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## Soil Bank Payments \$437,691

Soil Bank payments of almost a half-million dollars have been approved for Knox County farmers, according to J. T. Gilpin, manager of the County ASC office.

The final total may be considerably more, since applications were still being processed when Gilpin announced the totals Monday.

Wheat on 66 farms had been put into the Soil Bank. Acreage totaled 4,378, and payments amounted to \$25,880.

Gilpin said 14,823 acres of cotton land on 506 farms had been "signed up", with payments totaling \$411,811.

Participation in the Soil Bank by Knox County farmers has been much heavier than anticipated, because of the extreme drought conditions.

Mr. Gilpin said payments will be made as soon as possible, perhaps soon after Sept. 1.

## Emergency FHA Loans Available to County Farmers

Production and Subsistence loan funds are now available for Baylor, Knox and Throckmorton Counties. Loans are made to applicants who are unable to obtain credit needed to carry on successful farming operations from local banks, credit associations and other sources.

Before funds can be advanced the local Farmers Home Administration Committee, B. E. Smith and John H. Atterbury, must review each application and determine the eligibility of the applicant.

Funds are advanced for the purchase of equipment, feed, fertilizer, livestock and other farm operating needs including family subsistence.

## City Receives Report on Recent Inspection by Insurance Commission

The city this week received a letter from the State Board of Insurance Commissioners giving the results of a recent inspection of fire prevention facilities in Knox City by an engineer from the Fire Insurance Division.

Mayor Barney Arnold said the city will comply with as many as possible of the recommendations set forth in the letter. The mayor expects to receive notification of a change in the key fire insurance rate in the near future, and expects it to be lower than the present 23 cents.

The letter, copies of which went to Mayor Arnold, City Secretary O. L. Knight and Fire Chief A. T. Holcomb, was as follows:

"Dear Mr. Arnold: "We thank you for the assistance given our engineer on his recent trip to Knox City when he investigated the fire prevention facilities. From the results of this inspection we will proceed with an adjustment in your key rate which will be promulgated in due course.

"We recommend that as soon as possible provisions be made for the installation of a second 500 CFM service pumping unit operating at a head of 150 feet to be placed at the new pumping station. Arrangements should be made to increase the well supply available at this station which will flow into the ground storage reservoir there.

## Lubbock Youths Admit Stickup of Man Near Benjamin

At least four armed robberies in three states were believed solved this week as a result of statements given Knox County officers by five Lubbock residents—three of them juveniles.

Being held in the Knox County jail are Billy Gene Ivey, 21, and A. J. Campo Jr., 20, charged with armed robbery, and a 16 year old youth who had not been charged Tuesday. Two girls, age 13 and 14, were turned over to Lubbock juvenile authorities.

Sheriff Homer T. Melton said Leslie W. Payne, enroute from California to his home in Ft. Worth, was sleeping in his car beside U. S. Highway 82 two miles west of Benjamin when he was awakened by two or more youths wearing handkerchief masks. The hold-up men shined a light in Payne's face and demanded his money, and when he protested that he had no money, one of the robbers pointed a double barrel shotgun at his head and threatened to "blow his head off" if Payne did not hand over his money.

Payne handed over \$19.99, and the robbers left with a warning that he not move until they were gone. As soon as they walked away Payne raised his head, however, and one of the masked men came back with a 22 cal. rifle and shot three times into a rear tire.

The robbery took place at 1:00 a. m. Monday. As soon as Payne changed the deflated tire he reported the robbery to Sheriff Melton, and a search of the area by officers turned up a girl's shoe.

About 2:30 a. m. Melton contacted other officers in the area, including Lubbock, by radio, and the suspects were arrested near Lubbock about 6 a. m. The rear license plate on the car was bent so it could not be read, Lubbock officers said.

The group denied being in the Benjamin area, but Melton, Deputy Sheriff H. C. Stone and County Attorney Tom Bullington drove to Lubbock and under questioning by the Knox County officers and Lubbock Detective Capt. L. W. Forester, and being confronted by the shoe, the group admitted robbing Payne. They said they left Lubbock Saturday and went into Oklahoma, and that they had robbed Payne when they ran out of money.

Later the group admitted that on similar trips they had hijacked a woman and her two sons near Crosbyton recently, and committed similar robberies in New Mexico and Nevada. In all instances, the group hijacked motorists asleep in their cars beside highways.

