Mrs. Christ said that the Foursquare members hoped that everyone would attend Sunday afternoon and join in the sharing of hymns and fellowship. Also she said that if the other churches would like to take turns in hosting the First Sunday Singing, this would be "fine". Sunday afternoon following the singing it will be decided as to where everyone will meet next.

Also in the making are tentative plans for all the churches to unite again for sharing and eating on Sunday, September 23. More details will follow on this as they materialize, pastors and lay-leaders said.

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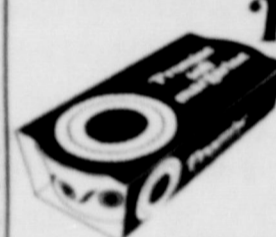

# Study of Groundwater Supply Being Conducted

In response to numerous requests, the Texas Water Quality Board and Texas A&M University have undertaken a joint study of the groundwater supply in the Seymour Formation of Knox and Haskell Counties.

The purpose is threefold: 1) to determine the total pumpage of water from this formation 2) to determine the extent and sources of salt water contamination 3) to determine the extent of nitrate contamination.

Results of the analyses will be mailed back within two weeks. This study is being conducted with but one goal in mind - to help preserve the County area; but nothing will be accomplished without the help and cooperation of the local residents.

When the forms are returned, sample bottles will be given out to collect and return to the Texas A&M University Vegetable Research Station at Munday, or to the U. S. D. A. Office in Knox City on July 19, 21, and 22 from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.

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## MAN AND HIS ENVIRONMENT
