The State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service Committee has announced the following additional pounds which will be added to projected cotton yields in the following counties:

Chi dress 17, Coke 5, Concho 30, Cottle 8, Fisher 36, Haskell 24, Jones 27, Kent 15, McCulloch 11, Mitchell 10, Nolan 21, Randall 32, Schleicher 7, Scurry 24, Shackelford 5, Stonewall 23, Taylor 18, Tom Green 33, Borden 7 and Glasscock 21.

The additional pounds will mean an additional 2 1/2 million dollars in income for Rolling Plains cotton farmers, according to Charles S. Colm, executive vice-president of the Rolling Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. "Complete satisfaction for the Rolling Plains has not been reached however," said Stenholm, "because the formula for distribution of the pounds within the State excluded some Rolling Plains counties from gaining their fair share of the additional poundage."

"We find this action which excludes some counties within the Rolling Plains hard to understand or appreciate. Further action is being continued."

Postal Customers Bill of Rights Says PM Graham

Postmaster Jeff Graham today called attention of Knox City mailers to the new "Postal Customer's Bill of Rights" to help meet President Johnson's government-wide goal of improving the quality of federal services to the public.

Directed at post office windows services, Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien has ordered the Customer's Bill of Rights implemented by two immediate steps at Knox City.

1. Posters will be displayed in the post office lobby and service counters containing 10 points which specify the kind of treatment customers have a right to expect.

2. Instructions from Mr. O'Brien call for careful observation of all points in the "Postal Customer's Bill of Rights." The instructions also provide directions for the most efficient management of window services.

The posters tell customers they are entitled to:

- 1.—A neat, clean counter on which to transact business.
 - 2.—Service by a well-groomed neat window employee.
 - 3.—A friendly greeting that expresses a desire to assist.
 - 4.—Knowledge, well-informed, interested window personnel to help with postal needs.
 - 5.—Prompt, alert and efficient service.
 - 6.—Competent and correct information on inquiries.
 - 7.—An attitude that reflects helpfulness, patience and congeniality.
 - 8.—The courtesy and tact that would be expected from a friend.
 - 9.—Polite referral to another window or individual, when necessary, to give the appropriate service.
 - 10.—A feeling, upon leaving, that the post office is glad to serve and help at all times.
- Instructions for fulfilling "The Postal Customer's Bill of Rights" are being distributed to all window personnel by Postmaster Graham.

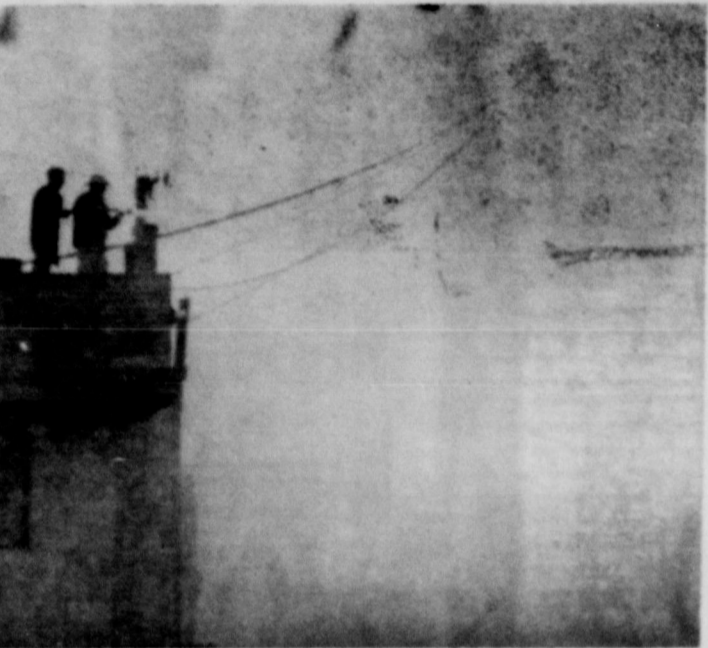