## Fairly Heavy Vote Expected In Demo Primary Saturday

### Voters Urged to Attend Precinct Conventions Saturday

Control of the state Democratic Party machinery will be at stake in the precinct conventions to be held over the state Saturday, and a bitter struggle between the conservative and liberal factions is shaping up.

The convention in Knox City's north precinct will be held in the director's room above the city hall, beginning at 2 p. m., according to Precinct Chairman J. C. McGee, who urged everyone interested to attend.

In the south precinct, Chairman E. L. Park said the convention will be held in the old city hall at 2 p. m. This morning, however, he had not obtained the building, and said if a change is made he will post a sign on the old city hall door.

While the local conventions are expected to be fairly tame, fireworks are expected in some areas. Both the "loyalist" and "liberal" segments of the party want to replace the present State Democratic Executive Committee, which joined Governor Shivers in bolting the party and voting for Eisenhower in 1952. Others fear a change will give the extreme liberal wing control of the state party machinery.

Senator Lyndon Johnson, who will head the Texas delegation to the national convention, has called for election of "good, loyal Democrats who will support the party nominee" as precinct delegates.

Each precinct is allowed to send to the county convention one delegate for every 25 votes the precinct cast for the party's candidate for governor two years ago. Resolutions may also be adopted at the precinct conventions.

The county convention will be held on August 4, and the state convention on September 11. At the state convention delegates will certify the party nominees, frame and adopt the state party platform and name the state executive committee. The state convention may also change the personnel and instructions to the Texas presidential electors.

Wheat marketing quotas won by a landslide in the referendum held in Knox County Saturday.

Approximately 1,000 farmers in the county were eligible to vote on the important question, Gilpin said.

Despite the fact that interest in politics has not apparently reached its fever pitch of two years ago during the Shivers-Yarborough campaign, a good turn-out of voters is expected in the Democratic primary Saturday.

### Farm Safety Week Being Observed

This week, July 22-28, is being observed as National Farm Safety Week, by proclamation of President Eisenhower.

Walter T. McKay, state director of the Farmers Home Administration, has urged all FHA employees to do everything they can to help promote farm safety and encourage greater effort in helping to reduce the tragedies and losses caused by needless accidents, W. A. Satterwhite, county supervisor, said Wednesday.

In urging full participation in the campaign, McKay stated that in one year the farm accident toll was 14,500 people killed, 1,250,000 injured. In addition, the money loss represented by farm accidents and also by fires runs about a billion dollars a year. The human misery can't even be measured, he added.

"It is the policy of the Farmers Home Administration to promote safety among its borrowers as part of its service to farm families," McKay stated. "We don't think of safety as separate and distinct but as an inseparable part of our entire program. Our three safety aims are:

"First, to improve the health and welfare of families by eliminating safety hazards on farms and in homes; second, to reduce families' financial losses caused by accidents and fires; and third, to make farm production more efficient by reducing or minimizing accidental injuries and illness."

In summary McKay advised that Farmers Home Administration is interested in every borrower making his farm a safe place to live and work, while improving his family's economic condition. The two go together, and the lack of one can be the undoing of the other.

### Highway Patrol Reports on Accidents In County in June

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated six accidents in Knox County in June, including four property damage and two personal injury, according to Capt. K. B. Hallmark Jr., commanding officer of the Wichita Falls district of

the Patrol. None of the accidents were fatal. Property damage amounted to \$3,675. No accidents were reported during the same period in 1955. Capt. Hallmark also reported that patrolmen of the district contacted a total of 1680 traffic law violators during June. Of this number, 411 were arrested while 1269 were warned for violation of the state traffic laws. Speeding was the leading cause of arrest, with improper passing second and driving while intoxicated ranking third. Counties included in the Wichita Falls district are Archer, Baylor, Clay, Cottle, Hardeman, King, Knox, Montague, Wichita, Wilbarger and Young.

