





The group coming through the International Programs Division of the Texas A&M University System were scourted by Technical Leader Mr W. Bassett Orr from Texas AAM University, were from the countries of Guyana, Ghana, Iran, Nepal and Nigeria. The group met with County Agricultural Agent Herman H. Collier, H. H. Partridge, Gene Thompson and J. Weldon Smith in the meeting room of the Texas A&M University Vegetable Research Station during the morning meeting. Mr. Oer introduced the group as agricultural bankers in their respective countries and mentioned they may be more like the Farmers Home Administration office directors in the United States

County Agent Collier opened the meeting with comments on Extension roles in the vegetable production of Knex County, Mr. H. H. Partridge local vegatable producer member and a irrector of the Munday Vegetable Growers Co-op. assisted by Mr. Gene Thompson, producer and manager of the Co-op, discussed the work done and assistance of other people in the community in organizing and starting the Coop. Mr. Partridge also showed slides of various stages of seeding, growing, harvesting and readying vegetables for the Mr J. Weldon Smith, Vice

President of the First National Bank of Munday answered questions asked by the group as to methods used in determining how a loan was approved colaterial needed and other important details of handling agricultural loans.

FARM ECONOMY CHANGES VIEWED IN TEXAS

The agricultural economy in Texas has undergone some major changes during the past decade. It's only fitting to reflect on some of these as preparations are in progress for the observance of Texas Food and Fiber Abundance Week. Nov. 15-21, says Charles K. Baker, agricultural economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Agricultural producers in Texas as elsewhere are caught up in the costprice source. points out Baker. Production expenses rose 62 percent during the 1960's while realized gross farm income rose only 56 percent Current operating expenses such as feed, breeding stock, seed, fertilizer, repairs, labor and operating capital accounted for 75 percent of the

During the past five years. production costs have increased 26 percent to hold net income gains to 11.8 percent - about half of the five-year advance in inflation (2) 6 percent)

Changes have also taken place with regard to farm credit, explains the economist Farm debt has increased sharply since World War II and was one of the factors required to bring about great changes in

Texas agriculture. There has farms, a notable increase in the number of larger farms, and a sharp decline in small farms.

With these changes have come an increase in the needs for farm credit and an increase in farm debts. Farm mortgage debt in Texas has risen from \$314 million in 1946 to \$2 billion in 1970. Non-real estate farm debt has also shown sharp increases, totaling \$1.24 billion in 1970 compared with \$361 million

IS 1950. Farm and ranch assests continue to spiral upward and on January 1, 1971, totaled \$29.2 billion, an increase of almost four percent from a year earlier Increase in value of real estate accounted for most of the

HOME PEST CONTROL

If you have an insect problem in your home, then take action against these sewanted pests. Some of the most troublesome pests are carwigs, crickets, polibugs and certain cockroaches.

Using insecticides as a preventative measure is not recommended because of the possibility of an adverse effect on the environment. Use insecticides only when you need

A chioradane or diazinon spray applied to the outside foundation of your home will keep out most of these unwanted invaders. To control pests inside the home, use an approved commercial household formulation of in

Spraying is the best method killing the pests. Treat the outside walls and foundation from sill to sail and about five to six inches of soil next to the foundation. Be sure and give cracks and crevices extra at-

Also treat along edges and sidewalks and driveways. If a sprayer isn't available, then a sprinkler will do. For treating window sills and thresholds, a paint brush makes a good ap-

Read the label of the insecticide before application and follow the manufacturer's recommendations. Do not treat plant foliage with the spray.

FALL CARE OF SHRURS

Shrubs need careful attention. in the fall so that they will survive the winter in healthy condition and be ready to grow next spring. Shrubs should be well watered before cold weather sets in, and those in grain sorghum base and up to 20 windy locations may require some protection. The mulch around shrubs should also be renewed. Pruning should not be done in the fall just before cold

Grazing management is a key ditional voluntary set aside. item in the proper utilization of Dr. Neal Pratt Extension agronomist Winter pastures produce a top quality forage and should be grazed with livestock that have high market value Grazing should be withheld until winter is approaching so that postures have time to become thoroughly established and to make suflicient growth

Program, with its additional set-asside options, should correct any imbalance caused by this year's record-breaking crop Danklels said. At the same time, set aside payments have been boosted to increase farm

According Danklefs, an increase in the qualifying set aside from 20 to Its percent of the base acreage. plus the additional set-aside options, should result in taking at least 38 million acres out of production -- compared with 15.2 million acres this year. He estimates that farmers will produce about 4.5 billion sushels of corp on this acreage. This reduced production should allow a draw-down in stocks of corn next year

The 1972 program although designed to reduce corn production, offers farmers even more decision-making freedom than they had in 1971 the first year of a new farm program which emphasized the importance of farmers making their own management decisions. The two new setaside options and more liberal substitution make the dif ference." Danklets said.

Dunklets explained the set aside options this way

Option No. 1 - This is the minimum 25 percent qualifying set-aside that the producer must sign-up for is he wants to participate. Payment rate for this is set at 80 cents a bushel for corn, 64 cents per bushel for barley, and % cents per bushel for grain sorghum, paid on the established farm yield times the qualifying set-axide acres (25 percent of the farm base)

Option No. 2 - After signing for Option No. 1, the producer can agree to set aside an additional amount of acreage, up to 10 percent of his corn and percent of his barley base. He'll be paid for this at 52 cents per bushel for corn. 42 cents per bushel for barley, and 49 cents per bushel for grain sorghum. Payment under this option is fupured on the established farm UNE OF WINTER PASTURES yield times the acres of ad-

offer to set aside still another 5 of 15 percent of his torn and grain sorghum base acreage but the Secretary of Agriculture has until mid. March to decide whether or not he wants to accept any or all of this offer If the Secretary accepts the offer, the additional set-aside payment and method of computation are the same for curn or grain sorghum as under option No. 2. There is no third option for harley

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