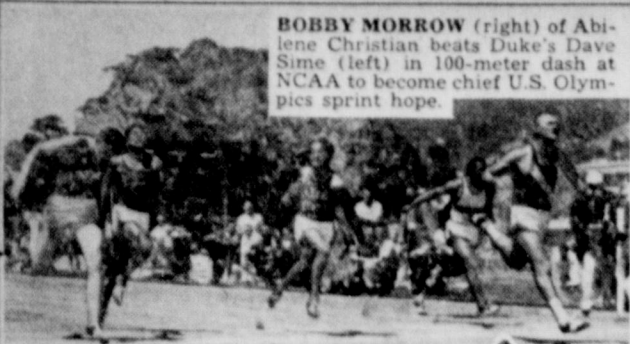

Concho Wheat, which was released to Texas certified seed growers in 1955, has shown an outstanding yield record in irrigated tests and has also performed well on dryland.

Concho matures a few days later than the earliest varieties, but has out-yielded these early varieties three to four bushels per acre in his North Central Texas area. Milling quality of Concho is rated very good to excellent, and other characteristics include high test weight and very good disease resistance.

Concho is now generally available, and some of the Knox County wheat producers who have purchased or otherwise indicated that they intend to Fall seed some of

gram in order to restore the carrying capacity of the water mains. We have prepared the enclosed map which shows where additional mains and fire hydrants are needed and would suggest that you keep the map for future guidance.

"Maintenance of your fire hydrants has been only fair, and the top cover of the hydrant at Sixth and Central was loose and should be replaced immediately. Please have the city council pass a written order to the water superintendent directing that he inspect, flush, oil and grease all fire hydrants every 90 days and paint them a distinctive color at least once a year. Please send us a copy of the order.

"Your fire department is drilling and is making reports to this office in a satisfactory manner. The department has been represented properly at the Firemen's Training School. We wish to point out, however, that your Fire Marshal is now two months delinquent with his monthly inspection reports, and unless these are sent in regularly we can place a 3-cent charge in your key rate. Please see that this matter is taken care of properly. Your Fire Marshal ordinance could not be located, so it will be necessary that you pass a new one using the enclosed copy of our standard advisory form.

"Your 1942 Ford truck will not carry 1000 feet of 2 1/2 inch double-jacketed fire hose, therefore we cannot allow credit for a reserve pumper or reserve hose truck until this truck is modified to carry 1000 feet of fire hose. Arrangements must be made for an additional amount of 2 1/2 double-jacketed fire hose so that you will always have on hand not less than 200 feet of hose. This is quite necessary when you consider that a charge of 1 cent is now in order for this deficiency. Please be sure that all fire hose is tested twice each year to 200 pounds pressure and that all defective sections are replaced. We suggest that you purchase 600 feet of additional 2 1/2 inch hose and two salvage covers to be placed in service.

"Your present fire limits ordinance is inadequate and we recommend that you pass our standard advisory fire limits ordinance, a copy of which is enclosed. Please furnish us a copy of the ordinance when action is taken. This ordinance must then be rigidly and impartially enforced over a proba-

tionary period. "You are being charged in your key rate for over 75 percent combustible roofs in the residential districts. Our engineer believes that the percentage is less than that so we suggest that you follow the instructions on the enclosed blank in making a survey.

"To continue credit for an Arson Reward Ordinance the Fire Marshal must check each month to see that 8 1/2 by 11 inch placards showing that the reward is offered are posted in six public buildings in wooden frames under glass at all times.

"Please be sure to keep us posted as to changes made. Before any action is taken in connection with the water works improvements, please send us plans and specifications so that we may go over these and advise you. We thank you for your cooperation.

### Texas Schools Get 22 Percent Increase In Lunchroom Funds

Texas public schools will get about 22 percent more funds from the U. S. Department of Agriculture than last year to serve noon-day meals under the National School Lunch Program.

The increase of \$853,453 brings the total to \$4,696,808 for the coming school year.

First quarter allocation of this money will be made to Texas this month, according to John J. Slaughter, southwest food distribution division, Dallas. This office of the Agricultural Marketing Service deals with the states in this region on the National School Lunch Program.

Slaughter explained that the 22 percent increase in the Texas allotment was the result of an increase of \$16,700,000 over last year's appropriation by Congress.

Federal funds are shared by the states on the basis of the number of children between the ages of 5 and 17, inclusive, and the need for assistance in the state as indicated by the relation of the per capita income of the United States to that of the state.

Slaughter praised the Texas Education Agency for the way it has developed and administered the school lunch program.
